WELCOME

During Lent we have taken six weeks to move through one week—the last week of Jesus' human life. This has allowed us to expand time—to "freeze frame" important moments and dig deeper into our faith story, and our own stories. Today marks the end of Lent and the beginning of Holy Week, so let us speed up time a bit as we remember the first entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem.

Call to Worship (from Chalice Worship; Disciples of Christ)

Leader: Hosanna!

People: Hosanna in the highest!

Leader: Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! People: Hosanna in the highest heaven! Praise be to God!



SETTING THE SCENE: We found our place in the parade and consider OUR place in the picture—our role as supporters of Jesus' mission in the world. Then we found ourselves in the midst of the chaos and throngs of people in Jerusalem for the Passover. We suspended action for a moment, wondering how we could join Jesus in clearing out our own lives and hearts, our own places of worship, to make them more welcoming for the love of God to reside fully. We followed Jesus as he continued to teach in the city and among people in the temple. His teachings filled our hearts as they filled those long ago, and we remembered the call to proclaim justice in the midst of injustice wherever we find it. We joined the disciples at two different meals where our assumptions about the way the world works were turned upside down.

This week we join Jesus in the Garden. Gethsemane is the moment when a chain of events begins that cannot be stopped. Once Jesus is taken into custody, there is no going back. So we pause a moment with him in the garden just before his arrest and we feel with him the temptations that arise when facing difficult circumstances—to run, hide, use whatever power we have to change things, fight it, and perhaps even bargain with God. We walk among the sleepy disciples who just cannot grasp what is about to happen.

CALL TO CONFESSION

Leader: As we enter Holy Week, we confess that we have not followed Jesus well. We confess that we live with sin and brokenness. Let us confess together.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION (in unison)

We are here, Jesus. We find ourselves alongside you in a garden of grief for the violence of so many of this world endure. We are tired. We don't know what to do next. And so we sleep sometimes, hoping to awake from a bad dream. Forgive us, O God. Help us face this hour knowing you are always with us. You only ask the same of us: to be present, to be awake. You entered our story through Jesus, now help us to enter fully into the story of your kingdom on earth as it in heaven.

SILENT CONFESSION OF SIN

ASSURANCE OF PARDON

Leader: Know this: we can open ourselves to let the story remind us that no matter what we face, or how we fail to meet the demand of the moment, second chances are possible. You are forgiven and freed by God who wants you to live fully.

People: Thanks be to God!

CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Today's story is about prayer AND it also involves a lot of action. Listen very carefully then pantomime (act out) the different actions you hear in the story. Let's enter the story.

Jesus and his disciples WALKED to a place called Gethsemane—a garden at the foot of the Mount of Olives. He told his disciples, "SIT here while I go PRAY."

Peter and two others WALKED with Jesus a little way. Then Jesus told them, "Stay here and KEEP WATCH." Then Jesus went to a spot, LAID DOWN FACE-FIRST and said to God, "My Father, if it is possible, take this cup of suffering away from me. However, not what I want, but what you want."

Jesus STOOD UP and WALKED over to the disciples. He found them SLEEPING. "Couldn't you STAY AWAKE with me for one hour?" he asked.

Two more times he WALKED over by himself. Two more times he LAID DOWN FACE-FIRST to PRAY. Two more times he STOOD UP and WALKED back to find the disciples SLEEPING.

One of Jesus' closest friends, Judas Iscariot led soldiers to the garden. As they MARCHED in, Jesus could have tried to RUN. But Jesus STOOD and said, "Friend, do what you have come to do."

Thank you for helping me tell the story. Jesus could have done things the easy way and tried to run when he had a chance. But he did not give in to temptation. Instead, he chose to do things God's way, and because he did, it would change the world.

Discussion Question: Where is a place that you feel especially close to God, a place where you can not only talk to God, but hear what God might be trying to say to you?

Children's Moment Prayer: Loving God, help us know we can always talk to you. Give us the faith to do things your way. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Mark 14:32-42

(from Eugene Peterson's The Message)

They came to an area called Gethsemane. Jesus told his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." He took Peter, James, and John with him. He plunged into a sinkhole of dreadful agony. He told them, "I feel bad enough right now to die. Stay here and keep vigil with me."

³⁵⁻³⁶ Going a little ahead, he fell to the ground and prayed for a way out: "Papa, Father, you can—can't you?—get me out of this. Take this cup away from me. But please, not what I want—what do *you* want?"

³⁷⁻³⁸ He came back and found them sound asleep. He said to Peter, "Simon, you went to sleep on me? Can't you stick it out with me a single hour? Stay alert, be in prayer, so you don't enter the danger zone without even knowing it. Don't be naive. Part of you is eager, ready for anything in God; but another part is as lazy as an old dog sleeping by the fire."

³⁹⁻⁴⁰ He then went back and prayed the same prayer. Returning, he again found them sound asleep. They simply couldn't keep their eyes open, and they didn't have a plausible excuse.

⁴¹⁻⁴² He came back a third time and said, "Are you going to sleep all night? No—you've slept long enough. Time's up. The Son of Man is about to be betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up. Let's get going. My betrayer has arrived."

RESPONSE:

Leader: The word of God for the people of God.

People: God is still speaking. Thanks be to God!

SERMON Pastor Dee Schroer

Six weeks ago we began a series of scripture lessons that walked us through the stories of Holy Week. Some we are very familiar with and some maybe not so much.

As I mention the lessons I want you to not only to think on the messages of each of these stories but be aware of the fact that Jesus knew where things were heading, he knew he would be betrayed by those closest to him, Jesus knew his time had come.

We began six weeks ago with the event we celebrate today, Jesus riding into Jerusalem, triumphantly, peacefully, on a donkey while those around him praised him and celebrated the coming of something they did not fully understand. (Mark 11:1-11)

Our second week we see a different side of Jesus, first he curses the fig tree when he is on his way to the temple, then he is passionately moved by righteous anger as drives out the money changers and those who sold the animals for sacrifice. All the while he was teaching and saying "my house shall be called a house of prayer for <u>ALL</u> the nations - but you have made it a den of robbers". (Mark 11: 12-19)

Week three -Jesus is back at the temple teaching the parable of the wicked tenants to the religious leaders who questioned his authority, and when they asked him about paying taxes he didn't miss a beat- he called them out about their questioning and said "Give to the emperor the things that are the emperors, and to God the things that are God's". (Mark 12: 1-17)

On week four we were at the house of Simon the Leper as "the woman" anointed Jesus with expensive nard. The disciples were discussing the cost of the ointment and Jesus flat out told them to leave her alone, (she gets it!) "She has anointed my body beforehand for its burial" (Mark 14:3-9)

Week five we were at the table as Jesus humbled himself and set the example for us by washing the disciple's feet at his last Passover meal. Among many other things from this lesson, Jesus tells us – "I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you" (John 13:3-16) then we heard, as our sermon, how our Splash and Jr. & Sr. High Youth Groups feel they can serve Jesus by serving others.

Today – on this day we are usually confirming, praying over and laying hands on our confirmation class, I feel many of us are entering Palm Sunday and Holy Week as Jesus entered the garden of Gethsemane- with heavy hearts that are anxious about what is going to come.

Today it feels to me that we really are entering the garden with Jesus. Just what was it that Jesus brought the disciples to the garden to do? He brought them to pray and keep watch!

And I can't help but notice who it was that Jesus brought with him as he moved deeper into the Garden. Jesus brought Peter, James and John in closer explaining to them how deeply grieved he was, "even to death".

Why does this strike me?

Because it was Peter, James and John that were with Jesus on the mountain top at the transfiguration (they were tired on the mountaintop too!) Yes- living spiritually can be exhausting! They were right there with Jesus as Moses and Elisha appeared to them and Jesus was enlightened and transfigured.

Why is it that we can be witnesses to so many miracles and examples that Jesus set for us and we still do not recognize when he is calling us to watch and be aware?

Why are we surprised and drawn into lonely and negative places when our burdens seem heavy, when we are betrayed - when we have difficulties, trials and tribulations? Is that the example Jesus set for us?

No!

Jesus rode into his tribulation with confidence and peace, he stood up for those who were being taken advantage of in the Temple and preserved their place of prayer. He spoke wisdom and truth, continued to associate with known lepers and validated the woman who anointed him. He certainly humbled himself, washing the feet of even the one he knew was about to commit the ultimate betrayal.

Jesus never ceased in praying, he had the full understanding wisdom and knowledge as he prayed that all things are possible for God! But it is not what he (Jesus) wanted but as God wants.

This is what leads us to peace and victory!

Jesus surrounded himself at all times with those, whom God gave him, even those who would betray him. Those who, in their own way, would carry on the work, ministry and truth that Jesus lived and taught.

Jesus was paraded into Jerusalem as people waved Palm brancheswhich were a symbol of victory, triumph, peace, and eternal life in the ancient Near East and Mediterranean world. ... A palm branch was awarded to victorious athletes in ancient Greece.

So why would Jesus choose the Garden of Gethsemane a garden of olive trees as the last place he takes his disciples to spend time in prayer?

When I typed Olive branch into my iPad this is what it said--

What do olive branches symbolize? The **olive branch** is a symbol of peace or victory from the customs of ancient Greece, particularly regarding supplication to both the gods and persons in power, and is found in most cultures of the Mediterranean basin.

What does the olive branch signify in the Bible? It is first mentioned in Scripture when the dove returned to Noah's ark carrying an olive branch in its beak (Gen. 8:11). Since that time, the olive branch has been a symbol of "peace" to the world, and we often hear the expression, "extending an olive branch" to another person as a desire for peace.

Why are olive trees important? Their wood is strong and resists both rot and sickness. Olive trees are important to people and other animals. They supply people with lamp oil, with a moisturizer to keep their skin healthy, and with food. Birds and other animals eat olives and scatter the seeds.

When we are at our most vulnerable it is important that we surround ourselves with God and those God puts into our lives! It is important that we follow Jesus, stay awake and aware and find those places that give us strength, have meaning, that bring us to a place of peace. Places that help us pray effectively.

Whether we are gathered or scattered we are to worship God, honor Jesus, and believe the good news of the gospel. As followers of Christ we are to Pray, Listen, Stay Awake and Aware so we can effectively Love and Serve one another as Jesus has called us to do. Amen.

We lift up in prayer those who are sick, those who are recuperating, those in need of your healing love: SILENCE

Today we pray for Christians throughout the world who are entering Holy Week, knowing that the places and spaces for worship will be different this year. Yet, we affirm this: you are our God who conquers sin and death. In the midst of death and darkness, resurrection and light will have the final word. SILENCE

We remember our brothers and sisters who have gone before us, speaking out against injustice, seeking your kingdom on earth as it in heaven. SILENCE

All of this we pray in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

Maybe it was in your backyard with friends or siblings. Do you remember running as fast you could with somebody gaining on you? Your breath was coming hard, but you kept on running. The sheer exhilaration of the race kept you going. At the finish line, you collapsed onto the grass filled with joy: this was the race you won. Giving is like that: the strange combination of effort, a painful stretching of yourself, leading to joy. Friends, give until you feel that joy. Run the race set before you. Make a difference! SHARING THE MEAL

When we "break bread" together as a church in our worship, we remember that Jesus invited folks to his table as part of his ministry, not just at the Last Supper. We so wanted to create a way for all of us to break bread together with whatever we have in our homes. Indeed, what we've asked you to do is to prepare your favorite "comfort food."

Pastor Dee and I have the table set with bread, wine, cookies and milk. Set your table as you see fit. And this you need to know: today after worship from 11:00-Noon, we will be on the sidewalks on the Herman Street side of our building to distribute communion elements.

Jesus used the parable of a great banquet to which all people are invited in order to talk about what the kingdom of God, the family of God, looks like. He said, "Go to the highways and back alleys and *urge* people to come in so that my house will be filled." He often invited the most unlikely guests to his meal-times, confounding his disciples. In this way, he was encouraging a deep love and connection beyond the social norms of the day. He knew that we humans need connection and inclusion. Jesus comforts us, saying "you have a place at the table" and Jesus challenges us to make sure we are doing the same—that all people know they are welcome in our hearts, in our homes, and in our churches—even if we cannot physically be with each other right now.

It is difficult in this moment not to be near some of the people we love and might be worried about. Take a moment to say out loud the names of people you wish were right there next to you at your table today.

Jesus is no longer physically on earth, yet every time we gather around a table and we call him to mind, he is present with us in Spirit. And so too, our loved ones are with us. Let this be a comfort to us as we pray:

Holy and Loving God, we call to our minds those who are unable to be with us this day. We remember our family, our friends, our neighbors, our fellow Christians. SILENCE

We also call to our minds, O God, the people whose names we do not know: those who are alone in quarantine, those who are grieving, those who are not safe within the confines of their own homes. SILENCE

We pray for those who have lost loved ones. We pray for those who are sick and recovering. SILENCE

We pray for those who are caring for loved ones who are sick at home. We pray for those who are caring for people in hospitals, nursing homes, and in care facilities. SILENCE

We pray for those who are separated from loved ones. We pray for those who are feeling alone and isolated. SILENCE

We pray for those who are helping in this crisis and who are so very tired. We pray for those who are struggling to find friends, food and comfort. We pray for those who are afraid. SILENCE. Amen.

Blessings at the table are part of our Judeo-Christian heritage. Indeed, Jesus adapted his Jewish ritual blessing spoken before and after meals. He asked us to remember him whenever we break bread and raise the cup in thanksgiving. In this feast of love and comfort, we call to mind things for which we are deeply grateful. *Take a moment in your own home to name aloud the people and things for which you are deeply grateful.*

And so I invite you to raise a plate of that food at your table or raise a glass of whatever you are drinking. PAUSE. Let us bless it in this way, praying together:

Holy Comforter, we gather in your name, invited by Jesus. We are bound together with your Spirit in union with each other. Feed our bodies and our spirits with your comforting presence so that we offer your comfort to others. Bless this food and break open our hearts. Bless this drink and pour out your love. Amen.

SHARING THE ELEMENTS


(Holding the bread): Take and eat. The body of Christ given for you! (Holding the cup): Take and drink. The blood of Christ poured out for the forgiveness of sins.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- How do you show others that you care for them?
- How have others shown care for you?
- Jesus died on a cross. How is this act of God a sign of love?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 26:14-27:66.

Many theories have been put forward in the history of the church to state why Jesus had to die to be our Savior. However, one point is clear in the Bible: Jesus' death shows the depth of God's love, a love that is willing to experience a form of slavery, humiliation, and excruciating death, even death on a cross (Philippians 2:8). Crosses have become forms of jewelry and part of other art forms that point to Jesus' death. However, neither the jewelry nor other art come close to the pain and humiliation that God in Christ endured to indicate the character of who God is for us. Jesus is not only Emmanuel, God with us, in humiliation and death. Jesus also joins our human existence by making our deepest prayer his prayer: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46). God in Christ Jesus joins our life experience and from the cross stretches out his arms to say, "I love you this much." When you see someone wearing a cross, what does it mean to you?

Pray: Loving God, you stop at nothing to show us your divine character and the depths of your love. Help us to know and to trust the power of your love for us through Christ. Amen.

SERVICE





RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



If you received palms during worship, take them home. As we begin Holy Week, say the ACTS prayer of giving praise to God (Adoration), asking God's forgiveness (Confession), giving thanks to God (Thanksgiving), and asking God's help for those in need (Supplication) as you light all six purple candles on the Lenten Candle Cross. After lighting the candles, hold a palm and wave it in your hand as you say, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" (Matthew 21:9b)
