SERMON AND SCRIPTURES: JOB

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

We are in week four of a five-week series on the book of Job. Knowing that Pastor Dee had the kick-off to the series, weeks ago I very carefully outlined the remaining scripture lessons, noting the direction I thought each week's sermon would go.

Until I read the commentaries. Today's lessons are ones that are not quite what they seem, thus changing the direction of today's sermon.

First a random bit of trivia I couldn't help but share. We hear at the very beginning of the book of Job that Job was from Uz. Thousands of years later, when the Wizard of Oz was being translated into languages throughout the world, modern Hebrew readers of Frank Baum's classic is called NOT the Wizard of Oz, but the Wizard of Uz—harkening to homeland of Job. Like I said: just trivia, but a lot of fun.

In our first reading today, Job argues his case one last time, stating clearly that he is without guilt and will proudly continue to say so. What we then skip in Job between chapters 31 and 38 are Job's friends speaking again. In fact, it is Job's friend, Elihu who is the last to speak in chapter 37, that leads directly into our second scripture lesson.

And this is where commentaries argue against what seems to be a cut-and-dry passage in chapter 38. Chapter 38 begins by stating that God spoke to Job out of a whirlwind.

And yet. And yet, scholars generally believe that chapter 38 is God speaking NOT to Job but to all of Job's friends who have shown up: first

to console him and then later to condemn him for his lack of faithfulness. This is why scholars believe this: God knew Job was blameless. The friends were not. Chapter 38's telling of God blasting Job makes more literary sense if God is speaking not to Job but to his friends.

Another reasons scholars believe this is the wording in the Hebrew for whirlwind. In the Old Testament, that same Hebrew word is used to describe God taking Elijah up to heaven in 2 Kings. However, all the other Old Testament uses of that specific Hebrew word reference God's anger. (See Isaiah 29:6, Jeremiah 23:19, Jeremiah 30:23 and Zechariah 9:14). Clearly God is not speaking to a righteous and blameless man. He is speaking to the "friends" who, as we know, haven't been helpful at all.

And what does God say in chapter 38? He basically says, "Who are you to think you know it all? Were you around at the moment of creation? Do you command the sun and the stars? Do you really believe that you are in charge?"

What's more: God blasts the friends using both masculine and feminine language. In verses 8-9, God speaks of giving birth and swaddling the sea, clouds, and darkness. In verses 10-11, he is a parent setting limits and protecting his children.

In chapter 38 of Job, God asserts who he is: a mystery beyond anything our puny little human brains can imagine. And that is important for the book of Job and for each of us in this particular place and time. In the midst of a global pandemic, in the midst of racial protests, in the midst of an uncertain economic future, God reminds Job's friends (and us!!!) that he cannot be distilled down to a few trite bits of outworn wisdom.

Job, who had been stripped of his children, his possessions and his health, was suffering—deeply suffering—and his friends offered him only empty phrases that could not take away his pain.

And what topic did Job's friends miss the mark on? Suffering. Deep, powerful, life-altering suffering. And believe me, I get that suffering makes us uncomfortable. When a friend or loved one suffers, we often try to brush it off or redirect the conversation. When it is we who are suffering, we simply want it to end—seeking easy answers of the self-help industry.

The book of Job chronicles the path of human suffering. At first, suffering (of ourselves or others) outrages us—like it outraged Job. And yet, even in the depths of his despair, Job never cursed God. He cried

out to God, he raged at God, but he never cursed God. Job reminds us that God can handle our anger, can handle our outrage.

The entire book of Job is about suffering: Job's suffering, the suffering of our loved ones, our own suffering. And what is particularly important to note is that the book of Job does not explain away suffering. It is left as a mystery, as unexplainable as God him or herself.

The book of Job serves as witness to the dignity of suffering. Yes, the dignity. I have an example for you about dignity of suffering. Years ago, when a friend of mine named Kathy was dying at Hospice of Dayton, she insisted that she see the face of her caregivers and know their names. Kathy, in her suffering, insisted upon dignity of self—even as facing death. Kathy was in enough pain that the nurses were intent on alieving the pain. Kathy insisted they treat HER, not the pain.

But more than dignity in suffering, the book of Job is a reminder that suffering is as mysterious as God is. We cannot explain suffering NOR God away. Job's friends, when they spoke to him, spoke the truth, technically. What they were missing was relationship, intimacy, and humanity.

Yes: As you heard last week, Job's three friends sat with him in silence for seven days and nights. THAT is getting it right. But they ultimately couldn't stand the silence and filled the void by telling Job that he must have done something wrong to deserve such suffering. And this is where his friends fell flat—NO ONE deserves to suffer. And yet, in our lifetimes, each of us WILL suffer to varying degrees. Suffering is part of the human condition. God, God Almighty, Yahweh, does not smite us to teach us a lesson or because we perhaps deserve it. Quite the opposite, God, who birthed in her womb the universe will love you and care for you and call you his own.

When I traveled to Kenya, I learned this phrase: God is good all the time! All the time, God is good for that is God's nature!

What Job needed most was relationship and connection and love. What he got from his friends was condemnation.

Which brings us back to here and now. How do we connect to a loved one who is suffering? What are we to say? What are we to do? Eugene Peterson—who has given us the gift of the Bible rewritten in modern-day terms—has some thoughts about this:

- 1. No matter how insightful we may be, we don't REALLY understand the full nature of our friends' problems and suffering
- 2. Our friends may not want our advice
- 3. And then the irony: people who are deeply committed to loving and following God, often suffering not less, but more because we are taking on the hurts of the world. And yet, in the midst of suffering, God is with us, transforming, deepening and marking our lives with beauty and holiness in ways we could not have begun to imagine before we suffered.

So the bottom line? When a friend or loved one suffers, what you say will probably not be helpful. That you stay with them through the suffering will be transformational. That you love them, hold them, and abide with them will make all the difference in the world.

I would venture to say that the same could be said about societal suffering. We, who are white, cannot know the suffering of our black and brown brothers and sisters due to systemic racism. But we can abide with them. We can sit with them. We can listen deeply. We can love them by being part of the solution to end racism.

We, who do not worry about where our next meal is coming from, cannot know the suffering of our neighbors who are chronically hungry. We just can't. But we can abide with them. We can sit with them. We can listen deeply. We can love them by being part of the solution by offering food and a just society in which no one is hungry.

We, who have not had a catastrophic illness, cannot know the suffering of our friends and loved ones who have. But we can abide with them. We can sit with them. We can listen deeply. We can love them by wearing masks, disinfecting our hands, and offering jazz hands rather than hugs.

Pitying someone or a situation's suffering does not a whit of good. Pity gives us the upper hand. Job reminds us that we need to listen and learn from those who suffer—and if, necessary, join them in protest much like Job protested his lot to God. Shared suffering offers dignity and transformation.

No, we cannot know and understand another's suffering any more than we can understand God. The book of Job is a powerful witness to the mystery of suffering and the mystery of God. We do not need to have all the answers (about suffering or God), but we can listen, love and allow holy silence to envelop us that we might hear the good news that comes to us in a whirlwind, in a cry, in laughter, and in love. Amen.
