DEVOTIONS



Read: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11.

Good times and hard times can happen—and change—rather quickly (v. 3). Daily life is fragile. Life experiences can change dramatically with a phone call. What is constant is the need to care for one another and build up the body of Christ. There are important connections between this text and the parable of the talents in Matthew 25. God has gifted us to use our vocation, our calling in life as a child of God, to do God's work in the world. If we do not do this, if we ignore or hide our calling, the ministry of the church suffers. Instead, we are to trust in a God who acts; we are not to fall prey to complacency and speak and live as though God is not present and active in our lives and history (Zephaniah 1:12). Paul reminds the people that they—and we—are to reach out to others—especially our brothers and sisters in the faith. We are to do so with encouragement to live each day in faith, love, and hope because of the God who acts and has given us "salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thessalonians 5:9). How are you encouraged by others to live your faith? How do you encourage others? Pray: God of grace, we thank you for the cloud of witnesses that walk alongside us to strengthen us in faith, love, and hope through Christ. Amen.


RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 12:13-21, 29-34 (The Message)

Someone out of the crowd said, "Teacher, order my brother to give me a fair share of the family inheritance."

14 He replied, "Mister, what makes you think it's any of my business to be a judge or mediator for you?"

15 Speaking to the people, he went on, "Take care! Protect yourself against the least bit of greed. Life is not defined by what you have, even when you have a lot."

16-19 Then he told them this story: "The farm of a certain rich man produced a terrific crop. He talked to himself: 'What can I do? My barn isn't big enough for this harvest.' Then he said, 'Here's what I'll do: I'll tear down my barns and build bigger ones. Then I'll gather in all my grain and goods, and I'll say to myself, Self, you've done well! You've got it made and can now retire. Take it easy and have the time of your life!'

20 "Just then God showed up and said, 'Fool! Tonight you die. And your barnful of goods—who gets it?'

21 "That's what happens when you fill your barn with Self and not with God."

"What I'm trying to do here is get you to relax, not be so preoccupied with getting so you can respond to God's giving. People who don't know God and the way he works fuss over these things, but you know both God and how he works. Steep yourself in God-reality,

God-initiative, God-provisions. You'll find all your everyday human concerns will be met. Don't be afraid of missing out. You're my dearest friends! The Father wants to give you the very kingdom itself.

33-34 "Be generous. Give to the poor. Get yourselves a bank that can't go bankrupt, a bank in heaven far from bankrobbers, safe from embezzlers, a bank you can bank on. It's obvious, isn't it? The place where your treasure is, is the place you will most want to be, and end up being.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: 1 Timothy 6:10, 17-19 (<u>The Message</u>)

But if it's only money these leaders are after, they'll self-destruct in no time. Lust for money brings trouble and nothing but trouble. Going down that path, some lose their footing in the faith completely and live to regret it bitterly ever after.

Tell those rich in this world's wealth to quit being so full of themselves and so obsessed with money, which is here today and gone tomorrow. Tell them to go after God, who piles on all the riches we could ever manage—to do good, to be rich in helping others, to be extravagantly generous. If they do that, they'll build a treasury that will last, gaining life that is truly life.

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

This is a true story.

Once upon a time there was a church camp that ran well on a tight budget. The camp was only open in the summer time and was run entirely by volunteers—good church folk who would give of their time, talent, and dollars to organize, publicize, and run the camp—from cooks & counselors to life guards and grounds keepers. The camp was much loved because everyone felt a part of the camping community.

Now this camp had a fair amount of acreage, so volunteers would bring their lawn mowers in the back of pick-up trucks and trailers to cut the grass. After years of doing things this way, it was decided that funds should be raised to purchase a riding mower so volunteers would not need to lug their equipment to and fro each week.

The mower was purchased and the problems began: where would the mower be stored? A shed was built on the campgrounds to keep the mower and its accessories. A lock was purchased to keep burglars at bay. Then the people asked, "But how can we know our lawn mower is really secure?" So, they hired a caretaker—one who would keep track of both the lawn AND the lawn mower. Then the people said, "It would be so much easier (and safer) if the caretaker lived on-site." So, the people built a house—a wonderful brick ranch home in which the caretaker and his family would live.

What began as a simple outreach project—a way children to know God through church camp experiences—turned into a high-maintenance year-round financial burden for all involved. The joy had been drained. What began as a fairy tale "once upon a time" did not end with "happily ever after."

In today's first scripture lesson Jesus tells a parable to the man in the crowd who wanted a share of the family inheritance. Jesus, refusing to get involved with the politics of greed, sidestepped the man's request and told his own story: a parable that gets to the heart of the matter: that *far too often*, we make the STUFF of our lives matter *far too much*. We stockpile our stuff; we hoard our stuff; and we build and rent storage units for our stuff—certain that our lives be of greater value because of the stuff we surround ourselves with.

It might be easy to see Jesus' parable of the rich farmer as a metaphor for the uber-rich of our nation—the billionaires, the tech giants, those movers and shakers of our nation. But truly, this story holds up a mirror to our OWN lives—calling each of us to account in our culture of greed. Life is not a contest of who has the most toys at the end of the day. For most certainly, we in the United States have more toys (and electronics, and clothes, and food, and cars, and books, and stuff and stuff) than most of the rest of the world.

Jesus takes a request spoken out of greed and turns it into a teachable moment—that by looking at life through Jesus' eyes, we might ALL be transformed.

If we read and spoke Greek, we would immediately catch the intentional play on words between "merry" and "fool." The rich man planned to rest upon his riches and be merry, but was merely a fool.

Today, too, we are forced to ask if our own greed-filled merriment has become folly. What IS the root of our foolishness? What was the source of the rich man's folly? Scholars tell us that Jesus' rich farmer was foolish in layers upon layers.

First, the rich farmer was preoccupied with his possessions. When reading the parable carefully, you get no sense of family or friends in the man's life—only his stuff. What's more, there is no sense from the farmer that he needed anyone in his life—by storing up his riches, he could take care of himself just fine, thank-you-very-much. It never even occurred to him to SHARE his abundant harvest with anyone besides himself. Pleasure: eating, drinking and being merry were his highest good.

But the foolishness of the rich farmer also has theological implications. By claiming the harvest entirely as his own, the man failed to acknowledge the Creator and Source of all life. God—our Creative Mother—was the source of the abundant harvest and is the source of our harvests today.

Digging even deeper, because there was no acknowledgement of God in the man's life, he did not fulfill Old Testament Law—by offering back to God ten percent of his harvest—in thanksgiving for life itself. Whether his harvest had been measly and pitiful or delightfully abundant, God is still the God—the source of all life. Instead of sharing his bounty with others, he stored it away—probably in with heavy padlocks to keep the "those people" away from his goods.

When Jesus tells the parable, he shifts the focus. Abundant life is not experienced in how much stuff we accumulate, but in how we choose to live. No matter the amount of our harvest, we ARE richly blessed indeed. We have food, clothing, shelter, support of a faith community, and privileges beyond the imagination of most.

What Jesus seems to be telling the man who wanted his brother's inheritance (and seems to be telling each of us) is that we each need to choose whom we will serve: the frantic-paced, stuff-acquiring culture that blares its continual commercials into our senses OR God: who calls us to a life of service and love. Wealth is not about loads of grain in our barns,

but in richness toward God. The wealth we choose, the life we lead, is a choice we are called to make each and every day of our lives.

Today is Stewardship Sunday. For the past few weeks, we have been given space during worship to consider how we can share of our abundance, share of our poverty, and share our lives. As a congregation, we DO have bills to pay: utility bills, insurance, program supplies, staffing. What I say to you today is this: the decision you make to financially support ministry through St. Paul Church is not about meeting a budget, but about serving God. It is about finding joy in service. It is about tearing the padlocks off of our hearts and our minds and our lives so that the Spirit will dance within—and we cannot help but sing God's praises.

Giving of our abundance, giving of our poverty, sharing our blessings, and sharing our lives is a spiritual practice we are called to make our own. The choice is ours to make.

Jesus' parable of the rich farmer pushes each of us to choose that which we serve, that which we worship. Will we be rich in the world or rich toward God? Will we serve ourselves or offer our best to others?

You should have received in the mail this week pledge cards. If you are worshiping with us online, I encourage you to complete the cards and send them in to our office. If you are worshiping with us in person today, I encourage you to complete the cards, placing them in the baskets found on the round tables. The dollar amount you pledge to God through St. Paul is a reflection of your spiritual journey, your walk of faith, and a thank-offering for the blessings in your life.

Friends, as we prepare to give generously and joyfully, I invite all who are comfortably able to stand that we might share in the Responsive Litany that speaks to who we are as God's holy people.


