

- Why do you think the psalmist encourages us to wait for God's presence in silence? (Psalm 62:5)



Read: 1 Corinthians 7:29-35.

The lectionary text ends at verse 31, but without verses 32-35, the heart of Paul's thought can be missed. Paul originally anticipated that Christ's return would happen in his own lifetime. Attention to marital matters, grief over the death of a loved one, concern for possessions, and daily schedules and responsibilities detract from the higher attention to "devotion to the Lord" (v. 35). What is helpful for us today is to be reminded that routine tasks can dominate our thoughts and we can miss the greater joy and calm that is ours through Christ. Our lives are finally, not measured by the demands of the day but by the steadfast love and faithfulness of God that is shown to us in Christ Jesus our Lord. Yes, be responsible for the sake of the love of neighbor, but do not be defined by any accomplishments or failures. Be known, understood, and loved as a child of the risen Lord. Then we are able to hear the heart of Paul's message in verse 32: "I want you to be free from anxieties." Be free, be attentive, be faithful, and, of course, experience God's grace, mercy, and peace, not anxiety or fear. Indeed, isn't this part of what Simon and Andrew and James and John experienced when they walked away from the beach to follow Jesus in Mark 1:14-20? When have you been able to let go of anxiety because of the greater good that God has in store for you?

Pray: God of yesterday, today, and tomorrow, give us peace to see you in the midst of all things, and let us be devoted to you through Christ our Lord. Amen.

# SERVIC

There is much anxiety in people's lives. Seek out someone you know who is experiencing frustrations or worries. Take time to listen to them and offer them a prayer of hope and comfort.

### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**







CHILDREN'S MOMENT:

This week in your packets you should have received fish stickers. Our Sunday School families should have received the card game Go Fish.

Have you ever played Go Fish? It's been years since I've played, but I grew up playing this card game with my brothers and sisters.

The game goes like this: each person playing is given between five and seven cards to begin. The goal is to get the most matches possible generally from other people, sometimes from the rest of the cards of the deck. For example, if I wanted to collect 8's, I might say, "Pastor Dee, do you have any 8's?" If Dee does, she has to give them to me. If she does not, she says, "Go fish!" Then I pick the top card off the remaining deck.

The game goes around and around until all the cards are in play. The person with the most sets/matches of cards wins the game.

In today's New Testament Lesson, Jesus tells the disciples to, "Go fish!" He didn't mean they should get cards from each other. He didn't even mean that they should continue to fish for fish in the sea. Instead, as Jesus' disciples, they are now to fish for people.

Jesus' instruction to Go Fish is not just something for disciples 2000 years ago. That instruction is for us today. When Jesus tells you to Go Fish—that might mean sending a card to someone who is lonely. It might mean calling a friend who is in quarantine. It might mean dropping off cookies on someone's front porch. It might mean praying for healing in the midst of this pandemic.

We go fishing each and every time we share Jesus' love with others. Go Fish is not just a children's card game. It is a way of life. Amen.

We ask your healing light shine on those who are sick, those who have tested positive, those who are dealing with catastrophic diagnoses and those who are grieving. May we be bearers of your healing light to those around us.

Holy God, hear us now as we lift up to you the prayers of our hearts. SILENCE

God of Grace and God of Glory, we thank you for hearing our prayers and for answering us in surprising and life-filled ways.

For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen. OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Isaiah 6:1-8

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. <sup>2</sup> Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. <sup>3</sup> And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

<sup>4</sup> The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. <sup>5</sup> And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

<sup>6</sup> Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. <sup>7</sup> The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." <sup>8</sup> Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 5:1-11 (The Message) Once when Jesus was standing on the shore of Lake Gennesaret, the crowd was pushing in on him to better hear the Word of God. He noticed two boats tied up. The fishermen had just left them and were out scrubbing their nets. He climbed into the boat that was Simon's and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Sitting there, using the boat for a pulpit, he taught the crowd.

<sup>4</sup> When he finished teaching, he said to Simon, "Push out into deep water and let your nets out for a catch."

<sup>5-7</sup> Simon said, "Master, we've been fishing hard all night and haven't caught even a minnow. But if you say so, I'll let out the nets." It was no sooner said than done—a huge haul of fish, straining the nets past capacity. They waved to their partners in the other boat to come help them. They filled both boats, nearly swamping them with the catch.

<sup>8-10</sup> Simon Peter, when he saw it, fell to his knees before Jesus. "Master, leave. I'm a sinner and can't handle this holiness. Leave me to myself." When they pulled in that catch of fish, awe overwhelmed Simon and everyone with him. It was the same with James and John, Zebedee's sons, coworkers with Simon.

<sup>10-11</sup> Jesus said to Simon, "There is nothing to fear. From now on you'll be fishing for men and women." They pulled their boats up on the beach, left them, nets and all, and followed him.

### RESPONSE

#### Leader: The word of God for the people of God! People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God!

SERMON Catching People Rev. Becky Erb Strang The imagery is nearly overwhelming, the language vivid, the implications both powerful and frightening. The sixth chapter of the book of Isaiah begins with:

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord, sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple.

Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said:

Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts.

The whole earth is full of his glory.

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke.

Whew! On a Sunday when we reflect on our own call by God, Isaiah's experience is both glorious and awe-inspiring.

My guess is that very few of us have experienced God's call like Isaiah did. My guess is that very few of us, when God calls us to serve, are surrounded by seraphs, music, and earthquakes. My guess is that, for most of us, being called by God is much more ordinary, but possibly just as frightening.

For some of us, God's call comes in an idea that has grabbed hold of our imagination. For some of us, God's call is a nighttime dream groping for sunlight. For some of us, God's call is a rock and roll song, a symphony's concerto, or the music heard in the rustling of leaves in a tree. For others, God's call comes from the gut—a passion for justice, a passion for knowledge, a passion for expanded horizons.

In many ways, we are like the fishermen in the Gospel of Luke who worked without success throughout the night. We are so busy mending our nets, cleaning our boats, and planning our next excursion that Jesus has to <u>step smack dab</u> into the middle of our boats and into our hearts for us to even take notice.

And when we do notice that Christ is on the boat with us, we often find ourselves in Simon Peter's shoes, falling at Jesus' feet, utterly aware of our unworthiness, feeling frightened and overwhelmed by the call. After all, why would God want to call ME? Isn't there someone else around who can do the job better, more efficiently, more lovingly? What can <u>I</u> offer?

God's call can be daunting, if one is not ready to say YES to it. On a personal note, I went out of my way to avoid God's call to ordained ministry. I first heard the call in high school—and I can guarantee that like Isaiah and Simon Peter—I was overwhelmed. But UNLIKE Isaiah and Peter, I did everything in my power to avoid the call: I got mad at God. I was mad at the church, I refused to go to seminary. I did not think I was ready to say YES to God—after all, what would it mean for my life?

But, God has a sense of humor. To avoid God's call—I found a job I loved, working in a church! (Go figure!). And even when I was ready for seminary, I went swearing aloud to anyone who would listen that I was not there to learn to serve a church or certainly never to preach. Yet somewhere in the midst of avoiding the call, I kept turning back to God until I finally said, "YES!" with my heart and my life.

There is comfort in knowing that my experience—that our experiences—of God's call are universal. When the prophet Isaiah had his awesome vision of God in the Temple, he cried out, "Woe is me! I am lost! I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

There are times when each of us has cried out: Woe is me! I am lost! For I am a man, a woman, a youth, a child of unclean lips. Surely God does not have work for me! After all, I am not up to the job!

As children of God, as heirs of the Reformation, ours is a faith of the priesthood of all believers. God's call is not exclusive to clergy, Sunday

school teachers, elders and deacons. God calls each of us to live with Jesus on our boat, steering us into deeper, uncharted waters.

This is what God's call is like: we find ourselves saying "YES" to God against all odds. It is when we say YES to God that we find that God calls us to a new way of living, a new way of thinking, a new way of ordering our lives. We discover that, although the winds of death and sickness may swirl around us, God's call to life, God's call to laugh, God's call to share our lives with others is stronger than death itself.

This, my friends, is the gift of grace. Isaiah, when told his ministry would be one of destruction and desolation did not say, "How can this be, Lord?" Instead, he said, "How long?" In his gut—the place of call—Isaiah knew that God would be with him through the pain of hardened hearts and emptiness in the land.

The gift of grace was also given to Jesus' new disciples. In Luke's telling of the story, Jesus did not say, "Follow me." That was already a guarantee. Instead, he said, "There is nothing to fear. From now on you'll be fishing for men and women."

Jesus' promise is for us also: There is nothing to fear. When we say YES to Jesus, our life's job description may change; our focus in life will most certainly shift. We may be embarking on a frightening journey, but we will not be alone.

God calls us to a variety of ministries in a variety of settings. We are not promised safety and security in the call. We are, however, promised God's presence with us as we welcome Jesus onto our boat and into our lives. We are promised that—though the waters seem unfriendly and dangerous—the bounty of God's harvest is sure.

God's call comes to us in surprising ways: through a whisper in the night, through a song that grabs our hearts, through the encouragement of friends. God's call may come like Isaiah's—in the Temple surrounded by images of the mysterious and the holy. Or perhaps God's call may come as you go about your daily life—fishing, living, serving, and loving others.

As we move through these months of pandemic, my prayer is that each of us will answer YES to God's call in our lives.

Then, we will be able—like Isaiah—to say to God: Here I am! Send me!
