





NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 7:1-17 (The Message)

When he finished speaking to the people, he entered Capernaum. A Roman captain there had a servant who was on his deathbed. He prized him highly and didn't want to lose him. When he heard Jesus was back, he sent leaders from the Jewish community asking him to come and heal his servant. They came to Jesus and urged him to do it, saying, "He deserves this. He loves our people. He even built our meeting place."

6-8 Jesus went with them. When he was still quite far from the house, the captain sent friends to tell him, "Master, you don't have to go to all this trouble. I'm not that good a person, you know. I'd be embarrassed for you to come to my house, even embarrassed to come to you in person. Just give the order and my servant will get well. I'm a man under orders; I also give orders. I tell one soldier, 'Go,' and he goes; another, 'Come,' and he comes; my slave, 'Do this,' and he does it."

⁹⁻¹⁰ Taken aback, Jesus addressed the accompanying crowd: "I've yet to come across this kind of simple trust anywhere in Israel, the very people who are supposed to know about God and how he works." When the messengers got back home, they found the servant up and well.

¹¹⁻¹⁵ Not long after that, Jesus went to the village Nain. His disciples were with him, along with quite a large crowd. As they approached the village gate, they met a funeral procession—a woman's only son was being carried out for burial. And the mother was a widow. When Jesus saw her, his heart broke. He said to her, "Don't cry." Then he went over and touched the coffin. The pallbearers stopped. He said, "Young man, I tell you: Get up." The dead son sat up and began talking. Jesus presented him to his mother.

¹⁶⁻¹⁷ They all realized they were in a place of holy mystery, that God was at work among them. They were quietly worshipful—and then noisily

grateful, calling out among themselves, "God is back, looking to the needs of his people!" The news of Jesus spread all through the country.

SERMON Rev. Becky Erb Strang

I've traveled a fair amount in my lifetime, but I have a confession to make: I absolutely stink at geography. In school: high school, college and even seminary I would gloss over any readings that included geographical markers. They just never made enough sense to me and I arrogantly figured I didn't need to know the geography to understand the text/story anyway.

That is my confession, but I AM getting better. And in terms of biblical texts, my two trips to Israel have helped enormously. In today's New Testament Lesson, we hear of two different villages: Capernaum and Nain. I've been to Capernaum twice—a tiny village on the north end of the Sea of Galilee—it is the village that Jesus called home once he left Nazareth to begin his public ministry. If you were to read through the four gospels this afternoon you would find that Jesus performs a lot of miracles in and around Capernaum. Capernaum was also the home of nearly half of Jesus' disciples, including Simon Peter.

Capernaum, as a word, means "City of Comfort" and I can fully imagine that Jesus' presence in this tiny fishing village brought both comfort AND challenge to the residents.

In the first part of today's reading, Jesus has just entered Capernaum. He is quickly approached by some Jewish elders who've been sent on behalf of a Roman captain, a Gentile whose servant was near death. Jesus agreed immediately to going to the officer's house and was met partway there by the captain's friends who told Jesus he did not expect the Messiah to come to his home, but just to heal his servant from afar.

Jesus, who heard this Gentile's faith in Jesus' ability to heal was amazed. And he even declared of his own religious kin, "I've yet to come across this kind of simple trust anywhere in Israel, the very people who

are supposed to know about God and how he works." In no time at all, his servant was healed.

The second story in today's reading takes place "not long after that", but I did the math on this. The bringing back to life of the widow's son took place in the village of Nain, some 12 ½ miles south of Nazareth and a full 34 miles from Capernaum. (Keep in mind that, in Jesus's time, most people traveled by foot—and covering about 20 miles a day was considered the limit. So for Jesus to get from the seaside village of Capernaum to the more arid landscape beyond Jesus' childhood hometown, he would have had to walk steadily for at least a day and a half.)

But that seems to be exactly what happened. Jesus and his disciples and a large crowd traveled to Nain. Before Jesus and his followers even got inside the city gates, a dead man was being carried out for burial followed by the grieving mother, and a large crowd of supporters. Jesus, deeply moved by the mother's sorrow, went over to the litter carrying the body and said, "Young man, I tell you: Get up."

Of course, you know how that turned out. The dead man sat up and began to speak. The scriptures tell us that the bystanders were both fearful and amazed by what had transpired. They began praising God and declaring Jesus to be a great prophet.

Both of the stories in our New Testament Lesson move us from death to life. Both of today's stories begin with death or near death. It is almost as if we have been invited to a New Orleans Jazz Funeral.

A Jazz Funeral begins by playing solemn music and dirges for the one who has died—with musicians and mourners walking together to the cemetery. Then, once the last "amen" has been pronounced at the cemetery, the band breaks into joyful music of celebration and resurrection. There is even what is called the "Second Line"—the friends of the deceased who follow behind the family and band members. Once the celebratory music begins, the Second Line whip out colorful scarves, handkerchiefs, and umbrellas that become props in the joyous dance.

Both of our stories from Luke could have concluded with a Jazz Funeral's air of celebration. In the first story, a Gentile officer is declared to have more faith than the Jews, thus bringing healing to his servant. In the second story, Jesus simply touches the funeral stretcher and says,

"Get up!" And what do you know? The young man sits up and begins to speak. Jesus joyfully presents him to his mother while the crowds have already shifted from their dirges to songs of joy.

In this second story, the mother did not ask for her son to be brought back to life. Nor do we hear that her faith brought about the miracle like we heard with the Roman captain. NOR do we hear any words of thanksgiving from the mother or son. Pure and simply, this miracle is one of un-earned and un-asked for grace.

Think for a moment about your own life. When have you experienced the miracle of unearned grace? When have you been suddenly thrust out of your mourning and into singing songs of joy? When has the risen Christ awakened you from your slumber?

This, my friends, is where the rubber meets the road. Jesus comes to us (every single one of us) with compassion in his eyes. When Christ meets and greets us, we can choose to wrap our funeral clothes even more tightly around ourselves OR we can throw aside our mourning clothes and begin to dance for joy. The choice is ours to make.

Let me say that again: you have the choice on how you can live your life: wrapped in sorrow and the dirges of mourning OR singing and dancing and offering joyful praises to God in the assurance that, because of Jesus, death never ever has the final say. Because of Jesus, we can experience life abundant right here, right now. For here is the deal: many of us choose the funeral dirge for our lives—choosing to focus on misfortune and bumps in the road and loss rather than celebrating the many blessings that are ours and ours to share with others.

Friends, hear me well: Last year and this year have been filled with death. It is right and proper that we grieve the loss of our loved ones, that we allow space for people to grieve. And yet: because of Jesus, our grief is layered with hope: hope in the resurrection. Hope in love winning the day. Hope in heaven here on earth and beyond the grave.

These scripture stories aren't just for you and for me. If we choose to dance and sing joyfully through life, we are called to do it in a way that welcomes others into the joyful celebration. We are called to feed the hungry, house the homeless, offer peace to those with hardened hearts and hope to those who cannot see beyond the next hour. In other words, we need to bring the Jazz Band everywhere we go and with everything

we do so that others will be restored by the love of God and join in the singing.

What can you do this week to bring joy to someone? What can you do this week to mend a broken relationship? What can you do this week to bring laughter—gut-busting laughter—back into your life?

Both of today's healing miracles came about in different ways. The captain's servant knew healing because of the faith of his master. The son of the widow knew life again simply because Jesus commanded it.

This tells us we need to approach our Christian journey in two different, yet complementary directions. First—we are called to place our entire trust and faith in God, knowing that he is in charge and that he loves each of us beyond measure. Second, we need to be open to unearned and unexpected grace. Just as sure as the snow will melt and spring flowers will emerge, so too does God's grace shower upon us when we least expect it and when we have done nothing to make it happen. Again—because God loves you and me and all of humankind (and all of creation) beyond measure.

So this is my challenge to you today: Live today fully. Welcome the grace that knocks on your door and upon your funeral dirge. Accept new life in Christ Jesus from this moment forward. And, do not forget to pack your party clothes: for you never know when Jesus will show up and turn the funeral procession into a street party of joy. Amen.


