#### **DEVOTIONS**

Read: Matthew 23:1-12.

A famous proverb by the historian Lord Acton states, "Power tends to corrupt, and absolute power corrupts absolutely." Jesus made similar points when he accused scribes and Pharisees of not living up to the standards they set for others. Micah 3:5-12 accused Israel's false prophets of being self-serving, prophesying to others whatever benefited themselves. One of the challenges of the church today is coming to terms with the corruptibility of television evangelists, pastors and priests who abuse children, and the church leaders who protect them. There continues to be evidence today of religious leaders who don't practice what they preach. Jesus rejects the prestige of religious titles that put some above others like scribe, Pharisee, rabbi, teacher, or instructor. The true power of the kingdom is to serve others in love, not to flaunt one's power and authority over others. Christians are on the same level, not one above another. They are able to bless and serve others in a way that reflects the power of love, grace, and service. As Jesus said, "The greatest among you will be your servant" (v. 11). How do Jesus' teachings free you to speak and serve equally with all other disciples of Christ? *Pray:* **Almighty God, you alone rule over your church with absolute grace and truth. Help us to humbly receive your power of love and serve others through Christ our Lord. Amen.** 

## SERVICE

Think about what Jesus said to the crowds and disciples when he said that "the greatest among you will be your servant." Do you know someone who humbly serves others, never asking to be applauded? Call or send a thank you note to that person letting them know you appreciate their humble service.

### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

Jesus teaches us to be humble and not be a show off. Write acts of service on sticky notes and post on a wall. Take one down each day; think about or discuss whether you have ever done the act, then pray: Dear God, help me to live humbly in your eyes and serve others in love. Amen.

Today marks week two in our four-week stewardship series. In the past several years, St. Paul Church has followed prepackaged stewardship programs to encourage each of us to consider how we can more generously give back to God that which he has given us. This year is a little bit different. One of our Stewardship Team members was a confirmation mentor last year. Each year in confirmation, we set aside one full evening's lesson to focus on stewardship. This particular mentor was so taken with how we teach stewardship to our teenagers, he suggested that we use this same format to talk about stewardship with our congregation.

So this is how we begin that confirmation class. Each student and mentor serve as a two-person team for the opening game. I give each team fifty pennies and a paper cup. We line ourselves up in the auditorium: students on one line and mentors about thirty feet away on the other line. Then, mentors begin to toss those fifty pennies to their student with the paper cup. The student's job is to catch the pennies in the cup. The team that catches the most pennies wins and the winners get to keep whatever money they have in the cup.

You can imagine the chaos that ensues. Pennies are flying in the auditorium fast and furious. Most miss the mark of the paper cup. Some land in the paper cup, only to bounce out. When all the pennies have been tossed, we stop the action to count what has been collected in the cups. Rarely does any team have more than ten pennies in their cup. After we have cheered for the winning team, we scramble to pick up all the pennies that landed on the floor (which, I must add, is the EXACT SAME COLOR AS A PENNY!).

Then, I ask the students and mentors how it felt to be tossing and catching pennies. I then ask if the teams might have played more seriously if we were tossing quarters, half-dollar coins or even dollar coins. You can imagine the answer. If we think a lot of money is at stake, we typically play the game more carefully. I wrap up that activity by explaining to the class that stewardship is about how we care for money: how we save it, how we spend it, how we share it with others.

After the game, we go back to the Assembly Room to complete worksheets on what, for us this season, are the four topics around

stewardship: Care for our money/others/creation, Tithing, Sacrificial Giving, and Christian Stewardship. Last week we covered caring for the blessings God has given us and entrusted us to share. Today, the topic is tithing.

Our scripture lesson for today is a brief piece that picks up at the end of the story of Jacob leaving home to start a new life. (Remember Jacob? His brother was Esau and his father was Isaac—son of Abraham and Sarah. Jacob was the scoundrel who tricked his aging father Isaac into giving him a blessing—a blessing that rightly belonged to Esau, the first born. And yet, God chose this scoundrel to marry, have children and start the Hebrew nation.).

So back to Jacob. He left home (which was probably a wise move, considering how angry his brother was). As Jacob traveled from Beersheba to Haran, he stopped to rest one night. Using a stone as a pillow, Jacob dreamed of a ladder reaching up to heaven, with angels climbing up and down that ladder. Then, still in the dream, the Lord appeared to Jacob promising that from Jacob would come a nation of people to populate the earth and that God himself would bless both Jacob and his offspring.

Today's reading picks up when Jacob woke up the next morning. He took that stone pillow, poured oil upon it, creating an altar promising to give back to God one tenth of what God gave first to him.

One tenth. A tithe. Christians talk about giving to God their "tithes and offerings", but how often do we pause to consider what our giving might look like if we reached that 10% mark? Recently author Mike Holmes addressed what would happen if Christians were to start giving a minimum of 10% of their income away to churches or other charitable organizations. He guestimates that \$165 billion dollars would become available to be used in these ways:

- 1. \$25 billion could relieve global hunger and eliminate deaths from preventable diseases within five years
- 2. \$15 billion could solve the world's water and sanitation issues specifically in places where a majority of the people live on less than \$1 per day
- 3. \$12 billion could end illiteracy
- 4. \$1 billion could fully fund all overseas mission work

5. \$100-110 billion would be left over for additional ministry expansion

Now hear me well: as the St. Paul family we need to become less focused on meeting the bare basic needs of our annual budget. We need to dream big. We need to dig deeply into our pockets that we might be able to meet the needs of our neighbors. And yes: I know we are already doing well with missional outreach. My dream for our congregation would be that we not only feed hungry people, we work as a community to eliminate hunger by getting to the root causes of food insecurity.

I'm not implying that tithing—giving 10% of our incomes is easy. Even if each of us committed to growing our giving for 2021 by one percentage point—then continuing to grow that amount each year, at the most, in 10 years we would be in a financial position to dream bigger than we can possibly imagine today.

Let me tell you about my friend Larry Rezash. Larry is a retired UCC pastor who, in his early career, worked for the UCC Pension Board before going back to serving in parish settings. For many years while I was serving at David's Church in Kettering, Larry would join our Marriage Seminar Team twice a year to lead a financial workshop for folk who were engaged to be married. This is what Larry told our young adults: we need to challenge ourselves to live comfortably within 80% of our income in order to stay out of debt. Then, we need to save 10% of our income for a rainy day. And finally, Larry challenged our young people to then take the final 10% and give it away joyfully. Larry argues that when we are in a habit of giving extravagantly, two things happen: our joy comes from placing our trust in God AND we no longer keep track of what we give—because generosity becomes a lifestyle rather than an obligation or a burden.

God has big dreams for St. Paul Church. We are called to not only dream alongside the Holy One, but to turn those dreams into action as we continue to care for the poor, the hungry, the marginalized, as we continue to be the Church of the Wide Welcome, as we seek to offer Jesus' love and grace to everyone we encounter. We can do this. God can do this through us. And may his kingdom come on earth (right here, right now) as it is in heaven. Amen WE RESPOND WITH OUR GIFTS

OFFERING INVITATION: There is a difference between planning and preparation. We cannot plan the future that God holds, but we can prepare for each day with practices of generosity. Generosity helps us to forgive and to heal; it helps us to make peace in the world; it helps to bring justice and mercy to those in need. Our financial gifts we give are one way we prepare for God's coming into the world in the most unexpected ways. Let us gather our gifts together and offer them to God in gratitude and praise. Amen.

## SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

INVITATION: In last week's sermon I talked about Mexico's Day of the Dead—and how people of Mexican heritage honor their deceased loved ones by making altars, writing poetry, and eating the favorite foods of their loved ones. Today, we gather for the Sacrament of Holy Communion to remember the One who has gone before us: Christ Jesus who lived, died and rose again that we might know life abundant for all eternity. But there is a difference between Day of the Dead and Communion: we do not need to gather at Jesus' grave, because the tomb is empty. He is not there. Today, as we share the Lord's Supper, we are called to remember Christ, to honor him and love him beyond measure. Let us pray.

COMMUNION PRAYER

People: And also with you.

Leader: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them to the Lord.
