DEVOTIONS

Read: Isaiah 45:1-7.

Cyrus is a Persian king. He is not part of God's chosen people through Abraham, Isaac or Jacob. Cyrus doesn't even know the God of Israel, and yet Cyrus does God's will by setting God's people free to return home from exile in Babylon. Isaiah lifts up the supreme power and authority of God's rule throughout the world. Besides the LORD, there is no god (v. 5). All that is, is God's. It is easy for us to forget that God can use others outside of the body of Christ to do God's will on earth. No wonder Psalm 96 commands all the earth to sing to the LORD (v. 1). In the midst of the tragedies that happen all too often around us, it is important to remember that we are a people of hope and trust in the God who holds all things together. The Apostle Paul wrote with thanksgiving for the Thessalonians' faith, love, and hope (1 Thessalonians 1:3). As a chosen people, Paul gladly affirms that they do God's work of love on earth through their "work of faith" and "steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ" (v. 3). How does God's rule on earth give you hope and encourage you to act with love and faith?

Pray: God of power and might, we thank you for your glory that breathes hope and love into all corners of the earth through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SERVICE

God is the ruler of all of creation and we, God's servants, have responsibility to care for all that God has created. One of the greatest concerns for our world today is to care for the earth that is suffering under the weight of carbon emissions, overflowing landfills and polluted air and water. What can you do to reduce the waste that harms the earth?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Psalm 96 is a song of praise to God. It tells of the sea roaring, the creatures and fields rejoicing, and the trees singing. In what ways do you praise God through sounds and music? Sing a favorite Christian hymn. Think about what the words say about God. Then say: Sing a new song to the Lord! Everyone on this earth, sing praises to the Lord, sing and praise his name. (vv.1-2a)

PASTORAL PRAYER, SILENT PRAYER, AND THE LORD'S PRAYER.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: 1 Samuel 1:9-11, 19-20

(NRSV)

After they had eaten and drunk at Shiloh, Hannah rose and presented herself before the Lord. Now Eli the priest was sitting on the seat beside the doorpost of the temple of the Lord. ¹⁰ She was deeply distressed and prayed to the Lord, and wept bitterly. ¹¹ She made this vow: "O Lord of hosts, if only you will look on the misery of your servant, and remember me, and not forget your servant, but will give to your servant a male child, then I will set him before you as a nazirite until the day of his death. He shall drink neither wine nor intoxicants, and no razor shall touch his head."

They rose early in the morning and worshiped before the Lord; then they went back to their house at Ramah. Elkanah knew his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. ²⁰ In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, "I have asked him of the Lord."

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: 1 Samuel 2:1-10 Hannah prayed and said, "My heart exults in the Lord; my strength is exalted in my God. My mouth derides my enemies, because I rejoice in my victory. ² "There is no Holy One like the Lord, no one besides you; there is no Rock like our God. ³ Talk no more so very proudly, let not arrogance come from your mouth; for the Lord is a God of knowledge, and by him actions are weighed. ⁴ The bows of the mighty are broken, but the feeble gird on strength. ⁵ Those who were full have hired themselves out for bread. but those who were hungry are fat with spoil. The barren has borne seven, but she who has many children is forlorn. ⁶ The Lord kills and brings to life; he brings down to Sheol and raises up.

⁷ The Lord makes poor and makes rich; he brings low, he also exalts.

⁸ He raises up the poor from the dust; he lifts the needy from the ash heap,

to make them sit with princes and inherit a seat of honor.

For the pillars of the earth are the Lord's, and on them he has set the world.

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Today's narrative lectionary scriptures tell part of the story of Hannah. I'll be honest. I know the story of Samuel, Hannah's son, much better than Hannah's story. So, I did some digging for today's sermon and this is what I learned:

Hannah was the second wife to Elkanah. Like the story of Rachel and Leah a few weeks ago, Hannah was barren and the other wife, Peninnah, was not. And, like the story two weeks ago in which we learned that Jacob loved barren Rachel more than fertile Leah, we hear in scripture that Elkanah loved Hannah the most.

Every year Elkanah would offer a sacrifice at the sanctuary at Shiloh. Keep in mind, that before the Temple was built by the Jews in Jerusalem, there were other sites for the ancient Hebrews to gather and worship. The city of Shiloh was one of them. Elkanah would take his wives and his children with Peninnah to Shiloh for the sacrifices. He would give Peninnah and her children portions to sacrifice at the altar, but he always gave his beloved Hannah a double portion.

Today's reading picks up at one of those times Elkanah, Peninnah and Hannah were worshiping at Shiloh. Eli, the priest, was sitting near the entrance to the Temple and overheard Hannah's bitter tears about her barrenness and the promise she made with the Lord. Basically, she bargained with God: if he would give her a son, she would offer him to the Temple. And, in her prayer of bargaining, she promised to raise her (yet unconceived son) as a nazarite.

And what, is a nazarite? A nazarite, in ancient Hebrew tradition was someone who abstained from wine, wine vinegar, grapes and raisins. He also refrained from cutting the hair on his head. And more than that—he could comb his hair with his fingers, but never groom his hair with a comb since a comb might pull out some of the hair. And, interestingly, a nazarite must also avoid corpses and graves even those of family members. Basically, this was to keep the nazarite from being ritually impure.

According to Numbers chapter 6, a person could declare himself to be a nazarite. Also according to Numbers, a nazarite was considered "holy unto the Lord." A FATHER could also declare a son to be one, but a mother could not (yet we know that is exactly what Hannah does). Hannah so wants a child, that she is willing to say and do anything.

The piece of the story that is missing from our reading today is the priest Eli's response to overhearing Hannah's prayer. She was so upset, so wrought, when she prayed that Eli approached her, asking her if she was drunk. She assured the priest that she was not—but that she desperately wanted a child. Eli, touched by her sincerity, promised that her prayer would be answered.

And what of us? I suspect each and every one of us has hit rock bottom spiritually, emotionally or physically at some point in our lives, driven to our knees in prayer. And, like Hannah, I suspect each of us at some point in our lives has tried bargaining with God. As in "God, if you stop this from happening or make this happen, I promise I will do X" A historical example of someone bargaining with God was Reformer Martin Luther. Martin Luther's father, who worked as a miner, wanted his son to become a lawyer, so Martin studied law. He was almost done with his studies, when one day at the age of 21, he was caught outside in the midst of a violent thunderstorm. In the midst of his fear, Luther cried out to St. Anna, the patron saint of miners, "Save me, Saint Anna, and I shall become a monk!" God spared young Martin, and he kept his vow, to the great disappointment of his father and his mother.

So I wonder: Is it OKAY to bargain with God? At first blush, bargaining with God seems a bit unseemly—like we are telling God how he should respond to our crisis. Like we know better than God what is good for us. Like we can dictate to God what should happen in our lives.

But then I pause and wonder again: Does God judge against us by how poorly, ineptly, fumblingly we pray? I doubt it. I believe God loves us so extravagantly that even our less-than-perfect prayers are encouraged. Just like parents of small children—we don't punish our toddlers for getting words wrong when learning to speak, I do not believe God punishes us for praying in metaphorically toddler ways.

Tanya Lurhmann, a New York Times columnist, wrote a book in 2012 about prayer entitled "When God Talks Back: Understanding the American Evangelical Relationship with God." In her text, she says that three out of five Americans surveyed say they pray every day. And that for many of these Americans, prayer is more conversational than anything else. An engagement with God, a deepening of a relationship with the Holy One. Part of Tanya's research looked at how Christians in America from different cultural backgrounds (such as Africa and India) see prayer. What she discovered is this: European Americans have a hard time believing that God speaks to them—even in prayer.

So I ask you today: we say that God is still speaking in our lives, but have you ever experienced (in prayer or otherwise), God's voice, God's whisper, God's word spoken directly to you, to your need, and into your life?

Hannah most certainly did experience God speaking to her in response to her prayers. In due time, our reading for today tells us, she became pregnant and gave birth to Samuel. The scriptures also tell us that she kept Samuel with her until he was weaned (which, according to most scholars is less about breastfeeding and more about raising him. It is speculated that Samuel was given to the Temple in the care of the priest Eli somewhere between the ages of 6 and 12.)

And this we also know from today's readings: that when Samuel was born, Hannah's prayers became ones of thanksgiving and praise. Our entire second reading is Hannah's prayer of joy. She lifts her prayers to God who is her Rock and her strength. But then Hannah's prayer takes a somewhat political bent: her prayer speaks of God as one who girds the feeble with strength, feeds the hungry, lifts up the needy.

Over a thousand years before Jesus walked on earth, Hannah's prayer of joy acknowledges that the God we worship is on the side of the poor, the oppressed, the barren, the hungry. God, when he came to live among us in Jesus, reinforced this message. A reminder that God is less interested in the prosperity of our lives and more interested in how we treat those on the margins of life. As Christians, we are called to listen and heed Hannah's prayer of thanksgiving. As Christians, we are called to care for, what Jesus calls, the least of these. As Christians, we need to look for the face of Jesus not only in our bedtime prayers, but in the way we live our lives while awake.

And the promise is sure: God will be with us—loving us, forgiving us, challenging us to share his love. We are not alone. And, when we give ourselves completely to God—no longer begging for this, that, or the other, but simply allowing God to speak a new word for us, amazing things happen. Prayers get answered in surprising ways. Broken relationships are mended. We begin to seek out ways to serve others. Our God is an extravagant God—extravagant in love, in grace, in acceptance. When we place our full trust in him, our world opens up in completely unexpected (and awesome ways)

So, how did things end for Hannah? The Book of Numbers tells us that husbands had the authority to nullify the vows/promises/prayers of their wives, but we know that Elkinah did not. Samuel, once he was of an appropriate age, was raised by Eli in the Temple.

But there is a piece to Hannah's story I bet you don't know. If we were to read a bit further in 1 Samuel 2, we would hear this: that after Samuel's birth, she bore three more sons and two daughters.

When Hannah bargained with God that day in the Temple, she had no idea the extravagance of God's answer.

So, my dear ones: listen for the Lord. Let go of what you expect of God and be ready for a life of trust and hope. For your prayers will be answered and they will be answered in surprising, abundant and life-filled ways. Amen.
