

Leader: The majesty of the earth is all around us, and infants sing the glory of the skies.







CHILDREN'S MOMENT

This Sunday is the last Sunday of the Easter Season. Next week we will celebrate Pentecost—the coming of the Holy Spirit—into our lives.

Today in worship we will celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead—just like we have for the past six weeks. We've used different household items to symbolize Jesus' resurrection, but the most common symbol is that of an egg.

Why an egg? An egg has been a symbol of Easter from the very beginning—the egg itself symbolizes the empty tomb. But let's think about it: if I were to take this egg and crack it open, what would I find? That's right! The egg white and egg yolk. But, if I were to take an egg I had played with and cracked it open, we'd find that it is empty! As empty as Jesus' tomb.

It seems like we can make this empty egg more exciting—more of a celebration of Jesus no longer in the tomb. So this egg, I not only took out the egg parts, I also added confetti! Turning this tomb, this egg, into a celebration.

This week, I encourage you to make your own Easter Celebration Egg—confetti and all at home. Then, before next Sunday's worship, read John 20:1-18, breaking open your confetti egg at the end of the reading.



NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: 1 Corinthians 15:1-26, 51-57 (from Eugene Peterson's <u>The Message</u>)

Friends, let me go over the Message with you one final time— this Message that I proclaimed and that you made your own; this Message on which you took your stand and by which your life has been saved. (I'm assuming, now, that your belief was the real thing and not a passing fancy, that you're in this for good and holding fast.)

³⁻⁹ The first thing I did was place before you what was placed so emphatically before me: that the Messiah died for our sins, exactly as Scripture tells it; that he was buried; that he was raised from death on the third day, again exactly as Scripture says; that he presented himself alive to Peter, then to his closest followers, and later to more than five hundred of his followers all at the same time, most of them still around (although a few have since died); that he then spent time with James and the rest of those he commissioned to represent him; and that he finally presented himself alive to *me*. It was fitting that I bring up the rear. I don't deserve to be included in that inner circle, as you well know, having spent all those early years trying my best to stamp God's church right out of existence.

¹⁰⁻¹¹ But because God was so gracious, so very generous, here I am. And I'm not about to let his grace go to waste. Haven't I worked hard trying to do more than any of the others? Even then, my work didn't amount to all that much. It was God giving me the work to do, God giving me the energy to do it. So whether you heard it from me or from those others, it's all the same: We spoke God's truth and you entrusted your lives.

¹²⁻¹⁵ Now, let me ask you something profound yet troubling. If you became believers because you trusted the proclamation that Christ is alive, risen from the dead, how can you let people say that there is no such thing as a resurrection? If there's no resurrection, there's no living Christ. And face it—if there's no resurrection for Christ, everything we've told you is smoke and mirrors, and everything you've staked your life on is smoke and mirrors. Not only that, but we would be guilty of telling a string of barefaced lies about God, all these affidavits we passed on to you verifying that God raised up Christ—sheer fabrications, if there's no resurrection.

¹⁶⁻²⁰ If corpses can't be raised, then Christ wasn't, because he was indeed dead. And if Christ weren't raised, then all you're doing is wandering about in the dark, as lost as ever. It's even worse for those who died hoping in Christ and resurrection, because they're already in their graves. If all we get out of Christ is a little inspiration for a few short years, we're a pretty sorry lot. But the truth is that Christ *has* been raised up, the first in a long legacy of those who are going to leave the cemeteries.

²¹⁻²⁸ There is a nice symmetry in this: Death initially came by a man, and resurrection from death came by a man. Everybody dies in Adam;

everybody comes alive in Christ. But we have to wait our turn: Christ is first, then those with him at his Coming, the grand consummation when, after crushing the opposition, he hands over his kingdom to God the Father. He won't let up until the last enemy is down—and the very last enemy is death! As the psalmist said, "He laid them low, one and all; he walked all over them." When Scripture says that "he walked all over them," it's obvious that he couldn't at the same time be walked on. When everything and everyone is finally under God's rule, the Son will step down, taking his place with everyone else, showing that God's rule is absolutely comprehensive—a perfect ending!

But let me tell you something wonderful, a mystery I'll probably never fully understand. We're not all going to die—but we are all going to be changed. You hear a blast to end all blasts from a trumpet, and in the time that you look up and blink your eyes—it's over. On signal from that trumpet from heaven, the dead will be up and out of their graves, beyond the reach of death, never to die again. At the same moment and in the same way, we'll all be changed. In the resurrection scheme of things, this has to happen: everything perishable taken off the shelves and replaced by the imperishable, this mortal replaced by the immortal. Then the saying will come true:

Death swallowed by triumphant Life!

Who got the last word, oh, Death?

Oh, Death, who's afraid of you now?

It was sin that made death so frightening and law-code guilt that gave sin its leverage, its destructive power. But now in a single victorious stroke of Life, all three—sin, guilt, death—are gone, the gift of our Master, Jesus Christ. Thank God!

SERMON Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Born and raised in South Africa, Martin Pistorius was 12 years old when he began to lose motor control and fell into a coma. The doctors, who were unable to trace his symptoms to a specific illness, gave Martin's parents very little room for hope. When Martin emerged from the coma about three years later, he was completely paralyzed and didn't appear to have much brain function.

But his parents did not give up on him. They took their son home and cared for him—with no real expectation that he would emerge from whatever was holding him prisoner.

Around the time Martin turned 16, still completely paralyzed, he began to be more aware of his surroundings—but he couldn't remember anything that had happened to him. And, he couldn't call out for help. By age 19 Martin's mind was fully back, but his body didn't give any clue to his parents that he had returned.

Finally, one astute caregiver noticed that Martin was following her with his eyes and that he seemed to be absorbing everything she was saying. Martin was taken to a nearby university for neurological testing where he passed every cognitive test with flying colors.

That caregiver saved Martin's life. His family provided Martin with a computer with speech software—and for the first time since he was 12, he could talk—something that completely transformed his world.

When I first read Martin's story in his autobiography, *Ghost Boy*—his account of the transformation from being comatose to being trapped in his body to coming into his own, I was struck by this man's courage and faith against seemingly impossible odds. AND, I was struck by how Martin Pistorius' life can be a metaphor for each of us at Easter.

For here is the truth of the human condition: more often than not, we find ourselves trapped by life, trapped by addictions, trapped by poverty, trapped by our own fears of failure AND success. We are afraid to fully engage in the new life Jesus offers to us in the Easter Season. We are afraid of taking that first step out of the tomb and into life abundant.

In short: we fail to recognize Jesus presence in our lives. We fail to place our trust in the risen Christ.

This Easter Season has been fairly disjointed in terms of scripture lessons. On Easter Sunday, we heard and read the Easter story from the Gospel of Mark—the story that ends with the women running away in fear from the empty tomb and telling no one what they saw. The week after we skipped completely over the resurrection stories and went straight to Jesus' ascension into heaven. The following week we read part of Paul's letter to the Thessalonian Christians. The last two weeks we heard more from Paul's first letter to the believers in Corinth.

So, after all these weeks of NOT looking at resurrection stories, today's lesson in 1 Corinthians takes us straight back to Easter—Paul recounting to the believers about the impact of Jesus on the lives of believers—that through his resurrection we might all experience new life.

I have to say, I'm pretty glad, on this last Sunday of the Easter Season, our narrative lectionary has swung us back TO EASTER. In fact, 1 Corinthians goes further in its resurrection theology by expanding on what will come next for believers. That everyone will be part of the resurrection. That death is not the final word. That new life happens on this side of the grave AND the other side of the grave.

But here is the incredible part about the Easter stories in the gospels. In many of the stories (especially in Luke and John), Jesus appears to the believers, but they do not recognize him! Really! Much of the Easter narrative in other years' lectionary texts are the telling and retelling of stories in which Jesus appears to people who should know EXACTLY WHAT HE LOOKS LIKE, and yet, they fail to recognize Jesus for who he is: the Messiah, the Christ, risen from the grave.

These stories make me wonder: What did the risen Jesus look like that he was not recognized? Or, was it like Martin Pistorius when he was trapped in his body unable to communicate—that people really never saw Jesus for who he was??

The good news is this: Jesus WANTS to be recognized by us. He rose from the grave to offer us new life, new ways of living, new ways of

seeing. If only we would open our eyes. If only we would break free of our spiritual paralysis to fully engage with Jesus.

And how do we do that? That one is easy: by serving others. Throughout the gospels, Jesus reminds his disciples, the crowds AND us that following him means loving the unlikely ones: the homeless, the poor, the infirmed, foreigners, and yes, even our enemies.

Following Jesus is a day-in-day-out commitment to love and serve everyone without wondering if someone is worthy of our love. In the midst of this pandemic, when we are having to rethink work and church and home and security, one thing has never changed: the love Jesus has for each of us, giving us reasons to love everyone (!!) around us.

And we begin by looking for and recognizing the risen Jesus in our lives when we see him at work in ourselves and others.

Once Martin Pistorius began to communicate through the computer, he did not slow down. He went to college. He became a software developer. He married the love of his life. He became a father. He travels the world sharing his story, a powerful reminder that we can ALL be freed of that which traps us and paralyzes us.

Martin has a faith to match his life. Even when trapped in his own body, wondering if anyone would ever see him for who he was, this is what Martin said about God:

"God and I didn't talk about the big things in life—we didn't engage in philosophical debates or argue about religion—but I talked to Him endlessly because I knew we shared something important. I didn't have proof that He existed, but I believed in Him anyway because I knew He was real. God did the same for me. Unlike people, He didn't need proof that I existed—He knew I did."

The good news for us today is that Jesus recognizes each of us as his precious children. And because of what God has done in Jesus, we are called to live the resurrection life—freed from our tombs, freed from

all that paralyzes us—that we might see and recognize Jesus: who offers us new life with every breath we take. Amen!



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
