In the Old Testament book of Ezekiel, we hear of a tree that is taller than all the other trees, its branches are home to many birds and it is nourished by the deep waters of an underground spring: a Cedar of Lebanon.

Let us water our tree. If you are at home, you are welcome to water a plant that is either inside or outside. Trees get thirsty just like we do. It is so good to be able to get what we need to feel good and to give what we can so that others have what they need. This is the beauty of life.

Let us pray: God of goodness, we thank you for water. We thank you for life. Help us to give life to all for the beauty of the earth. Amen.

O God, we pray for ourselves: for far too often we stumble, we fumble, we fall. Pick us up. Bandage our wounds. Envelop us with your grace. SILENCE

All of this we pray in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Job 40:1-9 (NRSV)

And the Lord said to Job:

- ² "Shall a faultfinder contend with the Almighty? Anyone who argues with God must respond."
- ³ Then Job answered the Lord:
- ⁴ "See, I am of small account; what shall I answer you? I lay my hand on my mouth.
- ⁵ I have spoken once, and I will not answer; twice, but will proceed no further."
- ⁶ Then the Lord answered Job out of the whirlwind:
- ⁷ "Gird up your loins like a man; I will question you, and you declare to me.
- Will you even put me in the wrong?
 Will you condemn me that you may be justified?
- ⁹ Have you an arm like God, and can you thunder with a voice like his?

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Job 42:1-17 (NRSV)

Then Job answered the Lord:

- ² "I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted.
- ³ 'Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge?' Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know.
- ⁴ 'Hear, and I will speak;

I will question you, and you declare to me.'

- ⁵ I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you;
- ⁶ therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes."

⁷ After the Lord had spoken these words to Job, the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite: "My wrath is kindled against you and against your two friends; for you have not spoken of me what is right, as my servant Job has. ⁸ Now therefore take seven bulls and seven rams, and go to my servant Job, and offer up for yourselves a burnt offering; and my servant Job shall pray for you, for I will accept his prayer not to deal with you according to your folly; for you have not spoken of me what is right, as my servant Job has done." ⁹ So Eliphaz the Temanite and Bildad the Shuhite and Zophar the Naamathite went and did what the Lord had told them; and the Lord accepted Job's prayer.

¹⁰ And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he had prayed for his friends; and the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before. ¹¹ Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the Lord had brought upon him; and each of them gave him a piece of money and a gold ring. ¹² The Lord blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning; and he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and a thousand donkeys. ¹³ He also had seven sons and three daughters. ¹⁴ He named the first Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. ¹⁵ In all the land there were no women so beautiful as Job's daughters; and their father gave them an inheritance along with their brothers. ¹⁶ After this Job lived one hundred and forty years, and saw his children, and his children's children, four generations. ¹⁷ And Job died, old and full of days.

RESPONSE

SERMON Rev. Becky Erb Strang

I think it was in the 1990's that I first heard the phrase "paradigm shift." It is the internal awakening that the way we have viewed the world might not really be what is going on around us. For many white people in America, we have been experiencing a paradigm shift these past few weeks as we have taken the time to genuinely listen to our black and brown brothers and sisters about how systemic racism affects their lives. Another paradigm shift has happened with covid19. We huggers and

handshakers have had to reel back our enthusiasm in order to keep those around us safe and healthy. We've all needed to wear masks to protect those we love AND those whose names we do not know but encounter at the grocery store, the coffee shop or in the doctor's office.

On this fifth and final week of Job, we recognize that Job has experienced a paradigm shift. A huge paradigm shift. Remember the first week of Job: a man righteous in the eyes of God and humankind was stricken in the worst ways possible: death of all his children, loss of all his livestock and a sickness that covered him with sores. In his agony, Job lamented not only the day he had been born, but the day he had been conceived. Three of Job's friends showed up, initially to console their friend, but ultimately they told him he must have done something wrong to have earned such a dismal life.

Much of the book of Job is Job answering his friends by crying out to God. Much of Job is prayers of lament aimed at God. But let me be clear: despite the death of his children, loss of his wealth and health, Job never cursed God.

Today, as we wrap up this sermon series on Job, we have come to the paradigm shift. Or, to put it into theological terms, we have come to the moment of Job's epiphany: the transformation of his heart and mind.

So how did this happen?

In our first reading from today, a short piece from Job, chapter 40, Job finally (finally!!!) tells God that he (Job) needs to shut up and listen. He needs to stop railing AT God and begin listening to what God has to say.

And what does God say? God tells Job—who is sitting on an ash heap, picking at his sores with a broken piece of pottery—that he needs to stop whining and face God Almighty. Job, up until this moment, felt as if God had stacked the world against him. God, however, reminds Job that his justice is much greater and more awesome than the justice we might seek in a court of law: in which there is a winner and a loser for every case. In the Hebrew, one of the words for justice is mishpat. Scholars generally agree that the Hebrew understanding of mishpat/of justice includes both God's judgment AND God's mercy.

Biblical scholar David Doty argues that biblical justice is a two-edged sword—that includes judgment and mercy. As God speaks to Job of

justice, Job seems to realize that he had only been focusing on God's judgment without taking into account God's mercy, God's grace, God's love.

We have all had terrible things happen in our lives—and far too often we want to foist the blame for our suffering onto God. And perhaps this is one of those paradigm shifts: God/Yahweh/Lord of the Universe is NOT zapping you or your loved ones with ill health, with broken relationships, happens. Car finances. Cancer accidents Relationships fall apart. We will experience in this lifetime pain, suffering and, at times, despair. But that is NOT the whole story. We will also experience in this lifetime mercy, grace, peace, joy and love. In today's first reading from Job, God's speech is literally knitting Job's life back together. God's words provide a balm of comfort and a hope for tomorrow. When we, in the United Church of Christ, affirm that God is Still Speaking, we are acknowledging that the Creator of the Universe has words of mercy and healing for you, for me, for the entire human family in these chaotic and broken times.

Theologian Frederick Buechner has written a delightful, somewhat tongue-in-cheek essay about Job. Rev. Buechner retells the story of Job with a light-hearted touch, but when the paradigm shift/the epiphany happens, Buechner goes directly to the heart of the story. In Job 4:3-5, we hear these words from Job: Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge? Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful to me, which I did not know. 'Hear, and I will speak; I will question you, and you declare to me.' I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you.

Did you catch the shift there? Up until that moment in his life, Job had been praising and thanking God, but he had NOT experienced the indescribable glory of God. This is what Frederick Buechner says of that moment, "But now it was no longer a matter of hearing descriptions of God, because he finally had heard and seen for himself. Job had seen the great glory so shot through with sheer, fierce light and life and gladness, had heard the great voiced raised in song so full of terror and wildness and beauty, that from that moment on nothing else mattered."

And what a gift God's revealed glory was to Job! From that moment on, Job was never the same. There are times when life rolls that way.

Even in the depths of agony, despair, brokenness, illness and death, sometimes something inexplicable happens—we have a powerful Godmoment—an epiphany—in which we see our suffering (and God!) in a new light. A moment filled with light and love and grace that we cannot help but fall to our knees in praise.

In 1984, artist and musician Leonard Cohen wrote a song called, "Hallelujah" that speaks to this call to praise in the midst of brokenness and pain. With biblical (and, at times, sexual) overtones, the song has become a classic now recorded by a myriad of musicians. What began as a song with 80 (yes! 80!) verses, was distilled to 5 verses whose lyrics and melody continue to haunt and inspire.

The final verse of Cohen's piece has a line that speaks to the ending of the book of Job: that sometimes love is a cold and broken Hallelujah. Really. The book of Job ends with God restoring all of Job's fortunes: new children, new land, new employees, new wealth. Yet, we who have experienced great pain and brokenness know this: even when we have turned the corner on our grief, even when life moves us toward light and love, we still carry loss in our hearts. Sometimes love IS a cold and broken Hallelujah—and the book of Job affirms that love and life and joy CAN happen after great loss and despair. The book of Job affirms that no matter what, God is present with us.

Again: let me be clear: Job is a fictional account written and included in the Old Testament to answer the question of suffering. (See last week's sermon for that!). God does not play games with Satan (the Accuser) to zap us humans on earth. In this imperfect world, things fall apart. Sickness happens. Death takes us unprepared. Brokenness abounds.

The book of Job also affirms that justice and mercy and love will have the final say. God is in charge. (We are not!) We might only have an occasional paradigm shift/epiphany throughout our lifetimes, but if we are paying attention, those moments of grace, those foretastes of heaven, will sustain us now and for all our days to come.

Friends: Open your ears that you might hear the cries of our brothers and sisters. Open your eyes that you might see God's glory.

And when you do experience God's glory, fall to your knees in thanksgiving and praise. Amen.

Leader: Take and drink.


*PRAYER OF THANKSGIVING (standing)
