CHILDREN'S MOMENT

This is a happy day, isn't it? Today is Easter. The day we celebrate that Jesus rose from the grave.

Since today is a happy day, show me how your face looks when you are happy. (Show sign for HAPPY) Oh yes, that is good. Our faces show the way we feel, don't they? Let me see what your face would look like if you were sad. (Show sign for SAD) How would your face look like if you were surprised? (Show sign for SURPRISED) Afraid/Fear? (Sign for AFRAID/FEAR) Angry? (Sign for ANGRY)

I want you to help me tell the Bible story today. As I tell the story, you will help me by showing with your faces and with your hands how the people in the story feel about what is happening. Will you help me do that? Great! Let's begin.

It was early in the morning on the first day of the week when some women went to visit the tomb where their friend Jesus had been buried. He had been crucified on a cross and buried in a borrowed tomb and the women were going to put spices on his body. The women were very SAD as they went to the tomb. When they arrived at the tomb, the women discovered that the stone that had covered the entrance had been rolled away. Can you imagine the look of SURPRISE on their faces when they saw the open tomb? When they looked inside the tomb, they had the biggest SURPRISE of all. The tomb was empty!

Suddenly, SURPRISE turned to FEAR as two men in bright shining clothes came and stood beside the women. In their FRIGHT, they bowed down with their faces to the ground. The men spoke to the women and said, "Jesus is not here; he has risen! Don't you remember what he told you when he was in Galilee?"

Then the women remembered what Jesus had told them and they were no longer AFRAID. Their FEAR turned to HAPPINESS and they went back and told Jesus' disciples what they had seen and that Jesus had risen, just as he had told them he would. What a HAPPY day!

You and I have reason to be happy today, don't we? We are happy because we know that Jesus rose from the grave and that he lives forever.

Let us pray: Dear God, we thank you today for Jesus. When you brought Jesus back from the dead, you turned our sadness into happiness. We thank you for the joy of this day. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Mark 16:1-8

(from Eugene Peterson's <u>The Message</u>)

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so they could embalm him. Very early on Sunday morning, as the sun rose, they went to the tomb. They worried out loud to each other, "Who will roll back the stone from the tomb for us?"

⁴⁻⁵ Then they looked up, saw that it had been rolled back—it was a huge stone—and walked right in. They saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed all in white. They were completely taken aback, astonished.
⁶⁻⁷ He said, "Don't be afraid. I know you're looking for Jesus the Nazarene, the One they nailed on the cross. He's been raised up; he's here no longer. You can see for yourselves that the place is empty. Now—on your way. Tell his disciples and Peter that he is going on ahead of you to Galilee. You'll see him there, exactly as he said."

⁸They got out as fast as they could, beside themselves, their heads swimming. Stunned, they said nothing to anyone.

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

While in traveling in Jerusalem, our group was shown three possible sites for the Garden Tomb—where Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome went with spices only to discover that Jesus was not there. The first location was a quiet, serene location that is operated by British Christians just outside the walls of Old Jerusalem. Discovered by British soldiers in the 1800's, the stone-hewn tomb was clearly in the garden of a wealthy official—possibly Joseph of Arimathea. To add to its authenticity, next to the garden: a lush place filled with fountains, trees, and flowers, was a face of rock: and I mean that literally. If you look carefully at the rocky hillside, you can see what looks like a skull: Golgotha—the traditional crucifixion site often called the Place of the Skull. And the tomb itself is amazing: it is a hewn cave in the side of a rocky hill with two small rooms: the first room to prepare a body for burial and the second one large enough to hold 8-10 bodies. Walking through the quiet, peaceful paths of the garden, you can easily imagine this to be the location of Christ's resurrection.

The second location of the Garden Tomb is in the Old City underground at the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. The Ethiopian sanctuary itself was fairly small, but their bible was enormous: shaped like a cross, it was about THIS big and the words had been handwritten on animal skin. In the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 8, we hear the story of Philip converting an Ethiopian man to Christianity. From that time until today, Ethiopian Christians consider themselves to be the first Christians and consider the location of their sanctuary to the holiest of ground: the place where Jesus was raised from the dead.

But wait! There is yet another location in Old Jerusalem for Jesus' tomb. You have heard me mention the Church of the Holy Sepulcher before—in all of its ornate, incense and candle-filled glory: the icons on the walls and the thousands upon thousands of Christian pilgrims who visit this holy site each day. For many Catholic and Orthodox Christians, the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem is THE site of Jesus' burial and resurrection.

Indeed, as a Christian pilgrim to Jerusalem, I can tell you that seeing all three traditional sites for Jesus' tomb can be a bit overwhelming. After all, how can we ever really KNOW for certain which one is the right one? What if we have traveled half way around the world only to worship at the wrong location?

In many ways, our Easter reading from the Gospel of Mark helps to answer that question—while raising a few questions of its own. Throughout Epiphany and Lent we have been reading from the Gospel of Mark. But the Easter story in Mark seems so incomplete, that pastors and worship leaders are offered an alternative gospel reading for the day: the more traditional resurrection story from the Gospel of John.

But just like those three burial sites for Jesus in Jerusalem, it seems important to stick with the scripture given to us: even if it IS fairly incomplete. Yes: we have the story of the women going to the tomb to anoint Jesus and finding the tomb empty. What is missing is the appearance of Jesus himself AND the odd ending. The young man or angel who appeared to the women commanded them to go and tell the disciples that Jesus is alive and to meet him in Galilee. But the frightened women do not do that. Instead, the text tells us that they ran away: saying nothing to anyone.

What kind of Easter story is THAT???

On my first trip to Israel, we went to the Mediterranean coast town of Haifa—home to Archbishop Elias Chacour: a Palestinian Christian. Archbishop Chacour argues that what matters most about the Easter story is that the tomb is empty: We don't need to worry about hanging around the tomb. What matters is that we LEAVE the tomb and travel back to Galilee to spread the good news about Christ's resurrection.

And by Galilee, Reverend Chacour means wherever we call home. That Easter's message is NOT about worshipping Christ at the tomb, but leaving the garden and going out into the world to share the good news with others. And specifically, we are to go to our own Galilee to the people who need us most.

That is good news, indeed. Our Gospel story from Mark ends with the women running away in terror, not telling anyone anything of what they had seen and heard. But we know that is not the end of the story. The story of Christ's life, death, and resurrection has been told for nearly two thousand years.

Because Mark ends so abruptly, it is now OUR turn to end the story. With whom will you share the message of Jesus' inclusive love? How has Christ's forgiveness and new life changed your own life? What is one tangible way you can be Christ Jesus to someone this coming week?

The Gospel of Mark ends with the women running away in terror, saying not a word about what they angel had told them. It is our job to

finish the story: to sing and shout and tell others the good news that Christ is Risen! He has risen, indeed! Amen.

DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 28:1-10.

Mary Magdalene and "the other Mary" go to the empty tomb. The second Mary is likely Jesus' mother (see Matthew 13:55 and 27:56 where Jesus' mother is described as the mother of James and Joseph). It is surprising that this second Mary is not named as the mother of Jesus. It appears that the emphasis is not on her biological relationship to Jesus but Mary as a follower of Jesus. She is now a disciple. Jesus' resurrection changes and shakes up everything, including our relationships to others. This is something suggested by the earthquake and the angel of the Lord that descends and whose appearance is like lightning (28:2-3). The resurrection of Jesus connects heaven and earth in a way that shakes up everything for the followers of Jesus and for all of creation itself. How does Jesus' resurrection change everything? How does it change you?

Pray: Risen Lord Jesus, come into my life this day that I may be changed to live for you. Amen.

SERVICE

Natural disasters occur regularly around the world. The aftermath of floods, earthquakes, and hurricanes or typhoons change people's lives drastically. There are many organizations that provide help for these victims. Have you ever helped during a recovery? How might you support this work?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Write the numbers one through ten on separate pieces of small paper. Fold each number and place them in ten different colored plastic eggs along with a sweet treat. Hide the eggs and have a hunt. After they are found, open each egg and take the contents out. Ask who has number one and then read Matthew 28:1. Continue the numbers in order as verses 2-10 from Matthew 28 are read. When finished say together: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! (say three times, each time getting louder)
