



Rebuild/Renew Update

In the spirit of Thanksgiving, we are grateful for the progress that has been made. The building survived the fire, was dried out and fire-cleaning completed. Our insurance company, Church Mutual, has been good to us and already compensated for the fire damage. They are now working with us on required code upgrades in all the areas affected by the fire.

Our Capital Campaign is a success in progress and God continues to bless our church. Thanks to the generosity of our church family and friends, money received and pledged totals two-thirds of our goal of \$150,000. Special gratitude for the leadership of Bro. John Ridgeway who continues to support us but has passed leadership of the project to Sis. Cecilia Vanderhost. Let us be "All-in" until the end.

Currently, our Architect is preparing the architectural drawing required for getting a building permit from New Castle County. These drawings are more detailed than originally thought and are promised to be completed by Nov. 30. Our new electronic sign will be delivered this week and our installer has applied for the permit to install.

The pandemic has slowed everything down; however, we continue to make progress and now hope that we will be able to return to our building in the spring.

Peninsula DE Annual Conference Summary (PDAC)

On Friday November 13th, 2020 from 1-5pm history was made in the life of the PDAC. For the first time ever, due to the pandemic, the 236th convening of the PDAC was held via ZOOM for lay and clergy members of conference only. We used electronic voting with the raised hand feature.

The session was live-streamed for visitors and guests. There was also a church designated for those who did not have computer or WIFI capability. Bishop Peggy Johnson opened the conference with scripture and

talked about extending love and encouragement during this pandemic

even though we can't physically be together.

She went on to urge us to come together in unity. Dividing is a failure of love but she remains hopeful that unity can prevail. She said that if we can admit that we don't always know everything, be vulnerable and listen to each others hearts that even diverse people can be united. She is thankful for the racial movement going on and wants us to continue trying to come together. We must operate out of the loving wisdom of God. When the world sees this in us, they will be more apt to join us. She believes that some ministries will be even better due to our new learning of

UMC; Antioch UMC; Nelson UMC & Calvary UMC. After many questions and discussion, all were approved to separate from the PDC. Bishop Johnson prayed for each of these churches and then we took a 15 minute break. Upon our return from the break, Retiring Clergy were acknowl-

ADVENT SEASON

Advent 2020 begins on Sunday, November 29 and ends on Thursday, December 24.

Advent marks the start of a season of preparation that looks forward to the celebration of Christmas and the second coming of Christ. It is a time of reflection in preparing our hearts for the coming of Christ—we remember how our Savior humbled Himself to be born as a baby and live among those He would save. We remember the perfect life He lived doing the will of His Father, His sacrificial death on the cross, and how He was raised from the dead three days later, having paid the penalty in order to save all who would believe. Christians remember Jesus' promise to return again one day and restore everything fully. This season invokes feelings of expectation and hope! The word Advent comes from the Latin adventus, meaning "arrival" or "coming" from the word advenire (ad- "to" venire "come"). Advent is a reminder of how the Jewish people waited for the Messiah and how Christians and Messianic Jews wait for the second coming of Christ, today.

Week 2: Preparation (or waiting or prophecy)

Week 3: Joy (or peace)

Week 4: Love (or adoration)

While the differences in weekly Advent themes may be confusing, we can unite in our desire to quiet our hearts during a hectic holiday season and worship Jesus. There is no right or wrong way to observe Advent as long as you're coming to God with a sincere and open heart.

SPOTLIGHT ON VICE PRESIDENT KAMALA HARRIS

Who Is Kamala Harris?

After attending Howard University and the University of California's Hastings College of the Law, Kamala Harris embarked on a rise through the California legal system, emerging as state attorney general in 2010. Following the November 2016 elections, Harris became just the second African American woman and the first South Asian American to win a seat in the U.S. Senate. She declared her candidacy for the 2020 U.S. presidential election on Martin Luther King Jr. Day 2019 but dropped out of the race before the end of the year. In August 2020, Joe Biden announced Harris as vice presidential running mate and after a close race, Biden and Harris were elected in November 2020.

Early Life

Kamala Devi Harris was born on October 20, 1964, in Oakland, California. Reared in a predominantly African American neighborhood of Berkeley, she was brought to civil rights demonstrations as a toddler and sang in a Baptist choir.

Harris' mother, Shyamala, emigrated from India to attend the University of California, Berkeley, where she met Harris' Jamaican-born father, Donald. Shyamala carved out a career as a renowned breast-cancer researcher, while Donald became a Stanford University economics professor. Her mother also ensured that Harris and her younger sister, Maya, maintained ties to their Indian heritage by raising them with Hindu beliefs and taking them to her home country every couple of years. Harris' parents divorced when she was seven years old, and at age 12 she moved with her mother and sister to Montreal, Quebec, Canada. She learned to speak some French during her time in Quebec and demonstrated her burgeoning political instincts by organizing a protest against a building owner who wouldn't allow neighborhood kids to play on the lawn.

Education

Harris attended Westmount High School in Quebec, where she founded a dance troupe with a friend. Returning to the States to enter Howard University in Washington, D.C., she was elected to the liberal arts student council and joined the debate team, en route to a B.A. in political science and economics. Harris then enrolled at the University of California, Hastings College of the Law, earning her J.D. in 1989.

Early Career

After earning admittance to the State Bar of California in 1990, Harris began her career as a deputy district attorney in Alameda County. She became managing attorney of the Career Criminal Unit in the San Francisco District Attorney's Office in 1998, and in 2000 she was appointed chief of its Community and Neighborhood Division, during which time she established the state's first Bureau of Children's Justice.

San Francisco District Attorney

In 2003, Harris defeated incumbent Terence Hallinan, her former boss, to become San Francisco district attorney. Her accomplishments in this role include the launch of the "Back on Track" initiative that cut recidivism by offering job training and other educational programs for low-level offenders. However, Harris also drew criticism for adhering to a campaign pledge and refusing to seek the death penalty for a gang member convicted of the 2004 killing of police officer Isaac Espinoza.

Holiday Reminders

Thanksgiving is on the way! Just a reminder to continue wearing your mask, social distancing, and although you want to have that large family gathering limit your social interactions. It has definitely been determined that wearing a mask decreases the chances of exposure to COVID. COVID 19 numbers are increasing.

As of Monday, November 23, Delaware is issuing new guidelines for gatherings. In your home, there are no limitations. However, remember that you or a family member could possibly have exposure to someone outside your family (work, school, anywhere there is a large number of folks). Some individuals never test positive but are carriers of COVID. So you won't know who has the virus.

Remember once in contact with the virus symptoms do not occur for 4-10 days after exposure. This is the reason for a 14-day quarantine following potential exposure. If during that 14-day quarantine you have a negative COVID test you must still maintain the 14-day quarantine. Symptoms can occur anytime during that quarantine period. If you test positive for COVID your quarantine period is 10 days because they go back 4 days from the date you indicate possible exposure to calculate your quarantine period. If it is determined you may have been potentially exposed you will be contacted by the Department of Public Health.

Let's do our part and WEAR A MASK and SOCIAL DISTANCE! If you are an individual who is in the high-risk category (age-related, health issues) please continue to monitor your interactions with others that are not your immediate family members. And family members are precautioned to monitor their interactions with others so that they do not expose their high-risk family member to COVID.

We wish for everyone to have a safe, healthy, happy thanksgiving! Have fun! Laugh, take deep breathes, and just enjoy yourself with your family!
