#### Some important Updates...

Church is about people, not about buildings. Yes, we miss gathering in our beautiful sanctuary, and meeting face-to-face around the big conference table. We're sad we've had to abandon classes and fellowship times. But, church "business" does continue! We are just doing it in a different way, on a different timeline. Here's an update on some of the bigger projects:

Holy Week Worship Planning — We are working toward pre-recording an Easter worship service to be released on Easter Sunday morning, both on line and on local cable. We will have a Day of Resurrection! (even if we still have to stay home). We are also working toward Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services as well, to be posted on our Website and on Facebook.

Church Organization and Committees — At the annual meeting, Council Chair Phil Jackson announced that a team would be re-evaluating the number of church committees, and that everybody's input was important. This important project has been nudged to the back burner, but is still there. One first step is for everybody, including you, to be thinking about the most important things our church does. There may not be a better time for everybody to be thinking about the church's needs, activities, and resources and how we can best be church for God's kingdom.

Gather Round Circles — Pastor Amy has started compiling findings from surveys and interviews. Generally, those who took part in a Circle are eager for more, and want to invite the whole community. Some folks have volunteered to help organize another series of Circles. The Gather Round Team had begun planning a pot-luck celebration and "big reveal" of the study's findings. We'll do that when we get back together. In the meantime, Amy continues to work on her dissertation. (She could use some prayers on this.)

**Safe Church Policy** — Phil has pulled together a number of resources and has shared them with the Executive Committee for review.

Even as we are practicing social distancing, we are still united as the Body of Christ! We can still celebrate together as we embark on the holiest week of the year.



# Staying Rooted By Patricia Berry, March 13, 2020

"And that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love" Ephesians 3:17

When things got tough, my mother would turn the TV off and take us, kids, for a ride. We would reluctantly climb into the LTD station wagon and ask, "Where we going, momma?" She'd reply, hands gripped on the wheel, tissues by her side, "we're going to go find God!" We never knew how long the ride would take. One afternoon, while riding along on an old country road, tree-lined with maple sugaring buckets, we watched the river below us run wild. Faces glued to the backseat window, we lost ourselves in the Spring current that was pushing through the winter ice, rising up onto the river's edge and soaking the stubbly cornfields razed from the season past. As the chaos simmered down in the car, mom pulled over mesmerized by the purple crocuses peeking through the thawing earth in the abandoned setback. Together, we all got out of the car to count the fresh buds and flowers emerging in the dirt. Feet planted in the muck, we found our breath in the changing wind. And remembered where Christ dwells and works best.

As I sat, reeling from the flurry of updates of the Coronavirus, glued to my device for the latest reports; border control, State of Emergencies, cancellation after cancellation, pictures of empty toilet paper and hand sanitizer shelves, charts of global spread, fatality rates, recovery rates, demographics most at risk and the latest people tested positive for Covid-19 and announcements there will no in-person worship services for some weeks, I struggled to find my breath; disconnect; root and ground myself before my kids get off the bus. Walking outside in the wooded cemetery across the street, I wondered how the kids are feeling- the nervous belly aches have already begun. I wondered how parents will manage-I hear the worries and the stress. I wondered how we will make meaning out of this new place that we are in. I wondered how we are to stay rooted and grounded when everything in our world is being uprooted; Our routines. Our disciplines. Our spiritual practices. Our patterns of existence.

When images and anxiety-producing messages saturate our lives, research tells us to unplug; disconnect but as the Coronavirus pandemic spirals globally and the anxiety builds we hear Stay Home! Stay tuned! Stay connected! Don't touch! Turn to E-learning. Social media. Zoom. FaceTime. Conference calling. Texting. Virtual Worshipping. Are we being asked to root and ground ourselves into something else? Our meaning-making processes are changing. Our orientation is shifting. Our community connections are transforming. How are we to find our breath?

Scrolling through social media, I am seeing more pictures of spring flowers, prayers, uplifting-quotes, offers to help those in need: food, childcare, activities for the kids. My teenage daughter sent me a TikTok cooking video of mint chocolate chip cookies and can we make these next week, please? One mom told me she was going to listen to a spiritual podcast to stay grounded on her way to work. Another mom was going to tune into to her church's online service. My friend who is a nurse plans to depend on her smartphone more to meditate between her shifts. Group chatroom and text messaging are becoming e-prayer gatherings, a lifeline and a "let me know if you need toilet paper". Youth are checking in with each other through online gaming, Instagram, and snapchat. Spotify created more mood booster playlists. Virtual fitness and wellness classes are being offered. Daily devotions, inspirational music YouTube videos, reminders to check on our neighbors, make phone calls to loved ones and send handdecorated notes to nursing homes are posted. Spiritual care apps are popping up; Call-a-chaplain for a listening ear. Faith leaders are gathering online for support and technology planning. This is all happening minute by minute. We are creating new ways to be together, to be a community, to serve, to minister, to exist; still grounded and rooted in love while plugged in.

Paul wrote to the Ephesians to remind them to let the spirit keep their hearts united and to stand firmly grounded and rooted in love. This is true today, whether it's online, in person, taking a drive with mom or a walk outside with our kids, we find love when we turn to each other, connect, and search for meaning in the chaos. Feet planted firmly in the muck, counting one fresh Spring bud and flower at a time, we will find our breath, together, in the ever-changing wind. And remember where Christ dwells and works best.


#### Faith VS. COVID-19 THOMAS BERRY


