READING FROM HEBREW SCRIPTURE..... Jonah 3:1-5, 10 (NRSV translation) read by Rev. Blair

The message of Jonah speaks of opportunities to stretch our understanding of God and salvation. The focus text is of God's second call to Jonah and his less than enthusiastic response.

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed God's mind about the calamity that the Holy One had said God would bring upon them; and the Divine did not do it.
