DEVOTIONS



Read: 1 Thessalonians 2:1-8.

Paul cares deeply for the church in Thessalonica. He says that Silvanus, Timothy, and he (1:1) care for the people "like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children" (2:7). Later he would add the metaphor of a father caring for his children (2:11). Paul and his missionary friends model a way of life for the church that deeply cares for the people. It reflects part of Jesus' Great Commandment that states, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). The heart of a biblical and Christian way of life is seen in the Great Commandment and in the way Paul and his friends model that love through an intimate care of others. Today different forms of small group ministries in the church seek to live in caring community through prayer, caring and supportive conversations (including correcting one another—see Leviticus 19:17), serving the needs of one another, and celebrating life together with a variety of rich and meaningful Christian rituals and traditions. How do you benefit from the love and care of the Christian community? How do you contribute to the care of other Christians?

Pray: Loving God, we thank you for your parental care that feeds us and protects us. Give us the faith to care for and feed others with your love through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



The theme throughout the daily Bible readings this week is that Christians form intimate communities of care. How are you part of a Christian community that shows care for one another? In what ways do you serve each other's needs?



MEDITATION

The Day of the Dead (in Spanish Dia de Muertos) is a Mexican holiday celebrated throughout Mexico and by people of Mexican heritage throughout the world. This multiday holiday includes family and friends gathering to pray for and remember friends and family members who have died and to help the dead along in their spiritual journey.

Long before Spain invaded and colonized what is now Mexico, Day of the Dead was part of the Aztec religion—celebrated at the beginning of the summer. After colonization and the arrival of the Roman Catholic Church, the holiday was Christianized and moved to October 31 (All Saints' Eve), November 1 (All Saints' Day), and November 2 (All Souls' Day). Part of the celebrations for the Day of the Dead include creating home altars, honoring the dead with marigold flowers and candy skulls, and visiting the graves of loved ones in order to decorate them and leave flowers, candy, food and drink. Children who have died are typically honored on a different day than adults who have died. Toys are left at the gravesides of children and tequila or other libations for adults.

People begin planning Day of the Dead celebrations a year in advance as families prepare to gather and honor their dead. Families gather to eat their loved ones' favorite foods, to share sugar skulls with one another, and to even read humorous poetry about the deceased. Some people believe that the spirits of the deceased can enjoy the "spiritual essence" of the foods. In some parts of Mexico, blankets and pillows are put out to allow the deceased to rest after their long journeys. And depending on the region of Mexico you are from, you might either stay at your loved one's grave all night or throw a picnic with relatives at a gravesite.

I have a confession to make. I struggled mightily to put together this sermon. I was having a most difficult time in my heart and mind tying together All Saints Day with the beginning of the stewardship season. Then I remembered reading about Day of the Dead in Barbara Kingsolver's novel Animal Dreams, and my imagination grew wings.

For here is the truth of this day: whether you are worshiping with us online or in person, today is the day we have set aside at St. Paul Church to remember and honor our dead. Very few of us today will go to the cemetery to enjoy a picnic with our deceased loved ones, but our own ritual of lighting candles in memory of loved ones can offer similar comfort.

While we count our losses as a congregation, we are so incredibly mindful today of those who have died throughout our community, our nation and the world due to this deadly pandemic. We are mindful of all who are grieving the death of loved ones—knowing full well that many of these beloved ones died alone in hospitals or nursing homes. For many throughout the world, those final good-byes did not happen in person, so those who are grieving are carrying an extra burden of guilt and loss.

This is where Day of the Dead fits in. How might you find comfort in the midst of loss if you cooked up a meal that your loved one enjoyed? Would you find comfort in writing a poem in remembrance? Would you be willing to build an altar, even if for a day or two, in memory of your loved one?

Mexico's Day of the Dead reminds each of us that those who have gone before us are still very much with us in spirit. We are invited to set aside a day or two to remember, to celebrate the gift each one was to us, and to celebrate the gift their memory provides to us even today.

What also captured my imagination about Day of the Dead is the incredible care we, the living, are called to show to the dead AND to the living. Day of the Dead was never intended to be a morbid celebration of death. It was meant to be a joyful celebration of family and friends coming together to care for both the gravesites of loved ones AND to care for each other.

Our readings today from Genesis harken back to both creations stories: in the first story God's creation of humankind and our call to care for creation and in the second story to care for the earth. Friends, that kind of care translates well into a stewardship message. As beloved children created in God's image, we are challenged to steward well that which is on loan to us: our possessions, our families, our friends, and our finances.

Did you hear me? All the blessings that are ours are merely on loan to us. Your land, your home, your possessions and even the contents of your bank account are yours to cultivate, tend and harvest/share with others. As we move into St. Paul's stewardship season, we are reminded that all that we have, all that we are, all that we do, comes to us by the grace of God. We are called NOT to hoard that which we claim as ours. For it is ultimately not ours. We are called to share and care and give of our time, our talents, our possessions and our bank accounts extravagantly.

Over the next few weeks you are encouraged to consider what portion of your financial blessings you want to prayerfully give back to God by way of the many ministries and missions of St. Paul. You are encouraged to consider what tangible ways you want to thank God for your blessings: health and home, family and friends, faith and wonder and joy. All Saints Day serves as a reminder that we have been blessed in extraordinary ways by those who have gone before us. Day of the Dead reminds us that we are called to care for both the living and the dead: not just for a few days a year, but every day for the rest of our lives.

The Buddha once said, Thousands of candles can be lit from a single candle, and the life of the candle will not be shortened. Happiness never decreases by being shared. This week I challenge you to find ways to share your happiness, your joy, your blessings with others. Included among those blessings is the gift of those who have gone before us.

A common symbol of the Day of the Dead is the skull (in Spanish calavera), which is represented in masks and foods such as sugar or chocolate skulls. During this holiday, sugar skulls, in particular, are to be given to both the dead and the living. In your pews you have sugar skull lollipops: and you should have more than are people seated with you. This week, eat one of those lollipops as you remember and celebrate someone in your life who has joined the heavenly banquet.

Then, share the extra lollipops with someone who is grieving. Let them know you are thinking of them and praying for them. Remind them that the dead belong to God and have been welcomed into Jesus' loving arms. Friends: this week share your love, your blessings and your sugar skulls with others. Amen.

WE RESPOND WITH OUR GIFTS

OFFERING INVITATION: All the rules and laws of our faith can be summed up in the law of love for God and for one another. Everything hangs on that: the law of love. We don't just talk about love here at St. Paul Church, we bring it to life in ministry. We offer hospitality. We feed our neighbors. We welcome all. In all these things we worship and love God and we offer our love to our neighbors. This is what this ministry, and our gifts, are all about, and all of it hangs on love. Let us gather our gifts together and offer them to God in gratitude and praise.



October Monthly Mission: Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the U.S. One third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). CAIM provides Christian ministry and witness to American Indians and to the wider church justice issues that affect American Indian life. Historically, the forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with different tribes in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin and Nebraska. There are now 20 UCC churches on reservations. There are many Indians who are members of other UCC churches and CAIM also supports these churches and pastors.

Two thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries in the US. (JWM) supports a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. NIN grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. In the last two years our own St. Paul received a grant for \$5000.00 from NIN for our Community Garden and for the annual Art Camp. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities throughout the US.
