MOMENT FOR MISSION: Neighbors in Need

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the U.S. One third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). CAIM provides Christian ministry and witness to American Indians and to the wider church justice issues that affect American Indian life. Historically, the forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with different tribes in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin and Nebraska. There are now 20 UCC churches on reservations. There are

many Indians who are members of other UCC churches and CAIM also supports these churches and pastors.

Two thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries in the US. (JWM) supports a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. NIN grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. In the last two years our own St. Paul received a grant for \$5000.00 from NIN for our Community Garden and for the annual Art Camp.





These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. 13 He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; 14 he will give you

SERMON All in the Family Rev. Jeanette Tangeman Every year on the first Sunday of October, World Communion Sunday, we join Christians around the world who are also celebrating Holy Communion together. While this seems to some just another blurb on the church calendar, I have always felt that it deserves much more. If truly celebrated it has the ability to bring so much more to our worship and subsequently our lives together. We often tend to isolate ourselves from other cultures, or people from other places, people who do not look like us, or speak like us. In doing so, we become arrogant and it can result in us feeling that our ways are the best, or even the only true ones. That applies to our worship ways as well.

In my travels around this country and to various other countries and cultures I have developed an understanding and appreciation for the differing ways in which others worship. I have realized that they have some traditions that add depth and beauty to the ones in which I usually worship. For instance, on a mission trip to Mazahua Mission in Mexico I was privileged to share in worship with some Mazahua Indian families, people who are very low on the socioeconomic scale of the area. When I say I felt privileged to share, I really mean it. The singing was so joyful, the praying was amazing. During the time of prayer each person prayed their own prayers out loud...together, at the same time, in one beautiful cacophony of petition and thanksgiving to God. When it came time for

the offering, these folks who live in poverty, literally sang and danced their way to the offering baskets at the front of the church. They even shared what little they had in a "coffee hour" type of event...no coffee though. The children came around to all of us with little wagons of juice and milk and crackers. They truly made us feel like family as they invited us into their homes, literally shacks of tin and cardboard.

Worshiping in some other cultures involved the beauty and formality of "high worship" and sharing from a common cup during Communion. Often there were huge sanctuaries of grandeur and magnificent antiques and architecture and stained glass. But we were welcomed warmly and included in all. No matter where we were in this country or others, worship was a way to make us feel at home, like one big family of differing relatives but a shared love.

I hope you notice that I have included in the bulletin today, liturgies from some different countries. I do so intentionally to show that we are more alike than different; that we really are all part of God's family. And today as we celebrate Holy Communion with our brothers and sisters across our nation and around the world, let the power of that thought sink in. We are part of a very large family. Everyone is always saying how small the world has become. Jesus made it very clear that the term "family" is certainly not limited to our blood relatives, but to all people. He made it a point in many stories that God's love was not limited to the Jews, but also extended to the Gentiles. The clear implications of his words were that God loved all people and therefore, we are all part of God's family. Of course there were many who did not agree with that and plotted to kill him. Nevertheless, much to their amazement, throughout his earthly ministry, Jesus lived out this wider concept of family by ministering to people of all kinds and conditions. We know that he poured out special care upon the outcasts, the poor, the rejected and the Gentiles.

Jesus constantly showed that his concept of family had nothing to do with genealogy and everything to do with love, and sometimes that was difficult for those around him to comprehend. Well guess what, unfortunately in our divisive country and world, it is still difficult for many today. We have divided into levels of wealth, color of skin, sexual identities, ages, politics, culture, and religion. There are probably many

more categories of which each of us are aware. And for some even their immediate families are divided and so thinking beyond them to the world as family is impossible. It is never going to be a once and done thing for any of us but if we are truly professing to be Christians, disciples of Christ, then we need to find ways to work on it. We need to grow in understanding and love and it is not just going to happen magically.

One of my favorite quotes is "love is an action verb." When families love each other what do they DO? They care for and support each other, they help each other when someone is down and out, they surround each other with love and prayer when illness or tragedy befalls, they share with each other and join each other at meals. Love in action requires growth in thinking, understanding and doing. And it needs to go beyond the walls of our homes and churches. Sometimes it is easier than others. When faced with huge tragedies the kindness and love of folks just comes streaming out and is obvious everywhere. But when we disagree with politics or racism and even religion it is hard to see any love or kindness, and especially hard to imagine we are all one family of God. Watching the news can make one wonder what has happened to the human race.

Where do we start with this growth and how do we continue? There is no easy answer. Sometimes the best way is to develop a personal relationship with someone that is very different from you. To discover that in spite of the obvious differences, there are amazingly basic similarities in desires and needs, and in love of family and friends. One on one understanding and love then makes a person more willing to be open to it on a larger scale. When we can begin to ease up, to let go of the prejudices that have divided us, no matter the category, with one person, it makes it easier to begin to look at the bigger picture.

Have you ever shared a meal of strange food with someone and discovered how delicious it is? In Toledo where I grew up each year an International Festival was held and it was one great big event. I never missed it. Beautiful people with amazing food and conversation. And Toledo is also known for its German American Festival, the Hungarian Festival, the Greek Festival and the Polish Festival. You can imagine that the biggest drawing card was the FOOD! Oh there was dancing and vendors of colorful cultural items, but if you ever begin a conversation

with anyone about one of the festivals, the first topic would be the food. What a unifier of people. My stomach is growling.

And what about our church potlucks? Churches are notorious for enjoying tables full of home cooked goodies and the fellowship around the tables is loud and loving. I really believe that eating together is one sure way to begin to grow in love and understanding. I believe it can bring us closer together and not just more tolerant of each other, but a feeling of agape love, a feeling of being connected to each other.

So today, as we share in the Lord's Supper, Christ's meal, a feast of love, be reminded again that we are sitting at a dinner table that stretches around the world. Our family of brothers and sisters in our neighborhood, our country, our world is sharing this meal. What a visual. I hope you can see the picture. May it fill you with hope for our world that love will reign. Let us come To Christ's Table and share in a meal with our world family with hearts and minds fully prepared to meet our Lord there. All are welcome. Love abounds.



#### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Philippians 3:4b-14.

We don't get it. According to research on American religious views, we want to be saved by God because we are "good people." We prefer to rely on our own merits rather than trust the power of Christ's death and resurrection that conquers our sin. Perhaps this is part of the sinful self-centeredness that Christ comes to cleanse us of. Paul writes to the church at Philippi and points out that if anyone has a claim to self-righteousness based on the law that measures our goodness, Paul would be pretty unbeatable; he would be "blameless" (v. 6). But he counts all of his religious success as "loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord" (v. 8). The truly amazing part of his testimony is that knowing Christ does not free him from suffering; he is not concerned about why "bad things happen to good people." Paul announces his freedom to suffer with Christ. This "theology of the cross" sees life in death, sees joy in suffering and sees hope in despair. Paul presses "on to make it my own" (v. 12). He is announcing a view of life, and this way of life sees Christ as the source of all our hopes of salvation. How is freedom from judging our own goodness important to our salvation? *Pray:* Dear God, help us to know Jesus; may we focus our attention on the needs of others and to care for them through Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### SERVICE



Grapevines and vineyards are written about more than any other plant in the Bible. They were important in Biblical times and part of the culture. They were often used as symbols of producing fruit. In this context, fruit means one's actions that come from the heart. Place grapes in a bowl and as you eat them, think about what it means for you to produce good fruits (take positive actions). What positive actions can you take to care for others?

#### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**



In Philippians 3, Paul talks about pressing towards the goal to reach the prize of knowing Christ Jesus. Think about a time you tried to reach a goal. What happened? Whether we reach the goal or not, God is always with us. Pray: Lord, help us to keep our eye on the goal, the prize of the "heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus." Amen.
