DEVOTIONS



Read: Luke 2:22-40.

Luke 2:29-32 is known as the *Nunc Dimittis* (Latin for, "Now release," the first words of Simeon's song of praise in the Latin Bible) used in worship and also tender words offered at the deathbed of a loved one. Simeon's song makes it clear that in Jesus, God has acted in a way that now gives peace for all people, including Gentiles, the non-Jews of the world. Luke makes it clear that the promise given to the Jewish people to be a blessing to the world has now come to pass through the birth of Jesus. Barriers are broken down. Jews and Gentiles together have hope. Mary and Joseph who can only offer two turtledoves (often a gift given by the poor) as a sacrifice for Jesus' birth, have actually given the world its real hope and peace. It brings the joy expressed in Psalm 148, but it also brings the pain that will pierce Mary's soul. Compassion is like that. It feels the pain of others and trusts that God's saving work is the light, hope, and peace of the world. How has love brought you pain and peace at the same time?

 ${\it Pray:}\$ Loving God, we thank you for Simeon, Anna, and all those throughout history who have lifted up Jesus as the hope and peace for all the world. Amen.

SERVICE



In the temple in Jerusalem, Simeon and Anna encouraged and blessed two young, first-time parents, Mary and Joseph. Identify parents with young children in your congregation or community. Is there an act of service you can do on their behalf (e.g., help with cleaning, bringing a meal, or childcare) so they can enjoy some time out together?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Psalm 148 is a psalm that offers praise to God in all things. Praise means to give thanks. Write your own psalm. Make a list of things for which you wish to praise God. Using the list, say each praise aloud. For example:

I praise God for *earth and all stars*. Praise the Lord! I praise God for *family and friends*. Praise the Lord! And so forth until you finish the list.

Meditation Tatum Temple

When Jesus was born, people knew he was going to do great things. In the New Testament readings, we learn about Simeon, a man who knew he would meet the Messiah before he would pass away. Upon seeing Jesus, he knew that the baby boy was the Messiah. He rejoiced when he realized it. This story is a bit different than Anna. She lived in the temple for a long time, never leaving it as she would pray and worship everyday. Anna knew the Messiah was coming, and would give thanks to God about it. Both Simeon and Anna in this story had one thing in common. They had faith that the Lord was coming.

Everyone encounters faith in a different way. I would have to consider myself lucky as I grew up in the church. I don't think there was an exact moment in time where I thought I would become a Christian. Growing up, my mom always took me to church on Sundays. My cousins and I were always in Sunday school together, and we would sit with my entire family during the church service. Some times, we'd even go to the Wednesday night dinners that was hosted at the church because my family wanted to raise my cousins and me to have a strong relationship with Christ.

It was how I thought everyone was like until I was in fourth grade. A boy in my science class had asked me who my dad was. To those who know me well, you may know I'm a child of a single mother, but at that time, I didn't really know that was something some people would find strange. That didn't mean I had no answer for him. I looked the boy straight in the eyes, and without missing a beat, I said, "God. God's my Father." Looking back, I realized that answer came from growing up in the church. I knew that God was the Father, and that He was everyone's father as He created us all. Because of this,

I never felt as if I was missing something. While the boy in my class may have asked for my answer in a more literal sense, it didn't matter to me. I was lucky that I have faith in my life to help me through.

In sixth grade, I moved here to New Bremen, where a friend from school invited me to come here, where I grew more into my faith. It was here that I could become more involved in the church by participating in activities and serving others. On Sunday nights, I'd go to Youth Group, connecting with others who wanted to grow in their faith as well. I was able to go on a mission trip to help people in New York, who were still recovering from a hurricane. This was all because I felt comfortable here, and knew this was how I could grow in my faith. The way I praise God is through acts of service and through connecting with others as I feel a stronger connection whenever I do that.

Everyone's faith is a bit different as everyone comes face-to-face with faith in different ways. While I grew up in the church and feel comfortable sharing my faith through acts of service and connecting with others, others do not. The prophet from the passage, Anna, shared her faith through prayer. It was how she became more connected with Christ, as she knew when Jesus had come. Her story is different from Simeon, who knew he was going to see Him, and when he did, he rejoiced.

It is important to have faith, to know that He is with us. Before Jesus was born, people were looking forward to the day that He would come to the earth because of the things He would do. Today, we are lucky enough to know that is true, but we still need to grow in our faith, whether it's through prayer, actions, or just simply believing in Him.




Leader: For someone on earth will see the star; someone will hear the angel voices; someone will run to Bethlehem; someone will know peace and goodwill:

² But I have calmed and quieted my soul, like a weaned child with its mother; my soul is like the weaned child that is with me.

³ O Israel, hope in the Lord from this time on and forevermore.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 2:21-38

(NRSV)

After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb.

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), ²⁴ and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

²⁹ "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;

³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation,

- which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too." ³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

he Rev. Jeanne Tyler was called to ministry in the 1960s, and along with her husband, John, spent 33 years jointly serving congregations in Wisconsin, Nebraska, and Iowa.

Born with cerebral palsy and diagnosed with moderate to severe hearing loss in the third grade, Jeanne became a fierce advocate for the church's awareness of, and response to, those with disabilities.

"There is a hidden cost of disability of which many are unaware," she explains. "The financial cost – speech therapy, hearing aids, motorized wheelchairs, specialized computers – all expensive. Without these, isolation and depression can set in."

Jeanne served with the UCC's Disabilities Ministries and in other capacities with the national church and was instrumental in the conception and funding of the Virginia Kreyer Endowed Scholarship Fund, which provides tuition and assistive technology for ministers with disabilities.

"I'm grateful for the United Church of Christ being with me on my jou mey, and it's essential that the church continue its commitment to clergy who have disabilities." Hearing aids have been a godsend to Jeanne, from the first ones she used while still in college. "They worked well for the time—I could hear the fire crackle for the first time and it was just thrilling."

After retirement, the high cost of newer technology hearing aids was problematic. A grant from the Christmas Fund filled the gap left by her insurance allowance, allowing Jeanne to have hearing aids that make all the difference. "As a pastor, I always asked people to support the Christmas Fund, to support those whose life work has been serving and empowering others, but I never thought I would be on the receiving end. I am humbled and grateful for this acknowledgement by my church that hearing aids are life-giving."

In 2019, gifts to the Christmas Fund enabled:

- Monthly pension supplementation for 350 retired clergy and lay employees (\$1,347,419)
- Health premium supplementation for 144 retired clergy and lay employees (\$374,577)
- Emergency grants for 69 individuals and families (\$123,727)
- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks to 521 retired clergy and lay employees (\$260,500)
