WEEKLY MILESTONES

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When have you received special attention from friends or family?
- Think of someone you have valued as a friend. In what ways do you value them?
- The angel Gabriel describes Mary as favored. What does it mean to you that God has given the world our Savior and Lord Jesus through Mary, a young peasant girl?

DEVOTIONS

Read: Luke 1:26-38.

In verses 28 and 30 the angel Gabriel says that Mary is favored, that is, Mary experiences the undeserved kindness of God. In Luke 2:40 and 52 the child Jesus is also described as favored. Divine attention comes to a young virgin to deliver Jesus, the Son of the Most High. The beginning of the Gospel of Luke tells of Elizabeth, a barren woman who gives birth, Mary, a peasant girl who gives birth to the future king in the lineage of David, and of shepherds in the field who will be the first evangelists of the good news of Jesus' birth (Luke 2:18). The message is clear: with God all things are possible, and as with Mary, our faithful response is, "let it be with me according to your word" (v. 38). Mary is the model of the life of faith that acknowledges that God has done great things for her. As we prepare to enter the season of Jesus' birth, we are met with God's favor and blessings for us as well. How has God come to you with divine favor?

Pray: God of undeserved kindness, give us faith to trust that with you all things are possible through Christ Jesus our Lord, Son of the Most High God. Amen.

SERVICE

During this Advent season think of those who are not favored in our society. For example, the homeless are poor, hungry, and in need. In what ways can you show God's love to them through an act of kindness?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

From your nativity set, hold each piece in silence for a moment. Then place the pieces back in the scene. Have Mary and Joseph arrive first, followed by the shepherds and then the wise men. Wait to place Jesus in the manger until Christmas Eve. On your Advent wreath, light the first candle of hope, the second one of peace, the third one of joy, and the fourth one of love. *Say this Bible verse:* For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. (John 3:16)

Pray: Lord God, thank you for showing us love even when we are afraid like Mary, the



mother of Jesus. Give us hope, peace, joy, and love as we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Amen.

GATHERING MUSIC

GREETING AND LIGHTING OF CANDLES: The history of humanity is fraught with pain—especially the pain that is accompanied by fear and leads to oppression and violence of one group of people against another. This is the world into which Jesus was born and through which his teachings would challenge and call for transformation. Our opening words come from an anonymous Jewish poet: *I believe in the sun, even when the sun is not shining,* were scrawled on a wall during the Holocaust. These words have become part of our theme song for our season calling us to examine our tendencies to annihilate fear by annihilating each other. The entire poem goes like this: *"I believe in the sun even when it is not shining And I believe in love, even when there's no one there. And I believe in God, even when he is silent.*

> I believe through any trial, there is always a way But sometimes in this suffering and hopeless despair My heart cries for shelter, to know someone's there But a voice rises within me, saying hold on my child, I'll give you strength, I'll give you hope. Just stay a little while.

I believe in the sun even when it is not shining And I believe in love even when there's no one there But I believe in God even when he is silent I believe through any trial there is always a way.

May there someday be sunshine May there someday be happiness May there someday be love May there someday be peace....

The power of story and music will call us this season to a different response: transformation and reconciliation through hope, love, joy and peace. This Advent and Christmas, let us fill our days and our nights with music and light as we affirm and act upon the reasons we can still "believe, even when" we are discouraged. As we light the altar and Christ candles, I invite those of you who are worshiping at home to light a candle or candles in preparation for today's worship.



CROSSING THE THRESHOLD: The "great light" prophesied by Isaiah in today's text is echoed in the first strains of John's Gospel good news: the light that brings peace—that saves the people from all that would extinguish it—has been there from the beginning. The Word is made flesh and dwells among us. This reign is now...will we believe it? Will we continue to put flesh on it, embodying the peace meant for all humanity?







CHILDREN'S MOMENT: THIS LITTLE LIGHT OF MINE

The song This Little Light of Mine, is nearly 100 years old this year. No one knows exactly who wrote it, but during the 1950's and 1960's our African American brothers and sisters sang this song as a song of resistance: as a reminder that no matter the oppressive circumstances, no matter the darkness we experience, God's light within us shines through when we let it.

Each week during the Children's Moment we are going to add a verse to this song so that by the time Christmas comes, we will be ready to celebrate the birth of God's Light in our midst.

Wise men come, wise men go, will Herod let him live? Hey Herod – No! he will not him live – better go! Hey Herod – he will not him live – better go! Hey Herod – he will not him live! Better go, will not let him live, better go, will not let him live! Better go – oh – oh Go, go, go, go, go!

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: John 1:1-18 (NRSV)

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴ in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸ He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹ The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹ He came to what was his own,and his own people did not accept him. ¹² But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵ (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") ¹⁶ From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷ The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸ No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

SERMON

Throughout Advent our Old Testament scriptures have been from the prophet Isaiah—from the time period of the Babylonian exile. Our New Testament lessons have been the beginning of each of the four gospels—the genesis, if you will, of each life-story of Jesus. Mark's gospel begins with Jesus fully grown and being baptized by his cousin, John. Matthew's gospel begins with Jesus' genealogy and the birth story from Joseph's point of view. Luke's gospel begins with the birth story from Mary's point of view. And as you just heard, John's gospel begins with poetry of sorts—speaking of Jesus as the Word Incarnate. If we would have read today's New Testament lesson from Eugene Peterson's The Message, we would have heard that the Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood. How is that for cool imagery?

Because today's scripture comes in the form of poetry, our sermon will also. I will read to you poet Ann Weems' piece called *The Word of God* taken from her book <u>From Advent's Alleluia to Easter's Morning Light</u>. Listen carefully. Listen deeply. Listen with the heart of Jesus.

In the beginning was the Word, and the word was with God, and the Word was God...All things were made through the Word, and without the Word was not anything made that was made.

In a wave of wonder. in an extravaganza of imagination, in a roar of deafening waters, in a drum roll of thunder. God said let there be Light! and the dazzling sun of Day made her entrance, singing her song of Life. Then in a stunning display of fireworks, lightning leaping in bolts, stars hurling through ink black sky, moon floating above, the Light of Night took her bow. The stage was set. Right from the beginning the Word was there. with God. The Word was God. And without the Word not anything was made that was made. Day and Night, darkness and light, waters and land. trees and living plants, animals and birds. and people, all created by God. Right from the beginning the Word of God was spoken in miracles. Right from the beginning,

in the light of God's love, the people of God were created for covenant keeping. I will be your God and you will be my people. Right from the beginning the Word was Love and the Word was Light and the Word was Life. Right from the beginning God's people were invited to walk in the way of the Word. God saw that it was good. It was very good.

Until, that is, somebody left the door open in paradise, and Death walked on stage and turned off the light. Somebody or somebodies thought they didn't have to listen to God, thought they didn't need to keep covenant. Call them by whatever names you like: Adam, Eve, the neighborhood snake; it's all the same. God's people had been entrusted with earth and stars and all living things, and yet it wasn't enough. Something gnawed away at the souls of God's people and they broke covenant... right there in the beginning...

and again... and again... and again.

Somebody or somebodies wanted to be in charge. Somebody or somebodies wanted to be God's favorite. Somebody or somebodies wanted to be God. Somebody or somebodies didn't like the diversity. They wanted everybody to be like they were.

Killing was born and hatred and greed and deception and suspicion and hard-heartedness and mean-spiritedness and distrust and power grabbing and jealousy and prejudice. The people of God had chosen Death instead of Life. God was grieved to the heart.

Return to me, God said. Over and over and over again Return to me. God sent prophets

to tell the people to return to God. but just as Cain hated Abel, the people of the world hated each other and wars began and God's people still would not return, return to covenant living return to the way of life that God had offered. God asked for justice and mercy and humbleness, but the people of the world wanted justice for themselves and mercy for themselves and anything but humbleness. God had promised not to send another flood. Besides God loved the people still even though they walked in darkness, so God sent a great Light, the Word of God Incarnate.

We know the story. Even though God kept covenant on behalf of the people, even though Jesus walked on this earth, even though he is the Way, the Truth, and the life, the world knew him not. We know the story. The people didn't want to share their bread and their wine. The people didn't want to love one another. And so they crucified the only One who was Love. The angels wept.

But still God loved the people. And forgave them. Jesus was resurrected. And the Holy Spirit was sent to guide the church of Jesus Christ.

Why then is the world today in such darkness? Why do we open our newspapers and read stories and see photos of the manifestations of hatred? Why does blood cover our TVs? Why are the sick not healed? Why are the poor not fed? not housed? Why are children abused? Why are the weak exploited? On and on and on... Terror and violence... Where is the Church of Jesus Christ? It's about Jesus... It's always been about Jesus. In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God But the world has a way of creating God in its own image. When we don't like the Word of God, we dilute the gospel into something insignificant.

We begin making more rules. We write lists of what we are going to do in the future. The Word of God is far more dangerous than that. The Word of God changed our lives. It changes our lives now. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. Love your neighbor as yourself. Follow me. Go into all the world and preach the gospel. Preach the good news to the poor. Feed my sheep. Preach Love. Preach Peace.

Something is gnawing at the souls of the people of God. Somewhere along the way we thought we didn't have to listen to the Word of God, thought we didn't have to walk in covenant. Instead of keeping covenant, we've turned off the light and are spending our time quarreling. How must the heart of God grieve! How must the Good Shepherd weep! when there are so many of his sheep to be fed, so many sheep lost, so many sheep waiting for the Church of Jesus Christ to find them, so many sick longing to be healed, so many tortured waiting to be freed, so many war plagued... bleeding, homeless, hungry...

Death has taken center stage, Hatred takes curtain call after curtain call. Violence bows to the applause of the crowd, waiting waiting waiting for the Church of Jesus Christ to climb into its pulpit and preach the Word of God. The Word of God is not War. The Word of God is Peace. The Word of God is not Torture. The Word of God is Compassion. The Word of God is not Hate. The Word of God is Love. Is it fear of losing more members, more money, that we do not stand in solidarity with the Prince of Peace? Our darkness begins where our covenant ends. If the love of God is not written on our hearts, there is not covenant light, and flailing in the dark gets us nowhere. The miracle is,

the stunning absurdity of the Gospel is, that the people of God fell into a pit of darkness because they didn't have the eyes to see the light of God... but our covenant God had compassion and hearing the cries of the people, had pity on them and forgave them.

The world was created in miracles. Surely there are miracles yet to come. If the people of God will open their hearts to the Word of God, they will have the eyes to see the Light of the World.







y father, a UCC minister, died of cancer at age 54, just after Thanksgiving. I was fourteen; my brother and sister were grown and had to go back to their homes. Mom and I were lonely, confused about the future, and our financial picture was very shaky. Further, we faced a bleak Christmas . . . we didn't even want to think about that.

"Then came a check from the Christmas Fund. We were both deeply touched that our national Church somehow knew that we were in need and gave us this gift. It didn't solve all our troubles, but it made it possible for us to have Christmas. We felt the love behind the gift, and that was transformative.

"Throughout my mother's long life, she gave faithfully and gratefully to the Christmas Fund, and I have done the same through the churches I have served as pastor. I've often told our story, because I want people to know how important it is to reach out in this way.

"When the pandemic caused such upheaval, and an appeal came from the Pension Boards telling about the increased need for emergency funds, I sat right down and wrote a check. My husband and I are glad we could help."

In 2019, gifts to the Christmas Fund enabled:

- Monthly pension supplementation for 350 retired clergy and lay employees (\$1,347,419)
- Health premium supplementation for 144 retired clergy and lay employees (\$374,577)
- Emergency grants for 69 individuals and families (\$123,727)
- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks to 521 retired clergy and lay employees (\$260,500)
