

I'm a wayfaring stranger; you're Indiana Jones. We are Gracie and George; we're Watson and Holmes. The air is filled with angels; there's no devil to outrun. Just sigh and kiss the ground when the long night is done.

It's a collar turned up; a kiss on the forehead; A string and two cans; it's the last thing you said. It's a hunch that you follow; a light in the dark. And idiot check; it's a balm for your heart.

For all your searching there's nothing to do. What you've been looking for is looking for you. NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: 2 Corinthians 5:1-21 (NRSV) For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. ² For in this tent we groan, longing to be clothed with our heavenly dwelling—³ if indeed, when we have taken it off we will not be found naked. ⁴ For while we are still in this tent, we groan under our burden, because we wish not to be unclothed but to be further clothed, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life. ⁵ He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who has given us the Spirit as a guarantee.

⁶ So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord—⁷ for we walk by faith, not by sight.⁸ Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹ So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. ¹⁰ For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil. ¹¹ Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. ¹² We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. ¹³ For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. ¹⁴ For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. ¹⁵ And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them.

¹⁶ From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷ So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! ¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; ¹⁹ that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. ²⁰ So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his

appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹ For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

RESPONSE

Leader: The word of God for the people of God! People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God!

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

As we continue to explore 2 Corinthians as part of our summer worship series, I invite you to look back briefly at last week's text: 2 Corinthians 4:1-18. In it, Paul talked about two kinds of beauty—the beauty of God's glory revealed in our lives and the beauty of the treasures God places in our clay jars/our human lives. 2 Corinthians 4 ended with these words: ¹⁶ So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. ¹⁷ For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, ¹⁸ because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.

Today's reading from 2 Corinthians 5 picks up right where we left off last week, but Paul's language has shifted. Instead of speaking of our lives as clay jars, Paul speaks about our lives, our bodies, our earthly existence as living in tents—temporary dwellings that can be moved about. (Remember: some scholars believe that Paul was a tentmaker by trade. So it should come as no surprise that Paul speaks of earthly life as living in tents).

From the very beginning of today's reading, Paul makes it very clear that tent dwelling is not necessarily a bad thing—it's just a human thing. While we are on earth, we experience the kingdom of God here and now in little bursts of light and love and grace. These earthly glimpses of heaven are what keep us going, a reminder that God is ultimately in charge.

For Christians this is of key importance no matter what century you might have read this letter. Around the same time Paul was traveling around the Mediterranean, Gnosticism was a fledgling movement among some Jews and Christians. Gnosticism was and is the belief that what is physical/earthly is sinful and evil and that which is spiritual is good and righteous. Gnosticism seeks to demarcate between that which of the earth (bad) and that which is of heaven (good).

The Apostle Paul was having none of that. In today's reading Paul celebrates the value of the human body—for all its flaws and frailties. We know this to be true: our Christian faith is deeply incarnational. We celebrate that God comes to us in a tiny baby placed in a cow's feedbox. We celebrate that God knows our human suffering because he suffered through Jesus on the cross. For Paul, our very humanity is sacred because it ties us closely to God through Christ Jesus.

But let's be honest. We rarely celebrate our bodies as something sacred. More often than not we look at our physical bodies with annoyance at best and revulsion at worst. We see ourselves as too thin, too fat, too short, too tall, too young, too old—never good enough. And if we keep being honest, we not only see ourselves in this way, but we categorize (and judge) others by bodily appearance.

The good news is that is not God's way. Our human bodies are sacred and holy no matter our shape, color or size. Our bodies are temples and sanctuaries in which the Holy Spirit resides. Our bodies are objects of wonder, beauty and grace. Let me say that again: Our bodies are objects of wonder, beauty and grace. Perhaps this coming week we need to repeat that sentence every time we look in the mirror, every time we want to curse our creaky knees, every time we decide to eat that second donut.

We are called to celebrate the physicality of life on earth. We are challenged to put all of our senses to work. Today, we baked bread in the sanctuary so you could smell the richness of the bread as we prepare to share in the sacrament of communion. The elements we will receive in a few minutes are physical and real—God renders that which we can touch, taste, see and hear as holy.

From the very beginning, we were created in God's image—and that alone makes our bodies holy. Paul saw himself as carrying within himself the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We are called to do the same. But that's not the final word. Paul keeps expanding his thoughts in today's reading by reminding the Corinthian believers that because of Jesus' resurrection, we have died to our old lives and been made new.

No matter the condition of our bodies OR our lives, Paul tells the Corinthians that they are being renewed inside day-by-day. As I said a moment ago, our precious and beloved bodies house the Holy Spirit. With every breath we take, the Spirit is working within us to create newness and wholeness. This newness of life is expressed most clearly in Paul's letter to the Christians of Galatia when he declared that the Spirit gifts us with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. (See Galatians 5:22).

These gifts/these fruit of the Spirit are what we experience when we get out of our own way to allow the Spirit to shine her glory in us and through us. Newness of life is that complicated and that simple. Each and every day we are given the gift to start anew. You are not bound by your past. You no longer need to be tied to your high school persona. You are more than the sum of what has happened to you. Because Jesus lives in you by way of the Holy Spirit, each day is a brand new day to choose love and forgiveness and peace and hope.

Even science tells us this is true. Every cell in the human body dies and is regenerated/made new over the course of seven to ten years. You are quite literally not the same person you were a decade ago. And because of Jesus' love for you, you are not the same person you were even yesterday.

Two weeks ago Tatum Temple preached about forgiveness. She led us through a guided meditation of standing with Jesus on the edge of a river as we tossed the stones that we held tightly to as grudges and judgment and unforgiveness. Today, I'm asking you to do much the same: to let go of the person you were last year, last week, yesterday. Jesus loves you and forgives you beyond measure. Let your past be baptized in the waters of life so that you rise up as a new creation. Start your new life right here. Right now. Amen
