St. Paul has partnered with West Ohio Food Bank, which allows us to purchase food for as little as .19 cents a pound and this gives us greater purchasing capability to keep the shelves stocked. We are asking members of St. Paul for donations of money as well as items for the Blessing Pantry. We, the Mission Team, will keep you updated on how we are doing through-out the year. DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 1:4-11.

Jesus' baptism is marked by dramatic events. Not only did Jesus go out to John in the wilderness, but so did "all the people of Jerusalem" (v. 5). John, who has a strong following acknowledges that Jesus, the one to come after John, is so much more important, that John is not worthy to untie Jesus' sandals. Jesus' own baptizing will bring with it the Holy Spirit, not just the call to repentance, as was the baptism of John. The Holy Spirit will make Jesus' baptism and the Christian baptism different (see Acts 19:1-7). Then, the most dramatic moment happens, the moment that defines Jesus' baptism as a cosmic shattering event: the heavens were torn apart and the Spirit of God came down, appearing like a dove. The tearing apart of the heavens will be matched by the tearing apart of the curtain in the temple at the time of Jesus death (Mark 15:38). Jesus' baptism is linked with the cosmic shattering event of his death that changes for all time our relationship to God. This is something that we participate in through our own baptisms, another earth-shattering experience filled with love that claims us as God's beloved children. Is being claimed by God in baptism earth shattering to you? Why or why not?

Pray: God of glory and might, help us to see and believe in your earth-shattering power and love for us and to see that love embrace us in the remembrance of our baptisms. Amen.





OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Psalm 51:6-17

(NRSV)

You desire truth in the inward being;

therefore teach me wisdom in my secret heart.

⁷ Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean;

wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

⁸ Let me hear joy and gladness;

let the bones that you have crushed rejoice.

⁹ Hide your face from my sins,

and blot out all my iniquities.

¹⁰ Create in me a clean heart, O God,

and put a new and right spirit within me.

¹¹ Do not cast me away from your presence,

and do not take your holy spirit from me.

¹² Restore to me the joy of your salvation,

and sustain in me a willing spirit.

¹³ Then I will teach transgressors your ways,

and sinners will return to you.

¹⁴ Deliver me from bloodshed, O God,

O God of my salvation,

and my tongue will sing aloud of your deliverance.

¹⁵ O Lord, open my lips,

and my mouth will declare your praise.

¹⁶ For you have no delight in sacrifice;

if I were to give a burnt offering, you would not be pleased.

¹⁷ The sacrifice acceptable to God is a broken spirit;

a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ² during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴ as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight.

⁵ Every valley shall be filled,

and every mountain and hill shall be made low,

and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth;

⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

⁷ John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸ Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ⁹ Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

¹⁰ And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" ¹¹ In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." ¹² Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" ¹³ He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." ¹⁴ Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

¹⁵ As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶ John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to

untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷ His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹⁸ So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people. ¹⁹ But Herod the ruler, who had been rebuked by him because of Herodias, his brother's wife, and because of all the evil things that Herod had done, ²⁰ added to them all by shutting up John in prison.

²¹ Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, ²² and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

SERMON Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Today is Baptism of Jesus Sunday—the Sunday we celebrate the baptism of Christ and the gift of our own baptisms. With that in mind, I share with you a story Peg and Dan Chamberlin tucked in their Christmas card to our family years ago:

Three buildings in town were overrun by squirrels—the town hall, the hardware store, and the church. The town hall brought in some cats. But after they tore up all the files, the mayor got rid of the predators, and soon the squirrels were back. The hardware store humanely trapped the squirrels and set them free outside town. But three days later, the squirrels climbed back in. Only the church came up with an effective solution. They baptized the squirrels and made them members. Now, the church only sees the squirrels on Christmas and Easter!

We laugh, but we are also a bit chilled by the painful realities of discipleship and ministry in mainline Protestant churches. For indeed, church membership and even Christianity itself is far too often seen and lived as a hobby rather than as a radical call to new life in Christ. We baptize our young, we confirm our youth, we marry and bury, but for many folk regular worship, daily prayer, regular mission outreach, generous stewardship and daily discipleship are not even on life's radar screens.

Today's Gospel lesson tells us it doesn't need to be that way. In fact, when we dig deeply into today's particular story, we find ourselves surprised by what we do NOT hear. If I were to ask you, "Who baptized Jesus?", my guess is that most of you would answer, "John the Baptist."

If we look carefully at the Gospel of Luke, we hear about John the Baptist baptizing with water and prophetically calling out the One who will baptize with the Holy Spirit. The story then jumps PAST Jesus' actual baptism and we hear, Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized.

Do you see what is missing? The Gospel of Luke tells nothing about Jesus going down into and coming up out of the water. We can assume John did the baptizing, since that is what we hear in the other gospels, but somehow it seems that the writer of Luke isn't concerned with that detail. What IS given prominence is what happened AFTER Jesus was baptized. What is important is NOT the event of Jesus' baptism, but how that baptism shaped the rest of his life.

After the Holy Spirit descended—we heard today—in the bodily form like a dove—there came a voice from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." In Luke's account, there is no indication that anyone but Jesus heard the voice of God speaking from the heavens above. In the moment of baptism, the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus, calling him God's beloved.

Throughout the Gospel of Luke and its sister book the Acts of the Apostles, we see the Holy Spirit pouring upon Jesus and later in Acts the pouring upon believers soon after Jesus' resurrection and ascension to heaven. The unnamed writer of Luke and Acts clearly wanted believers to know the power of the Holy Spirit in both Jesus' life and their own lives.

And what of us? How can we transform our Sunday-morning Christianity to an on-fire Spirit-filled transformative faith? The answer is both simple and profound: through service in the name of Jesus. By finding our life's purpose through serving others.

Indeed, baptism is the beginning of our call to ministry as Christians. And perhaps here is the secret—when we emerge from the waters and

begin to do ministry (to bind up the brokenhearted, to support the weak, to help the afflicted), we place ourselves in the unique position to watch the heavens open up and a voice say,

"This is my son/This is my daughter with whom I am well pleased."

So how do we even begin to figure out what God is calling us to do? How do we discern what is our call/ministry? Rev. Peter Bankson of the Seekers Church in Washington DC has some answers. When you discover that ministry is the joy that keeps you running long after your lungs and legs are ready to quit, then I would say that is a "call." If it is good news to others and you are willing to do it for their sake, maybe that is "ministry." Moreover, if it is good news to others but a burden to you, I would call it a "chore."

Not a bad description: If your task brings you joy, it is a calling. If it brings good news to others and you are ready to share that good news, it is ministry. If your task if a burden, it becomes merely a chore.

In this new year, in this new season, in this new life in which we emerge from the waters: think for a moment—what brings you joy? What energizes you? What makes you willing to go that extra mile? As baptized, beloved children of God, the very foundation of our lives is anchored in finding and living out our calling. Perhaps it is working with children. Perhaps your calling is prayer. Perhaps it is farming—providing food for others. Perhaps your call is to ease suffering. Perhaps your call is to make music. I cannot tell you what God is calling you to do and be, but my suspicion is you KNOW in the depths of your soul that which brings you joy.

Once you have discovered that which brings you joy: do it! Do it again and again and again. Share that joy with others. And when you do, God's light will shine in you for all the world to see.

Here is the good news for us today, because we are baptized into the Body of Christ, we are invited to prayerfully consider not only God's call to us as individuals, but also God's call to us as a congregation. Who and what is God calling St. Paul United Church of Christ to be? What joyful ministry can we share with the community? What is the good news that we alone can offer to a hurting world?

We are a congregation baptized for mission beyond these walls. We are a congregation of radical hospitality—welcoming all who come to us.

We are a congregation with a passion for children and youth—growing disciples of Christ in all ages. Friends, we are all these and much, much more. For when our joyful calls collide and combine with one another's, God makes our congregation into a new creation, a light to the nations, the salt of the earth.

The heavens have been ripped wide open. God is speaking (and is still speaking) to us. Let us open our ears and our hearts to God's call, God's grace, and God's love. Amen.


