

DEAR PARENTS

Firstly I would like to express a warm congratulation to the class of 2019, who have achieved outstanding results in their HSC. Today our graduates can be found in leadership positions in every sector of society, from corporate boardrooms, corridors of government, university lecture theatres, research laboratories and almost every facet of the community. I hope that the graduates of 2019 will be able to make similar contributions in the near future.

Our outstanding educational institution was not built overnight. Ngo and Sons has been a leading centre for learning over several decades through the hard work and selfless devotion of many people. This year the extension 1 and 2 Mathematics course was completely revamped and revision worksheets were generated ready to be used in 2020.



It is expected that a complete overhaul of our advance mathematics course will take place over the coming months with the course focusing on more exam style questions. Other exciting projects such as providing solutions online for some of our senior courses, exam focus lessons for local and selective schools junior students, introduction of new topics in junior syllabus are in their infancy stages of development. Junior English has had great success over the last 12 months, with many of our students achieving high ranks at school. I would like to make a special mention of our school specific classes, taught by alumni, in particular made a huge difference to marks achieved by our students.

In the coming year, I will be in discussion with our English team to extend this concept to many of our other local schools in the Parramatta, Fairfield and Hurstville regions. Our Science team have made huge strides in improving the quality of our Physics and Chemistry lessons. I was hugely impressed with teacher's ability to apply mathematical and modelling skills and technology to their lessons, discussion of depth studies with individual students and attention to detail of class notes. I am sure this will translate to improving grades. Year 6 students made a seamless transition from our prep school, Ngo and Sons Preparatory College to our high school sector in March. It continues to produce high quality students instilled with motivation and respect. I will continue to work with our primary educators to ensure our young students have a strong foundation and good work ethic from the very start.

The NSPC team had introduced holiday writing courses to further motivate and hone students' writing and creative thinking. We have hosted a number of mock trials for Selective and Opportunity Class courses and will continue to do so in the new year.

Throughout 2019, we had also experienced many exciting changes. These included the transition of Year 6 students to our high school centers; the introduction of new Year 2 classes; as well as witnessed the growth of all students. We had particularly enjoyed noting how students had matured over the course of the year. Through diligence and determination, students had demonstrated increased class attention and participation, more detailed homework, as well as improved exam technique.

For 2020, we are planning on making more refinements in our courses to reinforce **fundamental concepts.** We are also looking forward to welcoming our new Year 2 students into the NSPC family and wishing nothing but the best to our much loved Year 6 students, who will be finishing at the end of March later this year.

JUNIOUR MATHEMATICS



In the past year, we introduced new exam-focused content, revision worksheets, and assignments to our classes. This has had a tremendous impact on our students' understanding of mathematical concepts. With our new materials, our students are exposed to more logical and systematic approaches to a wide variety of questions. In teaching our techniques to students, we have seen a significant improvement in students' application of critical thinking.


With the upcoming syllabus changes, our team has been working diligently and meticulously to make this adjustment an easy process. The changes to the senior mathematics syllabus now mean that the gap between year 10 and year 11 is wider than ever. To reduce this gap, we have introduced new topics (Series and Sequence, Polynomial, Vectors, Advance Probability, Unit Circle, 3D Trigonometry) into our program to prepare students and ease what is already a daunting transition to senior studies.



EXTENSION 1. MATHEMATICS









In the upcoming year, we plan to continue closely monitoring the new NESA syllabus in order to prepare our students for assessment tasks. Holiday classes will also be continued in the new year whereby focus classes will be held for selected subjects. We look forward to becoming an integral component of our students' success and growth in 2020.



EXTENSION 2. MATHEMATICS





This year has been pivotal for us as we pilot our first ever cohort of students through the new 4 unit syllabus. The most prominent outcome of this revamped syllabus is that we are now able to start our accelerated classes in January of Year 11, rather than August of Year 10. This change comes hand-in-hand with student feedback about the length of the previous iteration of the accelerated program.



As predicted, students are increasingly being assessed on their critical thinking and analytical skills, rather than just their ability to regurgitate formulas at record speeds. The leaner new syllabus has allowed us to allocate more class time to discussion of methods. The skill of communication and reasoning will ultimately be what differentiates the best of students. The non-accelerated program has seen additional changes to, as part of our continuing strategy from last year, push our students to perform on par with our accelerated cohort.

ENGLISH

The past year was a big one for the Ngo and Sons English department. **The introduction of school-specific focus classes for Stage 5 students has been an incredible success.** In January, we opened classes for Hurlstone Agricultural High School, Sefton High School and Prairiewood High School and since then, our students have seen great improvement and consistent results at school.

Across all classes, **our students have demonstrated greater motivation and improved study habits in addition to reading and writing techniques.** In the Hurlstone Agricultural High School Year 10 class, students have consistently scored 80% and above for all assessments throughout the year. In the Sefton Year 10 class, all students have shown improvement with most students who were achieving a B grade average increasing their results to gain an A grade average. In the Prairiewood Year 9 and Year 10 classes, students steadily improved their grades across mainstream and selective classes. For the Year 9 group, some students have achieved 1st rank within their class and one student has been offered a place in the selective stream after demonstrating amazing results.

We hope to continue this trend into 2020 as we open more focus classes for the following schools and year groups:

- Hurlstone Agricultural High School, Year 10
- Sefton High School, Year 10
- Prairiewood High School, Year 9

We have also introduced our 'The Book Stop' initiative in our Stage 3 and 4 classes at Fairfield campus. This initiative is intended to increase our students' literacy by exposing them to interesting novels that are age-appropriate and build upon the content we teach in our junior English program. Our deepest gratitude is extended to Ngo & Sons' in-house Teaching Librarian Mrs Siobhan James for providing a library of literature for students to explore and enjoy!

SCIENCE






HURSTVILLE

NESA REPORTS



MATHEMATICS

As of 24th October 2019, the Premier of NSW, Gladys Berejiklian, has stated that the NSW Government will be working towards making Mathematics compulsory for students in Primary (Kindergarten - Year 6) and Secondary School (Year 7 - 12). This initiative is to ensure that students are better equipped with numeracy skills enabling them to be successful in the society that they live in.

Mathematics is an essential part to learning and it is important that students are able to understand certain mathematical concepts. If students are mathematically equipped then they will be able to develop their minds to be critical thinkers and active problem solvers.

With the Year 11 students commencing in 2020, they will be the first to test out the new syllabus which has been implemented by NESA. This is an exciting experience, but also a scary one. Our centre tries our best to cater for all students from all schools, whether it be public, private, catholic or selective. Our teachers are readily equipped with the knowledge of the new syllabi and have prepared for sequencing the topics so that students are to be one step ahead of school.

SCIENCE

2019 marked the first year that the new Physics and Chemistry syllabi were to be assessed. The Higher School Certificate paper seemed to reflect a lot of our assumptions, that is, Physics and Chemistry are now mainly application based. Not only are students required to learn the content, they will also need to apply their knowledge to critical thinking questions.

We should also be expecting changes to the Stage 4 and Stage 5 syllabi in order to compensate for the gap that has been left due to the new syllabus changes for the Stage 6 course, however this is still uncertain. For the time being, our Science department is working hard to revamp our junior content so that we can bridge the gap. We hope that students taking our science course will be better prepared for the senior syllabi and ultimately, for their Higher School Certificate.



ENTRANCE EXAM & STAFF OF THE YEAR

With more than 1500 class offers given, 2019 marks another successful year of growth for Ngo and Sons. Whilst classes are of high demand and positions are at a premium, students attending our assessment centers are still being given offers to accelerate them in their academic journey. Ngo & Sons UCAT Team worked hard this year to help you get into Medicine and Dentistry.

In March, Ngo & Sons held its annual Special Medicine Information Evening, with over 200 guests, some of whom had attended in previous years, a testament to how much value the event offers. We shared insights on not only how to apply to Medicine but also on what you need to be doing to maximise your chances. Thank you for your positive feedback and for joining us.

2019 was interesting. It was the first year of **University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT)** in Australia, replacing UMAT. Unlike UMAT, **UCAT** is a 2-hour computer-based exam, comprising 233Q over 5 subtests, with less allocated time per question (some allowing only 14.18 secs!). A different game, it requires a different approach. So we improvised, adapted, and overcame it.



Director of UCAT & Medicine Interviews

In **April Holidays, Intensive UCAT Courses and Mock Exam Days** were run at both **Fairfield and Parramatta campuses**, each venue over **4 full days**. You learned effective strategies for all 5 subtests of the UCAT exam and practised many UCAT-style questions. Students who sat the Mock Exam received thorough feedback.

Throughout July, UCAT was held. At least 12 of our Students scored > 90th percentile. Incredible. The highest score being 98th percentile - Christopher T, Kathryn C, well done!

In November, right after HSC, we held Medicine Interview Workshops. We are SO proud of our Year 12s scoring interviews all around Australia. Congratulations to all our Students who achieved Medicine Offers, some of whom include Jessi T, Kevin F, and Ian N.

In 2020, we will introduce a new Intensive UCAT Course with Full Online Question Bank (thousands of questions) as well as a Bundle Special, where you can save \$200+ (if you join in a Group of 3). The Mock Exam has also been moved closer to the Official UCAT Exam (July), so Year 12s can get some final revision before their exam. 

- Do practice papers after understanding the basics which is taught at tutoring.
- For English, practice writing!
- For science, understanding the concept is more important than practice papers. You need to understand the concept before knowing how to apply it to answering questions in exams and past papers.
- Focus on your weaker subjects first.
- Start preparing for exams at least 2-3 weeks before the exam. The first week is to work on your weak spots and the next two should be doing past papers.

My HSC experience was probably one of the hardest things I had to face in my life at the time. I was really stressed and did not know how to improve my marks. After a while, I figured the only thing you can do is to work harder and smarter. This mindset helped me persevere through my bad marks and in the end helped me achieve a top ranking for Chemistry.

Kim's HSC study tips are:

- Do your school past papers to identify the types of silly mistakes you make as well as the setting out that is required.
- Also do other school papers as well as the booklets from Ngo & Sons, especially the difficult questions, to increase exposure to difficult questions to maximize the chances of completing the final question in your exams.

I attended Ngo & Sons from Year 9 through to Year 12. I appreciated the teaching style of the Centre which emphasized understanding 'how' to solve all types of questions, as opposed to memorizing all the different types of questions possible. My tutor Mr. Mai was truly an inspirational mentor who guided me through my HSC journey and I will remain grateful to Mr. Mai for as long as I live.

Kevin's Study Tips are:

- 1. **Study ahead.** Study half a year ahead. By the time I went into year 12 Chemistry, I already finished studying the year 12 content by myself via textbooks and online resources. Thus, when we did go over it in class, it was simply a process of revision. So, while everyone else is trying to grapple with new concepts and grasp new ideas, you are actually able to engage with it, reinforcing your understanding and asking the teachers anything that you don't understand.
- 2. **Do your past papers of the top five schools in the state.** Then, you MUST go back and fix your mistake. Even if it's something small like a silly mistake, it is important for you to redo the question just so that you'll commit that mistake to memory and avoid it in the upcoming tests.
- 3. Achieve a balance between sleep and study times. Many people begin to stress and study more leading towards the exam because they didn't study enough before, which only results in them getting less sleep and feeling tired inside the exam. So, my technique actually involves studying a lot at the start of the term, even if it means reducing your sleep time. For me, I would often study 10 hours a day and sleep for 5 hours at the beginning of each term just so I can make sure I'm ahead of everyone else
- 4. **Don't be scared of asking for help.** I'm not going to lie. I have never been someone who's gifted with an extremely bright mind and that's why I make lots of mistakes and can't do a lot of questions. However, rather than wasting time on trying to tackle a problem that I can't do by myself, I will just ask my friends, tutors or teachers who often provides me with a super easy solution.
- 5. **Don't be afraid of admitting your weaknesses.** Everyone has a subject they're weak at whether it be English or Chemistry or Mathematics. It's completely alright to be weak in that subject but it's not alright to stay weak at it. You need to be able to realise your weakness, accept it and then be able to put more time and effort into improving that weakness.

Message to Kevin's peers:

I'll leave you guys with a message that I wrote on the day of graduating high school and I hope you can take some inspiration from it. Today is both the best and the worst day of my life as I finally step out the gates of NSB for the last time. To the class of 2019, I want to thank each and every one of you for your help and support throughout the long high school years. I would also like to extend this respect to my family, teachers and tutors for staying by my shape through this rough journey and for shaping me into the person I am today. I appreciate all the lectures and the knowledge you have passed onto me. They will forever have a special place within my heart and I will be sure to apply them to my life and become a better person, one who others can respect and look up to. To the class of 2019, today marks the end of our high school lives and sadly enough, it's something we cannot start over. However, what we can do from this point on is to turn over a new leaf and create a new beginning for us all. I'm sure our paths will cross again sometime in the near future. Also, remember that at this point of time, you're no longer studying for the HSC for your sake only. You're studying for the sake of your family, friends, teachers and tutors.
