An LGBT History Month filled with events

The History Project has many ways for you to get out and learn about your history this October for LGBT History Month, including four exhibits and several programs.

The exhibit "We're Here: Pioneering LGBT Rights in Pennsylvania" (which opened in April) runs through October 30th at The State Museum of Pennsylvania in Harrisburg. A program will be held on Friday October 21 noon to 1 PM at the State Museum with video clips of oral history interviews and a Q & A session with the exhibit

curator. There is an admission charge, but the program is free to state employees. The exhibit focuses on early LGBT community organizing in central Pennsylvania in the 1970's including the formation of the Pennsylvania Rural Gay Caucus and Governor Milton Shapp's several LGBT civil

rights "firsts" including the creation of the Pennsylvania Council for Sexual Minorities.

At the LGBT Center in Harrisburg, the exhibit "ART/history: a retrospective exhibit on the career of jewelry designer Jude Sharp" opens with 3rd in the Burg on Friday September 16 with a reception from 6 PM to 9 PM.

Refreshments will be served. See a selection of photographs of Jude's jewelry creations from her nearly 50 year career as a jewelry designer and craftsperson, as well as a photo/text exhibit showing and describing the creative process she follows and her working in her studio/workshop. Mementos of Jude's life and career will also be on display. The exhibit runs through October 18.

In a program on Tuesday October 11 from 6 PM to 8:00 PM at the LGBT Center, we will show Jude Sharp's oral history interview and Jude will be on hand to answer questions about her life and career as a lesbian artist. Refreshments will be served.

Dickinson College in Carlisle will host the 4th annual "History Comes Out" exhibit in the Waidner-Spahr Library on its campus. The exhibit runs from October 1-31. The exhibit features a selection of artifacts and documents from the collection, curated by one of our previous student interns from Dickinson College. A reception will be held on Sunday October 9 from 1:30 PM to 3:30 PM with additional artifacts on display and refreshments served.

Our fourth exhibit is a new venue for us this year at the Stevenson Library on the campus of Lock Haven University. The exhibit opens on September 30 and runs through October 19. A reception will be

The exhibit will feature a selection of artifacts and documents from our collection, including some from the north central part of Pennsylvania. Barry Loveland will give a presentation on October 19th from 12:30 PM to 2 PM about the History Project.

Book planned for History Project

One of the "dreams" of the History Project has been to write and publish a book based on research of the collections and oral history interviews in the History Project collection. That dream is one step closer to reality after a final book proposal was submitted to the Penn State University Press in August.

Penn State University Press contacted the History Project about a year ago expressing interest in publishing a book about the project. About the same time, Bill Burton, an historian living in Philadelphia, contacted the History Project wanting to do research and writing for a book. These coinciding events led to a chain of communications and meetings and a couple of draft proposals, to now a final stage of proposal approval which

will lead to an agreement to publish. The working title of the book is *Out in the Hinterland: Creating a LGBT Community in Rural Pennsylvania*.

We are very excited to work on this project, which we anticipate will take about two years. We'll keep you updated on our progress. In the meantime, we ask everyone to continue to look through your closets, basements and attics for more documents and artifacts that will shed light on our region's LGBT history, and if you know of anyone whose story will be important to include, please have them contact us about being interviewed.
