DEVOTIONS

Read: Matthew 25:1-13.

This parable seems harsh. We might think we are to have mercy on the foolish and not lock them out. A more merciful approach is evident in the next chapter when Jesus' leadership team of disciples falls asleep while Jesus prays in the garden (26:36-46). Jesus chastises them without a sense of rejection. In this parable the church is reminded to live with the final victory of God in Christ in view. It is to impact our daily lives as we wait for Christ's second coming. However, unless there is a particular experience of suffering, we tend to live without paying much attention to Christ's coming again. Jesus is alerting his followers to the importance of watchfulness of the times and readiness to act faithfully at any given moment. That is when the church blesses, serves with justice, and offers salvation in Jesus' name. How might a conscious awareness of Christ's victory and return to "judge the living and the dead" (Apostles' Creed), impact your daily conduct?

Pray: Come Lord Jesus, strengthen our lives of faith that we may anticipate your coming again with joy and serve our neighbor in love. Amen.

SERVICE

According to Amos, worship without acts of justice for the needy is meaningless to God. During and after a worship service, take time to think about how God's acts of love and mercy for you and all humanity lead you to do acts of kindness and love for others.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

The foolish bridesmaids in the parable did not have additional oil for their lamps. The light in their lamps could not shine. They were not ready. It is important to be ready and let the light of Jesus' love shine. We can do this by being ready to do God's work everyday. One way to be ready is to pray for others, read scripture, and bless others. Use this blessing daily during this week: **May the light of Christ shining through you show your readiness to do God's work**.

SERMON "To Be Fully Alive" Rev. David Long-Higgins I want to begin this morning by saying what a delight it is to be with you, friends. Thanks Pastor Becky and all of you for the kind invitation which, though delayed by COVID 19, has not finally been denied. It is a kind of motion in life that is very much at the heart of our scripture text this morning and our exploration of the theme of sacrificial giving. More about that in just a moment. But first I would like to bring you a little update about the Conference by way of bringing greetings to you and also a word of deep thanks. Together in the Conference we are in a season of midwifing new ways to be ever more collaborative and mutually strengthening. God has set before us as the Heartland Conference a vision of life where together in Christ's love, we collaborate to reconcile and restore all of God's creation.

Of course, this is not work done on our own. We are empowered by the Holy Spirit to connect, equip and support our faith communities to grow as faith disciples and responsible stewards, following Jesus' call to extravagantly love all God's children and creation.

One of the signs of this new chapter into which we are living into has to do with a name change for the conference that helps to frame theologically and spiritually the work that God is doing in our midst. That new name is you probably now know is the Heartland Conference and is based on this passage from Ezekiel 11:19: "I will give them one heart and put a new spirit within them."

I want to take just a moment to bring greetings from your relatives. As the Transitional Conference Minister, it is my great honor and privilege to bring you greetings from the 338 other congregations which make up the Heartland Conference of the United Church of Christ, which you may know includes two congregations in West Virginia and seven in Northern Kentucky just across the river from Cincinnati.

I also bring you greetings from our General Minister and President Rev. John Dorhauer and Associate General Ministers Rev. Traci Blackmon in Justice and local church ministries, and the Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson, Associate General Minister for Global Ministries. I also bring you greetings on behalf of our global ministry with nearly 300 partners in 90 countries around the world who share in our response to the commission of Jesus Christ to meet all God's people at the place of deepest need. Even more I bring you greetings from my home church, Zion UCC in Delaware, Ohio, and my pastor, the Rev. Beth Gedert.

If you haven't quite caught on, you and I are in a web of blessing and mutual encouragement and support that daily changes the lives of people near and far. Your gifts to Our Churches Wider Mission make these lifegiving connections possible – right here in Ohio and around the world. I know that you are a five for five congregation in the UCC. If you don't know what that means it means that as a congregation in addition to OCWM you have given to disaster relief through One Great Hour of Sharing. In the past year, together we have been a presence in the recovery efforts following the tornados in the wider Dayton area where it will likely take five years for full recovery.

Whether you know it nor not, new churches are getting established and older churches renewing through your support of our Strengthen the Church offering. You have supported and encouraged our Native American Congregations and helped advocate for a world in which all may flourish through Neighbors in Need.

You have been supporting our retired pastors and their spouses through the Christmas Fund who served faithfully in smaller congregations and struggle now in retirement to make ends meet.

So I say, thank you from the bottom of my heart, dear friends, for your faithfulness to this mission of love which we share together near and far. Now this is about more than just money. These gifts are about an energy and capacity for love to become real in the life of the world right where you live and throughout the world because that is the commission of Jesus Christ. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

As I said earlier, I am the Transitional Conference Minister for the Heartland Conference of which we are all a part. But the truth is that we are all transitional conference ministers. Because to live the Christian life is to be in a season of transformation from one thing that we know to a deeper reality to which God invites so that our joy and the joy of the world may be more and more full so that the peace of the world may grow.

I am guessing you have noticed, as I have, that life does not pause in one spot. It is we might say, relentlessly on the move - often times between that which is familiar and that which takes us into the unknown and back again, but never to exactly same place. We know that reality well in these days of COVID 19, do we not?

It is the place where we find the Israelites in our reading from the Prophet Isaiah this morning. As I mentioned earlier, our text this morning comes from what scholars often refer to as "Third Isaiah" – that time after the 70 years of exile in Babylon when the people have finally gotten the chance to return to their homeland. One would think that now that they are back in the familiar all would be well. The temple has been rebuilt, the ancient practices have been re-engaged, all should be smooth sailing from this point forward, right?

But apparently not. Apparently 70 years of exile and just plain old inertia and fatigue, even though you've come home, will cause learning to fade and old habits to re-emerge – allowing the stuff that carried the people into exile in the first place to get forgotten like some kind of amnesia caused by the familiar. So, there is a disconnect going on. The people notice it and so does God.

The people wonder out loud, "Why do fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?" They could have said, "Come on God, do your part here. We are skipping some meals on your behalf – surely you could meet us half-way."

And God responds through the prophet, "Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day, and oppress all your workers. Look you fast only to quarrel and fight and to strike with a wicked fist." God notices something: The outward practices are being engaged, but their hearts have not been opened. The people are at risk of engaging life in the way their ancestors did just prior to being taken into exile.

Then, just in case the people have missed the point, the prophet gets specific. *"Is not this the fast I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to the let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly."*

Now you may have noticed that there are a couple of gems hidden inside this word that comes from the prophet - all of which have to do with our discovery of what it means to be fully alive.

First a word about it means to break the bonds of injustice - which is one of the most persistent themes in the Bible. Or maybe it would be better said in the positive, "What does the justice of God look like? Of course, no definition will be finally adequate. Sometimes we might think of justice as simple fairness. This is a common understanding. But the prophetic vision goes far deeper. Justice is the ongoing work toward an arrangement of life where all God's children can freely use their gifts without fear for the upbuilding of the common good and the good of creation, so that all may share in God's abundance and joy. Justice is at the heart of what it means to be fully alive.

To be fully alive, means to have our hearts broken open by the suffering of others in such a way that we are moved to come up along aside it and tend it using whatever gifts God has given us. It is captured in two simple questions, "Where are people hurting and how can I help?"

Now you may have noticed an interesting thing here. This work is sacrificial and sacramental. You may know that in the ancient world, sacrificial is often expressed by having something broken open in such a way that the ordinary became a sign of the presence of the holy. This is where we get the word sacrament from. Sacraments like communion and baptism in our tradition, are signs of the holy breaking forth in our lives.

But the sacramental life, is not just in these two acts. It is in every act of giving by which our hearts are broken open and strangely healed at the same time. This motion of God will show up in the most surprising of ways. I have seen it.

Prior to coming into this role of transitional conference minister I was a local church pastor for over 30 years. In the last parish I served, David's United Church of Christ in Canal Winchester, I had many wise friends who taught me about the Christian faith and even more importantly bore for me the presence of God.

One of my greatest teachers was the only person I have ever been with on the day of his birth, the day of his baptism, traveled almost all the way through confirmation and was with him on the day of his untimely death at age 15. This wise teacher's name was Aidan. Aidan had neurofibromatosis which you may know is a growth of tumors at the end of one's nerves. By age five, Aidan been through more chemo and doctors and hospitals than most of us will experience in a lifetime.

A tumor from the NF on Aidan's optic nerve had rendered him legally blind, though he could see shadowy figures with his eyes. But the vision of his heart was 20/20. Maybe you have known someone like this in your own life. One Sunday morning during worship, while I was up in the chancel offering the assurance of forgiveness following our prayer of confession, I noticed that the folks in the congregation were breaking out in smiles. And I thought to myself, they are really getting it. They are really getting how much God loves them and that God can never cease to be love. There was delight in the house of the Lord.

Then I noticed something. Aidan was slowly walking up the center aisle and I could tell that he was handing something out. He had started at the very back the pews were quite full as was often the case and bit by bit he was working his way forward. In his hand was a baggie. And in that baggie were cards which everyone got.

Finally, he got up to where I was standing, stuck his hand in the baggie and pulled out a card and handed it to me. And he said, "Here Dave, you'll probably need this." On it read, "Aidan Carter, Smileologist Extraordinaire If you've lost your smile, I'll help you find it."

Of course, I could not help but smile along with the rest of the congregation and feel the joy of God rising up inside me. On that day, we all knew what it meant to be fully alive. This blind boy helped us see God more clearly.

Because we all knew that every one of us goes hurting at some point and needs the light of God's love to break forth in unexpected ways that heal divisions and dares us to dream of a world more beautiful and good.

We were also taught something about the sacramental and sacrificial nature of life. You see, by the world's standards looking from the outside it appeared that Aidan had nothing to give to the world. But by God's standard of grace, he gave everything in an unselfconscious freedom that broken open closed hearts and stirred a discovery of the love that actually holds life together.

And he reminded us that there is no human being born without a gift to give. And when we give the gift freely, responding to the aching heart of another, God multiplies that gift many times over. And not only that, such sacrificial giving breaks us open in such a way that we become sacramental signs – that is actual signs of the life and love of Jesus Christ in the life of the world.

Now you together, as community of followers of Jesus Christ, are in a season of renewal, thanksgiving, and sacrifice. I asked Pastor Becky to include a little baggie in your bulletins and in the mailing that went out this week. You probably wondered what in the world is that for?

It's a little reminder to you from Aidan. Your life is that baggie. And though it appears empty, it isn't. You know the gifts God has given you that actually fill that bag. The question is in what way is God inviting you to become fully alive through the gifts you will offer so that the joy of the world local and global may grow?

Only you can answer that question. But as you consider it, may you continue to be blessed with an awareness of the larger move of God breaking you open so that by God's grace you will discover the promise which the prophet provides.

Then shall your light break forth like the dawn, your healing spring up quickly. Your call answered by the Holy One who in your hour of need says, "Here I am." Friends, you can trust this promise with your whole life. It is the good news! I give thanks to God for you. Blessings and Godspeed. Amen and Amen.
