We don't all need to be mega-churches. Smaller, more intimate setting can be welcoming to newcomers.

A quicker, lighter footprint.

Be willing to try new things along the way.

Value online relationships as real relationships.

Churches that are not online beyond a website are going to miss the boat.

An openness to questions.

Embrace questions and a diversity of backgrounds.

A high value on experimentation.

Experimentation accelerates change and flexibility.

Prioritizing a "for" you, not "from" you culture.

Talk less about what people can give to the church and more about how Christianity can impact lives for people—financial balance, generosity, the joy of serving, better lives, following Jesus.

A tailored experience, not a tailored message.

Churches that decide they will hold the message of Jesus sacred, but tailor the experience to an ever-shifting culture, will be more effective.

56th ANNUAL MEETING NORTHWEST OHIO ASSOCIATION

On April 27, 2019, the 56th Annual Meeting of the NWOA was held at First United Church of Christ in Galion, Ohio, Rev. Darrin Harvey Senior pastor. The NWOA is a community of 72 local churches and pastors working together and supporting one another to strengthen the ministry and mission of Jesus Christ. Our strength is our connection. Meetings begin and end with worship. Singing is always spirit filled. This gathering is a chance to get to know other pastors and members of UCC churches. It is a closeness that reinforces the thought that we are not alone in our mission and our love of Jesus Christ and his teachings.

Highlights of the annual meeting include the following:

(If you are interested in learning more, a book will be made available, in the church office, detailing all that our association is doing.)

- Keynote speaker Donaldson Hill independent Consultant for Faith Communities
- Treasurer's Report: "2018 has been a good year. Figures reflect a small positive growth."
- 5 for 5 churches: (We are one of them). Forty churches gave to five UCC sponsored missions: OCWM, One Great Hour of Sharing, Strengthen the Church, Neighbors in Need & Christmas Fund.

- Eleven persons have been approved as Members in Discernment. These are persons in the NWOA who feel the call to authorized ministry in the UCC. Katherine Jackson (Katy is one of them). They receive support and help from this group on their journey. Five are waiting as funds are not available.
- Camp Templed Hills is ready for campers. This year there will be a partnership between Outdoor Ministries and Disaster Ministries. Disaster kits will be stored here to have them ready when needed. Our church, St. Paul UCC, donated 42 personal care kits and 10 cleaning buckets.
- An opportunity to learn more about the activities, missions, and faith based programs of our church were presented in the form of eight forums. (Our partnership with the El Salvador Synod was one of them).
- Recognized Mission Partners of the Association are: Back Bay Mission, CROSSROAD, EMMAUS HOMES, GRACE Community Center, Hope Homes Foundation, Inc., Insurance Board, Toledo Campus Ministry, United Church Homes, Uplands Village and El Salvador.

PASTOR BECKY'S REPORT

VITAL VINTAGE CHURCH (CHAPTERS SEVEN AND EIGHT)

Chapter Seven: Making "Welcome" an Active Verb

Despite what we say about our welcoming values, so much of how Vintage Churches behave says that "welcoming the stranger among us" is a peripheral issue. It is not. It is our only hope to survive, let alone thrive, very far into the 21st century. (79)

Study after study shows, however, that 80 percent of those who visit a church come because someone has invited them. (81)

Every church needs a communication team whose orientation is to connect with those who do not already attend. From branding, to marketing, to publicity, every aspect of communication should be crafted with guests in mind. (81)

Look at your website, or, better yet, find some people who don't go to any church to look at your website. Do the same with your Facebook page, and your use of Twitter and Instagram. If those are not evangelism tools your church uses aggressively then your welcome is inauthentic. (82)

Once you have made collecting information from guests a priority, it is critical that you have a systematic way to enter the information, as soon after church as possible, into a responsive database. You then can generate a list and send them an email that very day. A letter with a brochure about the church and perhaps a small gift should be sent on Monday. Every day you delay diminishes the likelihood of their return. (87)

Your database needs to be able to tell you instantly who is there for the first time, and you need a system for responding when a person visits for the third time. (87)

Your database also needs to tell you when a person has missed three Sundays in a row. (87)

Chapter Eight: From Survive to Thrive

During the course of worship, we should laugh, sometimes raucously; weep so openly that each pew should have a small box of Kleenex; applaud vigorously, sometimes the announcements, sometimes the music, sometimes even the sermon. (90)

The point is that a vital church is energetic and passionate about who it has been called to be and what it has been called to do. (91)

Ultimately we must offer our members information that will enhance their spiritual lives. We must help them learn spiritual principles for living their lives. (99)

Did you know? Crossroad provides quality services in four focus areas:

- Residential treatment and shelter care
- Alternative education
- Outpatient counseling
- Community and home based services

Daily, Crossroad serves hundreds of children through our services, including:

- 45 residential clients
- 138 outpatient clients

- 29 alternative education clients
- 70 community or home based clients

Sadly, young people today arrive at Crossroad facing a number of traumatizing factors in their lives. Recent statistics for children in our psychiatric residential facility revealed:

- 44% witnessed domestic violence
- 50% are victims of parental neglect
- 47% are victims of sexual abuse
- 50% are special education students
- 40% have Parental Rights Terminated
- 67% are victims of physical abuse
- 50% have a parent with a psychiatric diagnosis
- 55% have an incarcerated parent

However, we are proud of our children's success!

- 92.86% of the children in our intensive residential program successfully complete treatment and have a planned, positive discharge. The state outcomes benchmark is 71.85%.
- 80% of clients in our community based programs successfully complete treatment and have a planned, positive discharge. The state outcomes program benchmark = 64%.
- 85% of children receiving outpatient counseling complete their treatment plan and have a planned, positive discharge. The state outcomes benchmark is 53.5%.
- 87% of students in our alternative education program achieve educational success (defined as improvements in attendance, achievement, and behavior.) The state outcomes program benchmark = 53.6%.
