CHILDREN'S MOMENT: HOMEMADE PINWHEELS!

At Pentecost, we celebrate the Holy Spirit in our lives. In both the Greek and Hebrew, the word for "spirit" is also the word for "wind" and "breath."

This week, we encourage you to make your own pinwheel. Once you are done, blow your breath upon it to make it spin OR take it outside and run while the wind spins it!

Let us pray: Spirit of the Living God, we thank you for filling us with your love, your peace and your joy. Be with us this week as we listen for your Spirit, your whispered word, in our lives. Amen.

How to Make the Easy Pinwheel Read all of the steps before starting.

Step 1: Project Preparation

Gather the materials needed for making a pinwheel. If you are doing this project with a group of children, pre-cut the 6" (15 cm) paper squares.

Step 2: Cut Square

Step 3: Cut

Use the pencil and ruler to draw two diagonal lines, corner-to-corner, that cross at the square's center. Mark the center point and mark a point 2¾" (7 cm) from each corner on the diagonal line.

Cut on the diagonal line from each corner up to the marked point. Erase pencil marks, except for the center point.


Step 4: Assemble

- Using the straight pin, punch a hole in the center and at every other point (about ¼" from the tip.)
- Poke the pin through one of the point holes and curl the point toward the center. Don't fold!
- Curl each pierced point, in turn, toward the center and poke the pin through the holes.
- Push the pin through the center hole of the pinwheel.
- Holding the pencil on a flat surface with one hand, push the pin into the side of the eraser.

Step 5: Finish

You now have a pinwheel! Hold the pinwheel in your hand and swish it around. The pinwheel should rotate on the pin. Take the pinwheel outside on a breezy day and see it whirl like crazy!

Tip: If your pinwheel doesn't rotate freely, it is probably rubbing against the pencil. You can fix this problem by inserting the pin into the eraser at a slight upward angle, or by slipping a small bead onto the pin before inserting it into the eraser.




Cut a 6" (15 cm) square of paper.

Tip: Two-sided pinwheels can be made by gluing two printed squares back-to-back, or by printing on both sides of heavy paper (24- or 32-pound).



















PASTORAL JOYS AND CONCERNS OF THE PEOPLE

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Ezekiel 37:1-14. (From Eugene Peterson's <u>The Message</u>)

God grabbed me. God's Spirit took me up and set me down in the middle of an open plain strewn with bones. He led me around and among them—a lot of bones! There were bones all over the plain—dry bones, bleached by the sun.

- ³ He said to me, "Son of man, can these bones live?" I said, "Master God, only you know that."
- ⁴ He said to me, "Prophesy over these bones: 'Dry bones, listen to the Message of God!"
- ⁵⁻⁶ God, the Master, told the dry bones, "Watch this: I'm bringing the breath of life to you and you'll come to life. I'll attach sinews to you, put meat on your bones, cover you with skin, and breathe life into you. You'll come alive and you'll realize that I am God!"
- ⁷⁻⁸ I prophesied just as I'd been commanded. As I prophesied, there was a sound and, oh, rustling! The bones moved and came together, bone to bone. I kept watching. Sinews formed, then muscles on the bones, then skin stretched over them. But they had no breath in them.
- ⁹ He said to me, "Prophesy to the breath. Prophesy, son of man. Tell the breath, 'God, the Master, says, Come from the four winds. Come, breath. Breathe on these slain bodies. Breathe life!"
- ¹⁰ So I prophesied, just as he commanded me. The breath entered them and they came alive! They stood up on their feet, a huge army.
- ¹¹ Then God said to me, "Son of man, these bones are the whole house of Israel. Listen to what they're saying: 'Our bones are dried up, our hope is gone, there's nothing left of us.'

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Acts 2:1-21 (from Eugene Peterson's <u>The Message</u>)

When the Feast of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Without warning there was a sound like a strong wind, gale force—no one could tell where it came from. It filled the whole building. Then, like a wildfire, the Holy Spirit spread through their ranks, and they started speaking in a number of different languages as the Spirit prompted them. ⁵⁻¹¹ There were many Jews staying in Jerusalem just then, devout pilgrims from all over the world. When they heard the sound, they came on the run. Then when they heard, one after another, their own mother tongues being spoken, they were thunderstruck. They couldn't for the life of them figure out what was going on, and kept saying, "Aren't these all Galileans? How come we're hearing them talk in our various mother tongues?

Parthians, Medes, and Elamites;

Visitors from Mesopotamia, Judea, and Cappadocia,

Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia,

Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene;

Immigrants from Rome, both Jews and proselytes;

Even Cretans and Arabs!

"They're speaking our languages, describing God's mighty works!"

¹² Their heads were spinning; they couldn't make head or tail of any of it.

They talked back and forth, confused: "What's going on here?"

¹³ Others joked, "They're drunk on cheap wine."

That's when Peter stood up and, backed by the other eleven, spoke out with bold urgency: "Fellow Jews, all of you who are visiting Jerusalem, listen carefully and get this story straight. These people aren't drunk as some of you suspect. They haven't had time to get drunk—it's only nine o'clock in the morning. This is what the prophet Joel announced would happen:

"In the Last Days," God says,

"I will pour out my Spirit

on every kind of people:

Your sons will prophesy,

also your daughters;

Your young men will see visions,

your old men dream dreams.

When the time comes,

I'll pour out my Spirit

On those who serve me, men and women both,

and they'll prophesy.

I'll set wonders in the sky above

and signs on the earth below,

Blood and fire and billowing smoke,

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Pentecost: My all-time favorite church holiday. The birthday of the church. The coming of the Holy Spirit. The wind of God blowing over the face of the waters at the moment of creation and continuing today. The sending out of disciples (that means us!) to share God's message of love with the world.

Both of today's readings: Old and New Testament are Spirit-filled stories. In the first, the prophet Ezekiel is given a vision of dry, bleached bones. While Ezekiel was watching, God breathed life into those bones—and they were enfleshed and alive: a metaphor that reminds us that God breathes life into our grief, our dry times, our isolation and loneliness, and our times when we are lost in the desert.

The story of Acts of the Apostles is the Pentecost story. If you were in my confirmation classes, you would read this story NO LESS THAN THREE TIMES over the course of the year. The Pentecost story is that important for disciples, for Christians, for those of us who love Jesus and love the church.

In the Pentecost story, the Jesus people were hanging out in Jerusalem, wondering what was next. Jesus had been raised from the dead. He had walked among them. Then, he ascended into heaven. The disciples were wondering, "Now what?"

To answer that question, God sent the Holy Spirit into the room of believers, touching them with a mighty wind and with flames of fire. Suddenly, these Galilean men were able to speak in languages from all over the world. And what did they do? They hit the highways and bi-ways to carry the message of new life in Jesus all over the world. They were on-fire for Jesus. They went out to change the world.

That is exactly what Pentecost does to us. We are reminded on this holy day, this holiday, that God fills us with his Spirit—sending us out to make a difference in the lives of others. Sharing Jesus' love with others. Breathing new life into that which has become stale and lifeless.

I have to say, I'm glad that Pentecost has landed in the midst of Covid19—serving as a powerful reminder that the Holy Spirit fills each of us in different ways to serve others in the midst of this global crisis. Here are some examples of what people are doing to make a difference (big and small!) while Covid19 rages around us:

- 1. Health care workers, custodians, grocery store clerks and stock people are risking their lives each day to keep us healthy and fed. This week I encourage you to send a card or call/video chat with one of these front-line saints.
- 2. People are donating their time and resources to keep front-line people fed in this crisis. Even here. Our area food banks and our

- own Blessing Pantry work each day to make sure no one in our communities is hungry. With so many people out of work, food insecurity has risen exponentially.
- 3. Making masks! I know I've mentioned this before, but the thousands upon thousands of masks that are being sewn in living rooms, dining rooms and basements in communities all over our country to offer another layer of protection from this deadly virus.
- 4. Landlords throughout our nation have suspended rent payments, giving families and individuals a little more cushion each month.
- 5. Teachers and non-teachers alike have created online educational resources for children and adults. Free online art classes are everywhere. Museums are offering virtual tours. In the midst of the trauma of this virus, our hearts are being fed beauty.
- 6. Similarly, musicians are offering free living room concerts online to share their music and provide much-needed respite.
- 7. This pandemic has been devastating for people already suffering from mental illness. Counselors, doctors and therapists have been meeting with clients through FaceTime or Zoom to reach out to people struggling emotionally with the trauma around us.
- 8. People are simply staying at home. For here is the truth: isolating and quarantining ourselves is an act of love for our grandparents, those with pre-existing illnesses, and those who are essential workers. We stay home in order to keep this dreaded disease from gaining even greater footholds.

That is what Pentecost is all about my friends: Stepping up to the plate when a pandemic knocks us down, forcing us to see our world in new ways. Pentecost is about people so filled with the Holy Spirit that they were on-fire to share the love of Jesus beyond their own neighborhoods. Sometimes sharing Jesus' love can be as difficult as going to work each day at a hospital or nursing home or as simple as staying at home that others might live.

Jen Hatmaker in her book <u>Interrupted: When Jesus Wrecks Your Comfortable Christianity:</u> "I want the church to be great because we fed hungry mommas and their babies. I'd like it to be great because we battled poverty not just with our money, but our hands and hearts. I desire the greatness that comes from seeking not only mercy but justice for

those caught in a system with trapdoors. I hope to be part of a great movement with the Holy Spirit, who injects supernatural wind and fire into his mission. My version of great will come when others are scratching their heads and saying, "Wow, you live a really different life." (pg. 83)

Similarly, Hugh Halter and Matt Smay (<u>The Tangible Kingdom: Creating Incarnational Community</u>): "Church must not be the goal of the gospel anymore. Church should not be the focus of our efforts or the banner we hold up to explain what we are about. Church should be what ends up happening as a natural response to people wanting to follow us, be with us, and be like us as we are following the way of Christ." (pg. 203)

For us to live as Pentecost people, filled with the Holy Spirit, our lives need to be transformed in dynamic and powerful ways. If nothing else, this pandemic has reinforced this: the old ways are not working. We need to find new, innovative and relational ways to meet the needs of this extraordinary and difficult time. Because of Pentecost, WE are the ones Jesus calls to serve a hurting world. WE are the ones the Holy Spirit gifts to make a difference in the lives of others.

My friends, Jen Hatmaker is right. Our comfortable Christianity has been wrecked not only by Covid19 but also by the power of the Holy Spirit. We need to be on-fire as we spread Jesus' love and justice in the days and weeks to come. Even when we return to worshiping in person, in the sanctuary or chapel, things will be different. WE will be different. How we do church will be different. How we engage our community will be different.

That's not necessarily a bad thing. Our comfortable Christianity HAS been wrecked, but we are people of the resurrection. We are Easter people. We anchor our lives on Christ's promise of new and the power of the Holy Spirit to create a new and dynamic community based on love, forgiveness, grace and justice.

The Holy Spirit is calling your name. How will you answer?
