February blessings to you!

Winter is upon us, and for many that means more time inside. It might also mean more time with hobbies such as painting, writing, music, woodworking, or even playing with trains.

In December, in the middle of a sewing project, it occurred to me that sewing is probably my preferred hobby. There are several reasons for this:

- I'm not very good at it. Many in our congregation achieve remarkable precision and beauty in their sewing. These are true artists and craftspeople. Me? Please don't ask me to put in a zipper or make a buttonhole. With my trusty Elna, I can sew a relatively straight seam but that's about it! Even though I'm no master seamstress, I do it anyway because it brings me joy.
- It adds texture to my life. Especially with seminary studies, I spend much of my time sitting, usually in front of something flat like a computer screen usually in front of something black-and-white like a book. Sewing surrounds me with color and different textures. It gets me moving, looking at things from different angles, working in three dimensions. It's completely different than what I usually do with my mind and body.
- I get lost in it. I can spend hours with a project and never notice the time go by. As I consider shapes and colors, and strategies for how to put them all together, my mind takes flight. When I have a sewing project going, my mind works on two levels. As I sew, life situations simmer on the back burner, and sometimes a solution presents itself. When I'm not sewing, my project simmers on the back burner and in the middle of something else, I will be struck with inspiration about my project.
- There's not a lot at stake. I don't sew for money, and not very often to a deadline. Nobody counts on me to complete a
 project well or on time. Practical projects, like mending, can usually wait and I never undertake anything of a practical nature that's very difficult. I know my limitations and stick to them.

The occasion for realizing sewing is my preferred hobby was changing thread on my machine. I reached for my plastic spool box, saw all those colors and realized just how long I've had some of that thread. Some spools I've had probably 20 years or longer. I cannot recall why I bought them. Some I remember buying specifically to sew patches onto Boy Scout sashes or Cub Scout "brag vests." I have three shades of purple thread for a project I never finished, and an untouched spool of peach-colored thread to match fabric I gave away a decade ago.

It's taken many years, many projects, many friends, many adventures, and many situations to accumulate that much thread. That box has lived and moved with me longer than just about anything in my life, including my husband and my cat. If it could talk, it could give you a fairly complete picture of all the thrills of victory and the agonies of defeat. Pardon the pun, but sewing has stitched its way into the fabric of my life without my even thinking about it.

For me, there's a certain lightness in sewing, and we all need lightness in our lives. We all need those things for which there's not a lot at stake, in which we aren't self-conscious, for which we don't get anxious about being perfect, and which we can put away without much consequence.

Of all the things we are carrying with us into this new year, may one of them be lightness of spirit. If we don't have anything that bears this kind of joyful lightness, may we open our spirits to make that discovery. It's an act of faith to be able to

hand things over to God to take care of, while we tend to that creative side of ourselves.

For the final worship service of 2019, worshippers wrote on a card something they'll bring into the new decade. Examples are love, faith, curiosity, and gumption. You'll see these cards displayed at the annual meeting on Feb. 2. In the meantime, here's a snapshot of a few that were included.

May all that we carry with us into the new decade bear a dimension of beauty, wisdom, compassion, or love. Happy 2020!

What is Shrove Tuesday? Shrove Tuesday is a day of celebration as well as penitence, because it's the last day before Lent. Lent is a time of abstinence, of giving things up. So Shrove Tuesday is the last chance to indulge yourself, and to use up the foods that aren't allowed in Lent. Giving up foods: but not wasting them. In the old days there were many foods that observant Christians would not eat during Lent: foods such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. So that no food was wasted, families would have a feast on Shrove Tuesday, and eat up all the foods that would spoil during the forty days of Lent.

The need to eat up the fats gave rise to the French name Mardi Gras; meaning fat Tuesday. Pancakes became associated with Shrove Tuesday as they were a dish that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour.
