



NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: 2 Corinthians 4:1-18 (NRSV)

Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. ² We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God. ³ And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. ⁴ In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. ⁵ For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. ⁶ For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts

to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

⁷ But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. ⁸ We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; ⁹ persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; ¹⁰ always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. ¹¹ For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh. ¹² So death is at work in us, but life in you.

¹³ But just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture—"I believed, and so I spoke"—we also believe, and so we speak, ¹⁴ because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence. ¹⁵ Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

¹⁶ So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. ¹⁷ For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, ¹⁸ because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.

SERMON Rev. Becky Erb Strang

The past few weeks our children's moments have centered around finding beauty in our midst. Four weeks ago, I brought an apple tree to worship (truthfully, not much of a tree: I ordered her online and she arrived dormant—so what you all saw that week was a stick planted in dirt. I'm happy to report the tree has come to life and is starting to bloom with green leaves! A thing of beauty!) Three weeks ago, Pastor Dee brought

the blanket she is crocheting—a huge, thick monstrosity that envelops her with beautiful love and warmth even as she completes the project.

Our children's moment last week focused on the Japanese word wabi-sabi—the idea that everything is beautiful—even imperfect things, broken things, things made in unusual ways. We also explored the art of kintsugi—the Japanese art form that repairs broken porcelain and pottery with gold. The repaired piece LOOKS repaired, but the added gold makes what was broken a thing of beauty.

Today's children's moment focused our attention on the stars—the beauty of the night sky, the majesty of the constellations.

In our third week of sermons centered around 2 Corinthians, we are given yet at least two more images of beauty: the glory, magnificent glory of God AND the image of keeping God's treasures in clay jars.

We'll begin with God's glory. Paul, whose letters over the course of years make up 1 and 2 Corinthians, had some definite ideas about God's glory and how we can see/experience it. Do you remember the story of Moses and God talking in Exodus 33 and 34? Moses wanted to see/experience God's glory. God, knowing that no human can see the face of God and live, offered to Moses an alternative: God would pass by Moses, shielding Moses' eyes until God had passed: THEN and only then would Moses be able to see God's glory (which was really the backside of God!)

Moses' reaction? He was so overcome with awe at seeing only the teeny, tiniest part of God, that he fell down to worship him.

Writing to the Corinthian believers, Paul must have had that story in mind when he assured the Corinthians that they could experience the glory of God—not directly, but through the knowledge of the glory of God—in other words, how God's glory is reflected in life around us.

You probably have experienced this. God surprises us with backside glimpses of glory whenever we receive a phone call or letter from a long lost friend or relative. God's glory is revealed when we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the imprisoned. God's glory is revealed in the birth of a child, a grandchild and even in a babe placed in a manger some two thousand years ago.

And we know this to be true: these glimpses of God's glory typically surprise us out of our complacency. What might have started as a routine,

daily task might suddenly shine bright with God's glory—knocking off our socks and knocking us to our knees in worship.

And that is important. Worship, at its very best, is not a show, is not entertainment, and goes way beyond the gathering of believers on a Sunday—whether online or in-person. Worship, at its very best, is a rehearsal for the upcoming week: the rehearsing of how we can best look for God's glory in the days to come. In worship, we experience God's glory in the broken bread, in the ringing of the bells and lighting of candles. We experience God's glory whether gathered or scattered—because just the act of logging on or tuning in shifts our focus away from ourselves and upon the face of God that we see and experience and know best in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. For Christians, Jesus is the best reflection of God's glory we could have. And for that, we thank God for what he has done for us and with us in Christ Jesus.

I began this morning by talking about the glory of God as a thing of beauty. The second piece of art the Apostle Paul spoke of in today's reading is the treasure in clay jars. Paul's message is clear: that God's love, God's grace, God's mercy is given to us as treasures placed in clay jars (or vessels, depending on your translation). Our vessels/our lives/our bodies are fragile and temporary, and yet God places his greatest treasures within us as a reminder that theses treasures are of God, not of humankind.

So I ask you this morning: have you ever made your own clay pot, clay jar, clay vessel? Perhaps you made it in school or in scouts or 4H. Perhaps you've dabbled in pottery as a teenager or adult. If you ever get the opportunity to get your hands around a lump of clay—do it. It is both awe-inspiring (the creation side of the art form) and humbling (again: the creation side of the art form: clay rarely does what you want it to do. ②)

When we lived in Kettering, for several years I took wheel pottery classes at the city's art center. And this is what I quickly learned: throwing clay on a wheel is an act of prayer. Yes. Really.

When throwing clay, you begin with a ball of clay—not too big, but big enough to set your imagination in flight. The next step is the motion of the wheel. Never try to make changes to the clay without the wheel turning first. Oh! And did I mention the water? While the wheel turns and the clay spins, you need to begin by centering the clay with hands that

are wet. Dry hands create too much friction and the clay doesn't want to move at all.

The only way clay can be centered is with steady hands and strong arms. If you let the clay wiggle your hands, the clay won't change easily and your creation will come out lop-sided. But if you give it your full concentration, what began as a lump of clay will become a bowl or a vase or a mug.

Prayer is like throwing clay and working a potter's wheel. If we come to the wheel cocky or distracted, the clay will fly off the wheel and hit a nearby wall. If we approach our prayer life with arrogance or distraction, we lose our center—a center that is found only in the love, light and peace of God.

It is not coincidence that one of the first things you must do to clay on a wheel is *center* it. When the clay is centered, it is ready for change. When we are centered, when we are grounded in prayer and living within the heart of God's love, we are ready for a future that belongs to God.

And, as creatures made in the likeness of God, we are called to be creators—to join with God in creating new life and new hope in the midst of brokenness, prejudice and global pandemics. Like a potter at a wheel, we are called to take the elements at hand and begin to imagine a new creation and a new way of living. Like the Apostle Paul, we are called to place God's treasures in the clay jars of our hearts.

Paul is very clear in today's reading: that through faith/through belief, we are shaped into new people/new creations. In these troubled times, that is good news, indeed. Our sweet, puny human brains cannot even begin to imagine what the next few months or years will bring for our world, but God's got this. And we've got this because we've got God.

Now hear me well: that doesn't mean we can ride out this pandemic, ride out the cultural storms around us, in passive autopilot. Despite our rapidly changing world, we still have to show up at the potter's wheel. We still have to show up in prayer. We still have to show up as we discover new ways to love our neighbors AND our enemies.

Whenever I begin with a lump of clay I may have an *idea* of what I might want it to become. But, I'm always surprised about how clay has a mind of its own. What begins as a mug (in my mind) might end as a cereal bowl. What begins as a goblet (in my imagination) might end as a

candlestick. And that doesn't even take into account bubbles in the clay, collapsed walls, and uneven sides.

As co-creators, as Spirit People, as the gathered Body of Christ, we are called to take part in the shaping and repair of the world, but we cannot control the final product. If we look to the future, holding tightly to outworn ideas, prejudices or ways of living, our clay is guaranteed to collapse. If we try to force a specific outcome, our clay will fly off the wheel—that is guaranteed.

The good news is that we are called to be faithful—to put our faith into action & to encourage one another with steady hands and hearts for prayer. God, our loving Creator, our Mother, our Father, our All-in-All, will work with us side-by-side, calling us to envision new ways of living, new ways of being, new ways of being God's children. Our clay jars are fragile, but the treasures God pours into those jars are of infinite beauty and grace.

All this brings us back to the glory of God. When we show up at the potter's wheel/when we show up in prayer, we are putting our faith in Jesus into action. The clay jars we make may be lopsided and fragile, but they contain the glory of God—glory beyond our imagining.

This week, I encourage you to intentionally show up at the metaphorical potter's wheel of your life. Open your eyes and hearts to see God's glory reflected all around. Open your hands to the poor, the hurting, the lost—that you might see God's glory in their eyes and in their lives. Treat everyone you encounter this week as a precious clay jar filled with the light-filled glory of God. Amen.
