DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 13:24-37.

Advent begins with an awareness of the frailty of life. We may come up with short-term fixes like finding shelter, warmth, and food. There is always the challenge of the unforeseen storm that can flood our lives with devastation, when the whole world seems to be falling down around us (w. 24-25). No generation escapes these trials and sufferings (w. 29-30). It happened to the people who returned from Babylonian captivity (Isaiah 64); it happened to the first Christians as noted by Mark in chapter 13; and, it happens all around the world today. What we need is the God who promises to show up and be the difference-maker. This Advent we are reminded to be alert to this God who shows up in Jesus of Nazareth. In Jesus we have hope because we have the one in whom the truth of his words will never pass away, never end, never fail (v. 31). So live life with gusto, with courage, with hope, and stay awake, keep alert, don't give up (vv. 33, 35, and 37). How does public worship, reading the Bible and prayer help you stay awake to Jesus' coming into our lives?

Pray: Almighty and living God, give us hope and confidence to await your coming into our lives with faith in your healing and renewing power through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



Advent is a time to recall the basic needs of life: a loving and gracious God and justice and mercy that all may have enough to live. In what ways can you "stay awake" this Advent season by caring for the needs of others and providing needed resources for the homeless?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



The church year begins on the first Sunday in Advent. This coming year, the Gospel readings will be from Mark. To launch the new church year, gather together all the Bibles in your home. If you have an Advent wreath, place the Bibles near the wreath. As you light the first candle, the candle of hope, use this prayer of blessing: Almighty God, we thank for you for the Bible, and especially for the good news about Jesus our Savior. Give us hope as we read, listen to, and think about what the Bible says to us in this new church year. Make us into people who are strong in our faith and full of love. Amen.

GREETING AND LIGHTING OF CANDLES: The history of humanity is fraught with pain—especially the pain that is accompanied by fear and leads to oppression and violence of one group of people against another. This is the world into which Jesus was born and through which his teachings would challenge and call for transformation. Our opening words come from an anonymous Jewish poet: *I believe in the sun, even when the sun is not shining,* were scrawled on a wall during the Holocaust. These words have become part of our theme song for our season—calling us to examine our tendencies to annihilate fear by annihilating each other.

The entire poem goes like this:

"I believe in the sun even when it is not shining And I believe in love, even when there's no one there. And I believe in God, even when he is silent.

I believe through any trial, there is always a way But sometimes in this suffering and hopeless despair My heart cries for shelter, to know someone's there But a voice rises within me, saying hold on my child, I'll give you strength, I'll give you hope. Just stay a little while.

I believe in the sun
even when it is not shining
And I believe in love
even when there's no one there
But I believe in God
even when he is silent
I believe through any trial
there is always a way.

May there someday be sunshine May there someday be happiness May there someday be love May there someday be peace....

The power of story and music will call us this season to a different response: transformation and reconciliation through hope, love, joy and peace. This Advent and Christmas, let us fill our days and our nights with music and light as we affirm and act upon the reasons we can still "believe, even when" we are discouraged.

As we light the altar and Christ candles, I invite those of you who are worshiping at home to light a candle or candles in preparation for today's worship.





CHILDREN'S MOMENT: THIS LITTLE LIGHT OF MINE

No one knows exactly who wrote it, but during the 1950's and 1960's our African American brothers and sisters sang this song as a song of resistance: as a reminder that no matter the oppressive circumstances, no matter the darkness we experience, God's light within us shines through when we let it.

Each week during the Children's Moment we are going to add a verse to this song so that by the time Christmas comes, we will be ready to celebrate the birth of God's Light in our midst.

(NRSV)

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

² As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way;

³ the voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,"

⁴ John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶ Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷ He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸ I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

SERMON Rev. Becky Erb Strang

On this first Sunday of Advent we focus on hope. In these dark days of coronavirus, hope seems most difficult. So much has changed for us this past year: many of us cannot even begin to count our losses—loss of loved ones, loss of careers, loss of financial security, loss of dreams. And yet, no matter the state of the world, Advent arrives, beckoning us to imagine hope in the midst of the bleak midwinter.

Hope. The story I tell you today is a story of hope. Rafael Schachter was a music composer and conductor of Jewish decent born in 1905 in Eastern Europe. By 1941 he was rounded up by the Nazis and placed in the Terezin concentration camp in the Czech Republic. As you can imagine, the conditions at the camp were brutal and seemingly hopeless, yet Mr. Schachter did not give up hope. Instead, he had a plan.

Against all odds, he had a piano smuggled into the basement of the men's barracks. With only one copy of Italian composer Giuseppe Verdi's Requiem, he taught other prisoners—both women and men to sing. And this is what those primarily Jewish men and women discovered: that singing is an act of resistance, an act of defiance. Learning and singing that Catholic funeral mass brought hope into a seemingly hopeless situation. The prisoners began to perform their music and ultimately

received the support of their jailers to keep making music. (But I have to add: the Nazis saw these choirs as proof that the conditions at the concentration camp were not terrible. The prisoners, however, saw the music as a form of resistance and hope.)

Instinctively we know that music has the power to change our moods, change our day, change our lives. Singing, playing or listening to music has the power to take us away from our present circumstances and to locate us more fully within Peace and Light and Love. And Hope.

Perhaps this is why our Advent worship services are more important this year than most years. We are surrounded by sickness and death. The news from our nation and our world seems bleak. And yet, we who call ourselves Christians have set aside these weeks to place our hope in a newborn baby: Baby Jesus.

Throughout Advent our scripture lessons will mirror this hope. Each week we will read from the prophet Isaiah—the portion of Isaiah written while the people of Israel were living in exile in Babylon—far away from all that was familiar to them. For approximately 70 years the Israelites were forced to leave their homeland and lay down roots far, far from all that was familiar. And scriptures tell us that was a bleak time in Jewish history. If you want a sense of the despair, read Psalm 137: a cry of agony of the displaced Jewish people in Babylon—an agony that sought revenge with violence.

And yet, today's Old Testament lesson from the prophet Isaiah serves as a reminder that God is in charge. No matter where the Israelites might be living, no matter the distance from the Promised Land, God is still God and Shepherd of their lives. And our lives.

Friends, no matter how badly the coronavirus wants to strip us of our lives, our livelihoods and our freedoms, God is still God. No matter how deep into exile you are in your living room, God is still your Shepherd, my Shepherd, and the Shepherd of both our neighbors AND our enemies. God's love, God's hope, God's peace does not guarantee a life without difficulties, a life without disease, but he does promise us his presence in times both incredibly joyful and overpoweringly awful.

So we look to Jesus. Throughout Advent our New Testament readings each week will be the opening verses of each of our four gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. We began today with Mark because scholars believe it was the first of these four books to be published and shared widely. I'm sure you noticed it: there is no nativity story in Mark. There is no baby Jesus at the beginning of this Gospel. Today we read that Jesus shows up fully grown, ready to be baptized by his cousin, tempted in the wilderness, and proclaiming the good news of repentance and hope.

What might be our takeaway on this first Sunday of Advent? It comes down to hope. Throughout the centuries, our Old Testament tells us that God tried over and over again to bring his people into covenant, into his Shepherd's embrace. And yet the people still wandered. God sent them prophets and teachers. God sent them kings and judges and yet the Israelites kept turning to that which is not God, that which is not Love.

The takeaway? God sent Jesus: his very own son to live amongst us that we might never be separated from God. Because of Jesus, we have hope. Because of Jesus, we can sing—even in the prisons of our homes and minds. Because of Jesus, we spend these weeks awaiting Love to be born among us in this most difficult of times.

This week, I encourage you, I challenge you, to reach out to someone who is hurting, someone who is sick, someone who is experiencing isolation. Give that person a call. Send her a letter. Drop cookies off at his doorstep. BE Jesus for your neighbors.

And if it is you who is hurting or sick or isolated: sing. Be gentle with yourself. Make your prayers visual: visually inviting Jesus into your home and to your kitchen table. In this season of waiting, in this year of waiting, we are challenged to seek hope in unexpected places—for God's hope, grace and love are guaranteed.

Rafael Schachter's choirs sang and sang and sang. Survivors of the concentration camp even to this day speak of the hope they discovered when they sang together.

And Verdi's Requiem? Those words sung in Latin for a Christian funeral service, deeply touched the primarily Jewish prisoners. And what were those words?

Recall, merciful Jesus,

that I was the reason for your journey:

do not destroy me on that day.

In seeking me, you sat down wearily; enduring the Cross, you

redeemed me:

do not let these pains to have been in vain.

Then a little bit later in the song: Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, grant them rest. Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, grant them rest everlasting.

Friends: as we journey through Advent, no matter your circumstance, your affliction, your isolation, may you know hope and peace now and forevermore. Amen.
